Conservation Corner

Last week I received the Wisconsin Initiative on Climate Change Impacts (WICCI) 2021 Assessment Report. I'll try to summarize what the report means for us in Northern Wisconsin.

We are already feeling the impact of climate change. We are fortunately starting to come together to make our communities more climate-resilient. The report's key findings and solutions were discussed. I've listed some of them below.

Findings on Climate

- Wisconsin's average daily temperature has become three degrees Fahrenheit warmer since the 1950's.
- The last two decades have been the warmest on record, and the past decade has been the wettest.
- Wisconsin has become wetter average precipitation has increased 17 percent (about 5 inches) since 1950.
- Warming is happening fastest in the winter and at night.
- Southern Wisconsin has experienced the highest increase in precipitation.
- Very extreme precipitation events will increase in the future.
- Extreme events are already causing immense impacts across the state, and the frequency of those events will generally increase.

Solutions

Decrease carbon emissions and promote environmental and climate justice by investing in solutions that reduce greenhouse gas emissions and associated climate impacts.

Findings on Land

- Warmer winters, wetter springs, and extreme weather events are impacting agricultural production in Wisconsin and overwhelming conservation practices to keep soil in place and protect water quality. A shift towards increasing living cover on farm fields and promoting rotational grazing can reduce greenhouse gas emissions, which have increased by 14.3 percent from 2005 to 2017. Wellmanaged pastures and farm fields build and retain soil carbon, help communities cope with the increase in extreme rainfall events, and reduce damage to roads, bridges, and other infrastructure.
- Warmer winters, increasing deer herds, extreme weather events, summer droughts, and longer growing seasons are stressing forest ecosystems and in-creasing the risk of outbreaks of new pests and diseases. Iconic species like paper birch are vanishing from northern forests as the climate warms. Forest manage-ment, logging, and the forest products supply chain are facing uncertainty, with implications for rural economies.
- Warmer and wetter conditions, extreme storms, summer droughts, milder winters, and longer growing seasons are amplifying non-climate stressors to the point where diverse native habitats are simplified, associated wildlife species are diminishing or disappearing, and species extinction rates are accelerating.
- Changing growing seasons, summer droughts, reduced snowpack, and increased flooding are reducing critical habitat and food sources for many wildlife species.

Many species are shifting ranges and changing migration patterns to adjust to the changes. Climatevulnerable species need help to adapt to rapidly changing conditions.

Solutions

- Promote effective conservation practices and adaptations to make agriculture more resilient to climate impacts.
- Improve resilience to increasing precipitation and flood events that cause nutrient and sediment runoff by avoiding grassland or natural vegetation conversion to row-crop production or urban development.
- Preserve and protect large tracts of land for wildlife, implement habitat management changes to provide food and cover for wildlife that align with expected future climate conditions and adjust harvest regulations for climate-vulnerable species.
- Maintain and expand forest cover and urban tree canopy, targeting lands that offer the greatest potential for continued carbon storage and sequestration.

Positive cases of Covid-19 in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 121 individuals have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) since February 1, 2022 with either a PCR, antigen, or home test. County health officials and local partners are contacting individuals who test positive as able. There have been 6 deaths this year related to COVID-19. This is a snapshot of the numbers as they are continuously changing throughout the day.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to get vaccinated, practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested. If positive, please isolate yourself away from others for 5 days since symptom onset and wear a mask for the 5 days following your release from isolation.

If you are interested in a COVID-19 vaccine, the Forest County Health Department is having a vaccine clinic on Friday, March 4th from 11am-2pm in the county board room located inside the Forest County courthouse. Moderna and Pfizer are being offered.

In an effort to keep our community members upto-date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers every Friday with current COVID-19 case counts as capacity allows. Seasons of Health Spring Kick-Off: Substance Abuse



The Connor Lumber and Land Co. founded Laona, and the reason for the town was this sawmill. This photo of the Connor sawmill was taken about 1912. If you are wondering about the raised "scaffolding" in the photo, they were built so that horses could pull small wagons loaded with lumber out to the piles of lumber that became taller than the raised platforms. In those days, there was no dry kiln. The lumber was air dried, so it was pile with small sticks, called stickers, between each layer of boards to that air could circulate and promote the drying process. Back then, you either worked in the woods or the sawmill or one of the businesses supporting the population of the town.







Senator Baldwin Joins Bipartisan Letter Urging Biden Administration to Designate Ukraine for Temporary Protected Status

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) joined a group of bipartisan colleagues, led by Senators Dick Durbin (D-IL), Bob Menendez (D-NJ), and Rob Portman (R-OH), yesterday in a letter to President Biden urging the Administration to grant Temporary Protected Status (TPS) to Ukrainians in the United States following the Russian military invasion of Ukraine.

"In light of Russia's military invasion of Ukraine, we respectfully request that your Administration promptly take all necessary steps to ensure that Ukrainian nationals present in the United States are not forced to return to Ukraine, including the designation of Ukraine for Temporary Protected Status (TPS)," the Senators wrote. "As you know, TPS can be granted to nationals of another country who are currently residing in the United States if returning to their country would pose a serious threat to their personal safety because of ongoing armed conflict, the temporary effects of an environmental disaster, or other extraordinary and temporary conditions. TPS allows eligible nationals of designated countries to remain in the United States legally until the expiration of the TPS designation."

