#### Getting children vaccinated

DHS and Wisconsin Pediatricians Say Now is the Time to Catch Kids Up on Vaccines and Well-Child Visits

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) has joined the Wisconsin Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics (WIAAP) to urge families to make sure their children are up to date on well-child visits and vaccinations.

"In 2020, there was a significant drop in clinic visits. This resulted in delays in vaccinations, screenings, referrals, and general guidance to keep families healthy," said Dr. Sarah Campbell, WIAAP president.

While many doctors adapted through telehealth and took steps to make sure patients weren't exposed to COVID-19, the decline in the number of office visits and routine vaccinations is alarming and could have longranging impacts on a child's health and the health of the

Wellness visits for children should be scheduled with a child's doctor regularly from birth through age three, then yearly after that. Different vaccinations are given at different times as a child grows. Medical providers and local public health departments are encouraged to follow CDC vaccine schedule (https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/index.html) for optimal protection.

Falling behind on vaccinations leaves children vulnerable to preventable diseases like influenza, measles, and whooping cough.

Dr. Stephanie Schauer, DHS Immunization Program Director says, "As a parent, I know firsthand that families continue to face a lot of challenges during the pandemic. Because so many kids have missed their vaccinations, we need to do all we can to get our children up to date. Even if your child missed a vaccination, they can still catch up."

You can check your child's vaccination status on the Wisconsin Immunization Registry or by calling 608-266-9691 or the Forest County Health Department at 715-478-3371.

The Forest County Health Department provides free vaccines for eligible children under the state funded VFC program. To see if your child qualifies for important routine childhood vaccinations, please call the Forest County Health Department for more information.

#### **Disappearing Grosbeaks**


The other morning, I was having my coffee and watching the birds on our feeders. I got to thinking that I hadn't seen evening grosbreaks on our feeders in like, forever! So, when I got to my office, I decided to do a little research and find out where they've gone.

I found that the evening grosbeak (Coccothraustes vespertinus) has a seen welldocumented decline during the past 50-plus years. This

# Back to original





Last week, the old sign that used to announce the presence of the Crandon Theater was taken down and put in the scrap wagon. That sign marked the social center for teenagers back in the good old days of the 50's and 60's and probably before that. The Crandon Theater was the place that teens gathered on a Friday evening to watch a movie and flirt and more!

The building was originally part of the Page & Landeck company store, the lumber company that had the sawmill on Clear Lake. While it isn't certain at this time when the building was constructed, the original structure, that now houses the Subway, was started sometime not too long after 1901, when the sawmill started making lumber. It was, we think, where the hardware was located.

#### Positive cases of covid-19 in **Forest County**

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 91 individuals have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) since February 1, 2022 with either a PCR, antigen, or home test. County health officials and local partners are contacting individuals who test positive as able. There have been 4 deaths this year related to COVID-19. This is a snapshot of the numbers as they are continuously changing throughout the day.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to get vaccinated, practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested. If positive, please isolate yourself away from others for 5 days since symptom onset and wear a mask for the 5 days following your release from isolation.

If you are interested in a COVID-19 vaccine, the Forest County Health Department is having a vaccine clinic on Friday, March 4th from 11am-2pm in the county board room located inside the Forest County courthouse. Moderna and Pfizer are being offered.

In an effort to keep our community members upto-date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers every Friday with current COVID-19 case counts as capacity allows. 

bird used to be a common winter visitor to feeders across America. Now, feeders that once hosted hundreds of these birds may see only a handful every decade or so. The bird's decline has been well documented in the National Audubon Society's, 121-year-old Christmas Bird Count

The evening grosbeak nests in remote regions of central Canada and a handful of northern states, but irrupts from these regions in winter. Because much of the breeding range of the evening grosbeak is inaccessible, winter surveys such as the CBC provide the best indicator of the health of the species.

Evening grosbeak numbers were stable or increasing until 1970, when their numbers began to significantly decline. Their notable decline between 1970 and 2010 indicates that there is less than one chance in 1,000 that the decline in evening grosbeak numbers was due to random fluctuations in abundance. The species sadly has the distinction of showing the steepest population decline (over 90% since the 1970s) of all land birds in the U.S. and Canada.

The cause of the decline is unknown, but there are several possibilities. The most obvious is that evergreen forest habitat, which they require, is being logged. The decline might also be related to food availability. Hardwood tree seeds, a favorite natural source of food of evening grosbeaks, may be less common due to broadscale changes in forestry practices in Canada. The widespread use of pesticides to kill insects also may be contributing to their decline, because evening grosbeaks feed their young a diet of insects. It's most likely a combination of factors that is leading to their remarkable decline and push toward extinction.

