50 year history of the Lily Sno-birds Snowmobile Club



The year was 1972; gasoline was \$.36 a gallon, there were close to 100 snowmobile manufacturers, now only four remain.

The Lily Sno-Birds Club was formed as a place to gather for those who shared a love for snowmobiling and to promote the sport to a wider base in the community. Snowmobiles were used to reach the 'Back country', places where everyone normally was unable to access in winter.

Now, half a century old, the Club has changed in every aspect, from the machines being ridden to the members who ride them. The one constant has been the love of snowmobiling. Snowmobiling became a way of life. You live and die by the amount of snow. clubhouse. The Raymond & Vinnie Gibbs family also were very supportive.

The first meeting was held at the Lily School House. As the memberships grew, the meeting moved to the Town Hall. Fundraising was a top priority and a dance in a barn was held. Racing was also involved on the Town Hall grounds with young Quentin Strong. Construction began on a new clubhouse in 1976 or 78? Harold Irwin drove a well free of charge. Heating was donated by Warren Fuller. Ed LaMay donated a liquor license from his closed bar at Hwy 52 and County A. William Wolf was Town Chairman for the Town of Langlade and helped tremendously on completion of all legal documents needed for the club to operate the clubhouse. After opening, racing was the new fundraiser. Top performing racers came from all over Wisconsin to participate. Insurance costs over time put an end to the club racing. Leasing the track over to Neva Club brought in ATV racing.

Back in the day, the snowmobile trail system was so narrow that if you met another rider, one would have to stop and let the other pass through. The use of a bed box spring was used to groom the trails. One sled would drag the trail to Pickerel and drop off, while another rider would return the drag back to Lily.

The first two machines used by the Club were donated by Bill Priem as the new drag equipment. Then later Bill Priem went on to donate land to the Sno-Birds which is now Priem Park adjacent to the Clubhouse. This Park is being used by the Triple R Horse Riding Club for over 30 years for the Fall Ride. Again, our appreciation to the land owners for your unselfishness to contributing to the Sno-Birds success! I need to mention, that it was a great and worthwhile cause to turn a dream into the existence of a clubhouse for all to enjoy. A reality that would not be possible without the many people that have contributed over the years. This includes all landowners, members. non-members, the volunteers that bartend, work in the kitchen, and last but not least, the groomers in the Tucker, with 'no heat' and to all who enjoy snowmobiling.

One bright spot is that you can still get food here. The Subway, in Crandon, is now located in this spot.