On February 24, Ukraine declared a state of emergency and closed its airspace to commercial flights after Russia launched a series of unprovoked military strikes against major Ukrainian cities with forces attacking by land, sea, and air. Russian forces have employed hundreds of missiles against military and civilian targets across Ukraine in clear violation of international law, and troops continue to push to overtake major cities, including Kyiv. Ukrainian officials reported that at least 353 civilians have been killed so far since the Russian invasion began. The United States has closed its embassy in Kyiv and all embassy personnel and their family members have left Ukraine in recent weeks.

Established by the U.S. Congress through the Immigration Act of 1990, TPS is a temporary, renewable program that provides relief from deportation and access to a work permit for foreign nationals from certain countries who are unable to return safely to their home country due to natural disasters, armed conflicts, or other extraordinary conditions. The decision to deny, withdraw, or terminate TPS is in the sole discretion of the U.S.

According to the Department of State, 29,510 nonimmigrant visas were issued to Ukrainian nationals in Fiscal Year 2020.



DNR seeking public comment on Draft Wisconsin Walleye Plan

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is seeking public comment now through May 31, 2022, on the state's draft Walleye Management Plan.

The Walleye Management Plan guides all walleye management activities in Wisconsin. One of the most popular sportfish in the state and an important species for the Ojibwe spring tribal harvest, the draft plan outlines present-day goals and management strategies for walleye in Wisconsin.

In 2020, the DNR began updating the plan in partnership with the Tribes of Wisconsin, the Wisconsin Conversation Congress and the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission (GLIFWC). When final, the plan aims to address current management challenges and capitalize on new opportunities. The Walleye Management Plan was last updated in 1998.

Each year, the DNR stocks hundreds of thousands of walleye fingerlings into lakes across the state, surveys walleye populations and walleye anglers, and works on habitat projects to benefit walleye. Those activities are guided by Wisconsin's Walleye Management Plan.



Radiography Tech students at Nicolet 100 percent pass rate on national exam

Three Nicolet College students were part of a Radiography Technology graduating class that recently posted a 100 percent pass rate on American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) national certification exam.

The three Nicolet students were part of the graduating class of 11 in the Radiography Technology program that Nicolet shares with Lakeshore Technical College in Cleveland, Wis.

"We were absolutely thrilled when we found out that all of our students passed the exam," said Candy Dailey, dean of Health Occupations at Nicolet.

ARTT is the world's largest organization offering credentials in medical imaging, interventional procedures, and radiation therapy.

The national average pass rate for this year is not yet available, though since 2018, national pass rates have ranged from 88.2 percent to 89percent.

Lakeshore graduate pass rates during that time ranged from 92.9 to 100 percent and surpassed the national average each of those years.

All of the students who were looking for work found positions before they graduated. The remainder of students transferred to four-year universities to pursue their bachelor's degrees.

"Our radiography graduates continue performing at a high level when testing and out in the workforce where they are in high demand," said Lakeshore President Paul Carlsen. "This class proved to be especially resilient during COVID and we are confident they will provide the best care possible to members of our community."

Lakeshore's Radiography program received an eight-year accreditation by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology in 2018.







Drive to protect workers this construction season

Wisconsin State Patrol's March Law of the Month highlights work zone safety

Construction season in Wisconsin is just around the corner and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation is urging everyone to be prepared to keep crews safe.

The Wisconsin State Patrol's March Law of the Month highlights the rules and guidelines for work zones that aim to protect workers as they repair the roads.

"It's never too early to look for orange barrels," WisDOT Secretary Craig Thompson said. "From big projects to pothole repairs, you can expect to see construction and maintenance workers out in traffic all season. Drive to protect them. Buckle up, phone down."

There have been more than 12,000 crashes in work zones in the past five years. Those incidents led to about 61 deaths and more than 4,700 injuries. Most work zone crashes are caused by speeding, tailgating, and distracted driving.

Cell phone use is one of the most common factors in distracted driving incidents. Wisconsin law forbids texting while driving on any road. It is also illegal to use a hand-held mobile device in work zones. A new state law took effect in December 2021 that expands this ban to areas surrounding emergency response vehicles with flashing lights.

"Work zones require a driver's full and complete attention. Barrels, lane shifts, and traffic backups can appear suddenly. Keep your eyes on the road and move over or slow down to protect construction crews and emergency responders," Wisconsin State Patrol Superintendent Anthony Burrell said.

The state's Move Over law requires drivers to move out of the lane of traffic next to first responders and maintenance workers. If you can't move over, you must slow down.

Fines for traffic violations double in work zones and the consequences for injuring or killing someone in a work zone are even more costly and tragic.

Wisconsin State Patrol asks drivers to be cautious in work zones:

Slow down when approaching construction work. Move over to avoid hitting a worker or equipment. Buckle up, phone down. Every trip. Every time.

Be courteous with other drivers. Follow the zipper merge method to reduce backups, taking turns at the

merge point. Download the 511 app to know before you go. You can monitor construction projects and incidents on your

route. The upgraded 511 conditions map now includes 14,000 miles of roads.