As one part of nature contracts or reduces, something else is expanding or increasing. Take this winter's increase in snowy owls in some of our northern states. In recent years, we have learned that when snowy owls irrupt, it's because of an abundance of food the previous winter and female snowy owls producing more owlets the following spring. Consequently, the next winter, many young snowy owls move out of their home range and into areas they are not normally found. We're seeing that this winter.

On the other hand, some species increase or decrease without a clear reason. The red-bellied woodpecker is a good example of a species that has expanded. I had to get the bird book out this winter to identify

these woodpeckers that I thought were yellow bellied sapsuckers. Thirty years ago, this bird was uncommon. Now, it inhabits most backyards, parks, and woodlands across the eastern United States. Why such a big increase in population? Hard to say.

On the other hand, the red-headed woodpecker (a species similar to the red-bellied) has declined dramatically in all regions. In fact, in many parts of the country, the redhead has disappeared. I happen to still see them at our suet feeders. One might suspect loss of habitat, but how does that explain ever-increasing numbers of red-bellied woodpecker? It's similar in size, shape, and requires similar habitat, and it's doing great.

I don't think there is one reason for the decline of a given species. Rarely in nature does anything happen due to just one reason. Usually, it's a combination of factors, and when an unseen threshold is reached, the trigger is tripped, and a population falls.





# Does Northern California Know What's Best for Wisconsin's Wolf Population

Madison, WI – Yesterday, U.S. District Court Judge Jeffrey White from the Northern District of California ordered federal protections for gray wolves to be restored in the Midwest. Senator Mary Felzkowski (R-Tomahawk), Representative Calvin Callahan (R-Tomahawk), Representative Rob Swearingen (R-Rhinelander), and Representative Jeff Mursau (R-Crivitz) released the following joint statement:

"Once again, an out-of-state federal judge more than a thousand miles away from Northern Wisconsin, who does not have to deal with an out-of-control wolf population and the negative impacts this will continue to have on our communities, has kowtowed to liberal special interest groups and rescinded our state's right to manage the wolf population based on Wisconsin science.

"We've recently received resolutions from the Langlade and Forest County Boards requesting that the Department of Natural Resources implement meaningful population control in the Wolf Management Plan and bring the wolf population down to a reasonable level.

"If out-of-state judges are going to continue to make decisions for Wisconsin residents, Wisconsin residents should have the ability to hold them accountable – that is not the case here. This order will have negative consequences on the safety of our communities, tourism, farming, and property values of the Northwoods. Hopefully Attorney General Kaul will do everything in his power to right this wrong."

# Baldwin Supports Legislation Banning Stock Trading by Members of Congress

#### Ban Congressional Stock Trading Act requires members of Congress and their families to place stock portfolios into blind trusts while in office

Washington, D.C. — U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin has cosponsored legislation to ban members of Congress from buying and selling stocks while in office.

Senator Baldwin has had the management of her financial assets in a blind trust while serving in the U.S. Senate since 2013, and the Ban Congressional Stock Trading Act, introduced by Senators Jon Ossoff (D-GA) and Mark Kelly (D-AZ,) will require all members of Congress, their spouses, and dependent children to place their stock portfolios into a blind trust — ensuring they cannot use inside information to influence their personal stock trades and make a profit.

"I don't believe members of Congress should be taking the information they have and trading stocks to enrich themselves while making public policy. It's our job to serve the people, not ourselves, and I support the Ban Congressional Stock Trading Act because it will help prevent corruption in Washington," said Senator Baldwin, "This legislation will help ensure that members of Congress are focused on delivering results for the people we work for, and not making decisions that deliver profits to their own bank accounts."

Members of Congress who violate the Ban Congressional Stock Trading Act will be fined in the amount of their entire Congressional salary.

Public opinion polling has shown that an overwhelming majority of Americans believe members of Congress should not be able to trade stocks while serving in office— including nearly 80 percent of Independents and Republicans.

Recently, 14 major government reform organizations — from across the political spectrum — united to call on Congress to swiftly pass the Ban Congressional Stock Trading Act, including the Campaign Legal Center, Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington (CREW), Fix the Court, FreedomWorks, Government Accountability Project, Issue One, National Center for Health Research, National Taxpayers Union, Progressive Change Campaign Committee, Project On Government Oversight, Public Citizen, Taxpayers for Common Sense, The Digital Democracy Project, and Transparency International — U.S. Office.



Ralph Neider, from Wabeno, owned the theater back in 1955. In talking to Scott Conway, who now lives in Louisiana, he thinks Neider turned the once hardware store into a theater back in the late 1930's. A fellow named Rives ran the theater for Neider, but he decided to quit in 1955. The American Legion approached Dick Conway to open the theater for the kids Christmas movie, with Art Freimuth running the projector. High school kid Scott Conway sold the popcorn and made a whopping \$25.

