Conservation Corner

After the latest batch of snow melts, my department will be checking the county woodlands for Garlic mustard. Garlic mustard is an herbaceous biennial plant meaning it has a two-year life cycle. This is an invasive plant in Wisconsin. The first-year plants can more difficult to spot and identify than the second-year plant. There are some first-year garlic mustard look-alikes. Garlic mustard flowers (reached senescence or maturity) as early as April so control and eradication efforts must be performed early in the year. Complete eradication of this woodland invaders, like many other invasive species, can take many years of effort as garlic mustard seeds can remain in the seed bed of the soil.









First-Year Plants

First year plants have leaves that form into clusters of 3-8 rounded to kidney shaped lobes. During the first-year growing season the leaves develop at the ground level. The leaves have scalloped edges and a wrinkled appearance and they remain green all winter.

Second-Year Plants

The flowers appear on this plant in the secondyear growing season. The small flowers are made up of four petals and are found on the end of the main stem and side branches. These flowers can be seen from April through June and are the earliest emerging white flower seen in spring. The leaves of second-year plants are heart

Pa and Ma were always looking for horses, but as I say, they had no truck to transport them. What they would do, when they learned there was a horse that they might buy, was to drive down. -shaped to triangle. The leaves are coarsely toothed along the leaf margin and form in an alternating pattern along the stem. When the leaves are crushed it can produce a garlic odor. Likely the most prominent feature is the 1-4-foot-tall flowering stalks. Seed capsules appear soon after flowering. When ripe the seeds within the capsules are black in color.

Garlic mustard invades upland forests, floodplain forests, savannas, yards, disturbed areas, and roadsides. It prefers shaded areas, but can be found in full sun as well. Invasion of forests usually begins along the wood's edge, and progresses via streams, animal trails, and disturbed areas. This plant exudes antifungal chemicals into the soil that disrupts association between mycorrhizal fungi and native plants, suppressing native plant growth. Garlic mustard outcompetes many tree seedlings due to these characteristics.

Mowing as low as possible before the emergence of flowers can suppress garlic mustard. These plants may still resprout and flower. Woodland owners must monitor the population and repeat mowing. Care must be taken not to mow when mature seeds are present. Educating yourself on mowing times for common invasive species in northern Wisconsin is crucial to eradication efforts rather than increasing the spread.

Hand pulling in early spring before seed set is another viable removal method. If the plants are already flowering it is crucial to place the plants in plastic bags for trash disposal or burning. Bagged plants brought to landfill facilities should be labeled as "INVASIVE PLANTS-APPROVED BY WI DNR FOR LANDFILL." Pull if soil conditions allow for the removal of the S-shaped taproot. Cutting plants at their base just after the flower stalks have elongated but before any flowers have opened. Cutting may have to happen more than once during the growing season. Cutting with sharp shovel or spade below the soil surface is another option.

In some large natural settings fire is utilized but opening up the understory can encourage germination of stored seed in the soil and actually promote the growth of emerging garlic mustard seedlings. A follow up with a simple handheld propane torch can be beneficial. For this reason, burning must be conducted for 3-5 consecutive years in early spring or fall. Burning will control seedlings, but survival of second-year plants is variable depending upon the fire intensity.

Chemical application can be directed to individual plants or broadcast across an infested area. A higher concentration rate can be used on larger plants and denser populations and lesser concentration rates can be used on smaller and less dense populations. If garlic mustard that you wish to treat is mixed with desirable vegetation, applications of herbicides without soil activity in the late fall through early spring can reduce injury to desirable plants since garlic mustard emerges earliest and goes dormant later than most desirable vegetation. Whether applying chemical mixtures yourself or having a professional complete the application in your woodland, it is important to do research on chemicals and the safety concerned for humans and wildlife.

Something to note is that if your property is enrolled in the Managed Forest Law Program (MFL) Forest Certified Group option, there are restrictions on the use and type of pesticides allowed. Pesticide use on MFL Forest Certified Group lands should be reported to WI







"If lifestyle changes are implemented early, the progression to diabetes can hopefully be avoided and in turn mitigate the overwhelming clinical and public health burden it continues to cause."

Know your risk before it's too late to prevent the onset of diabetes. Spare a minute this year on Alert Day and take the Diabetes Risk Test from the official ADA website to get your results online.

Authorized by the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, Regional Clean Hydrogen Hubs will boost economic growth and reduce hydrogen costs by expanding the use of clean hydrogen in the industrial sector and beyond.

"A clean, stable, domestic source of ammoniabased nitrogen fertilizers is extremely important for America's agriculture industry. A Regional Clean Hydrogen Hub focused on the manufacture of green ammonia for fertilizer would allow America's farmers to drastically reduce their carbon footprint while also providing price and supply stability to this critical farm input. We urge you to prioritize green ammonia production through the Regional Clean Hydrogen Hubs," the lawmakers wrote to Secretary of Energy Jennifer Granholm.

The letter was led by Amy Klobuchar (D-MN) and was also signed by Senators Chuck Grassley (R-IA), Tina Smith (D-MN), and Deb Fischer (R-NE).





Upon entering the polling place, the elector shall give his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If an elector is not registered to vote, an elector may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the elector presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

On referenda questions when voting by paper ballot, the elector shall make a cross (X) in the square at the right of "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall make a cross (X) in the square at the right of "no" if opposed to the question. On referenda questions when voting by marksense ballot, the elector shall complete the arrow at the right of "yes" if in favor of the question, or complete the arrow at the right of "no" if opposed to the question. On referenda questions when voting by optical scan ballot, the elector shall fill in the oval at the right of "yes" if in favor of the question, or fill in the oval at the right of "no" if opposed to the question. On referenda questions when voting by touchscreen ballot, the elector shall depress the button next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or depress the button next to "no" if opposed.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Except for touchscreen ballots, if the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in casting his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed endorsement and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The elector shall leave the booth, deposit his or her folded ballot in the proper ballot box, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit, and the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official marksense or optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting devise and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the elector shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The elector shall leave the polling place promptly.