Dick Conway then bought the theater and ran it with the help of his wife Lois. The first movie they ran was Yellowstone Kelly, starring Clint Walker. With the passing of Dick Conway, his son Scott Conway ran the theater from 1975 until 1980, when Jim Sparks bought the business. Jim eventually turned the theater into a bar called Sparky's, and his daughter Sherry took over the business, changing the name to Group Therapy.

A new owner is taking over. Jim Elam and Dawn Volz are now the new owners.

# For Old Time's Sake

This is one of thousands of old logging photos that exist today. The old logging companies were good at leaving us photos so we could see what a good job they were doing.

This photo is labeled "Jake Hoffberger's Landing Near Crandon, Wis." Hoffberger was likely one of those logging companies that followed the timber and didn't put down roots. The name is not a common one in these parts and I don't remember anybody ever talking about working for this company or talking about a patch of timber that was originally cut by Hoffberger.

That being said, it is possible that if you are from a family that has been in the area for several generations, you could have an ancestor in the photo.

Another observation is that the old loggers always talked about the big timber they cut. Check out the log pile. See any big logs? It is obvious that an up and coming stand of hardwood was nearly clearcut, with some of the logs in the pile only possible to produce a four inch board. That's where the term "Cut and Run" came in.

#### **DNR Seeks nominations for 2021** Ethical Hunter Award

MADISON, Wis. - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is accepting applications for its annual Wisconsin Ethical Hunter Award, which honors hunter's actions of exceptional moral actions and character while in the field.

The Wisconsin Ethical Hunter Award was established in 1997 to recognize a person whose action represents Wisconsin's heritage of responsible, respectful and safe hunting.

"Ethical behavior demonstrates the moral character of the hunting public and illustrates how people can assist one another while recreating together in the outdoors." said DNR Chief Conservation Warden Casev Krueger.

Any hunter or non-hunter can nominate a licensed Wisconsin hunter for the Wisconsin Ethical Hunter Award for their actions during the 2021 calendar year. Although many nominations come from the gun-deer season, ethical actions can occur during a squirrel hunt, turkey hunt, waterfowl hunt or other Wisconsin hunting seasons.

"Ethical actions come in many forms; examples could include helping another person during a hunt or taking steps to protect our natural resources." Krueger said. "Over the years, award recipients have returned lost gear, helped others find lost game or assisted another hunter facing a challenge of some kind."

A four-person committee reviews the nominations and selects the recipient. The creators of this award are Bob Lamb, retired editor of the La Crosse Tribune; Steve Dewald, retired DNR Conservation Warden Supervisor and Jerry Davis, a retired University of Wisconsin-La Crosse biology professor and outdoors

The nomination committee focuses on a singular action or event rather than individuals with long-term conservation-related programs.



Scenes From Yesteryear



This is Crandon some time not too far after the year 1901. This is the C&NW depot that used to stand on Railroad Avenue in Crandon. It was the first rail service to the community, and it replaced the stagecoach from Pelican Lake. Crandon was now tied to the rest of the world! Of course, there wouldn't have been a railroad to Crandon if the Page & Landeck Lumber Co. wouldn't have built their sawmill on Clear Lake.

The C&NW depot stood until the early 1950's. The Soo Line on the other side of town out-competed them. Now, there is no rail service to the community. If we were to get another big sawmill in town, trucks would haul in the logs and the finished lumber to market.

The C&NW depot became part of a new home when it was torn down. The old Wisconsin Northern/Soo Line Depot is now a store and gas station at Pioneer Plaza in Crandon. The community went from two trains back to no trains!

WeCOPE: A free program starting Feb. 24 for adults to learn how to reduce life stress

WeCOPE, a free, interactive program designed to help adults cope with life stress, is available to the public via Zoom from 12:15-1:15 p.m. every other Thursday beginning Feb. 24. WeCOPE has been shown to reduce stress and depression, increase positive emotions, and improve health.

The program will be taught by Terri Kolb, Extension Educator in Forest and Oneida counties, and Debbie Moellendorf, Extension Educator in Lincoln County.

"WeCOPE sessions are not therapy or counseling sessions, but rather skill-building sessions where we'll share 11 skills that may help you reduce stress and increase positive emotions," Kolb said. "You'll probably find that some of the skills are familiar, some come more naturally than others, and that you like some more than others. That's OK. John lived in a cabin that he built in the woods. Later, the federal government insisted on building him a new cabin. From the old stories it is known that he never used the cabin. He liked to sit on the front steps and whittle or enjoy the sights and sounds of the woods.

John started walking back to his cabin from Argonne in a snow storm, in spite of offers of a bed in town. He was found dead in the snow on the trail into his cabin. It was in the late 1940's.
