#### "We are here a bit too soon"



This pair of tundra swans was photographed a few days ago on the Rice Lake Flowage. They were on the little bit of open water available. You can almost hear one of the swans saying to the other; "I told you it was too soon to fly north!"

As far as people go, everyone you talk to is tired of the weather and the intermittent snow storms that have plagued us this spring. It will be nice to complain about the heat and the humidity in the months ahead, and when you do, remember this month of April.

#### Conservation Corner

Trees, shrubs, and other plants that grow directly on the bank of a river are called riparian vegetation. If the area in which riparian vegetation exists is large enough, this area can be considered a riparian buffer. Studies show that riparian buffers significantly reduce pollutant runoff into the lake and provide shelter for many animals. Riparian buffers interrupt the flow of surface water runoff into a lake, forcing water to slow down and soak into the soil.

In some forms, nutrient pollutants that soak into the ground can then be used by plants for growth. In addition to reducing pollutant runoff, the roots of various plants provide structural support for shoreline banks by holding the soil together.

As a landowner, you can take advantage of a Cost-Share program within Forest County. The Land & Water Department will reimburse you for up to 70% of your costs for your project.

Another Cost-Share program deals with old or abandoned wells. Old or unused wells that are not properly abandoned can pose a significant risk to ground water quality. Wells that are left open and unused are at risk of having contaminants drain down into them and into the ground water system. Old drilled wells can develop cracks in the steel casing that can let contaminants through. Older dug wells were often lined with brick or field stone that does not provide a good barrier to prevent contaminants from reaching ground water.

Once contaminants reach the ground water it is difficult, if not impossible to remove them. Contaminated ground water often does not just affect a single well but can affect the water quality in other wells nearby. Old and unused wells pose a safety hazard as well.

Older dug wells can be up to 6 feet across and 50 feet deep or even deeper. Serious injury or worse could result if someone or a pet accidentally fell down into an old well.

So, how do you get started? First, contact a licensed well driller or pump installer to inspect the well and request a written estimate for abandoning the well. All well abandonment projects are required to be completed by a licensed well driller or pump installer. Improperly abandoned wells could result in contamination of ground water resources as well as other nearby wells making them unsuitable for drinking.

There are two types of private drinking water wells commonly found in Forest County: dug wells & drilled wells.

Old dug wells are commonly about 4 feet in diameter and can vary in depth but are usually not deeper than 50 feet. They are usually lined with field stone or brick. The well driller will need to remove the cover and remove all obstructions in the well to make sure good placement of fill material is achieved. Drillers and pump installers also need to make sure that a drilled well is not

## History of Lakes Country Public Library (Part I)

Though it operated without having a home, Lakes Country Public Library opened for business in late 1982. According to Volume III of "The Truth About Townsend: Bust to Boomers" by Kathleen Marie Marsh, in December 1981 Townsend Town Chair Cyril Reininger and Clerk Linda Adamczyk teamed up with Lakewood resident Herman Rodencal in an effort to establish a library. Townsend and Lakewood voters passed a referendum approving the proposal at their annual meetings in April 1982. There were issues to be ironed out, but a final agreement was signed on June 23, 1982.

The original Library Board of Trustees were Herman Rodencal, Sheila Shawn, Linda Adamczk, James Barry, Ruth Zache, Milton Ouellette, and Joan Sackett. Representing Lakewood would be Rodencal, Shaw and Barry; Townsend: Adamczyk, Ouellette and Zache. Sackett was appointed by the Wabeno School District, a seat required by State Statute. The results of elections held at the Board's July meeting in 1983: Herman Rodencal, President; Sheila Shaw, Vice President; Linda Adamczyk, Secretary; and Joan Sackett, Treasurer. Susan Klabak was named as the first Librarian.

As stipulated in the Joint Library Agreement, Townsend and Lakewood would both pay \$1500 annually to fund the library. The Board's first major task was securing a site. Reininger and Adamczyk were both confident Townsend would be chosen; Rodencal wanted it located in Lakewood. The issue was temporarily resolved when the towns agreed to rent a building in Lakewood that was being abandoned by the Forest Service.

When the Federal Government subsequently sold the Forest Service property to Avis Flynn, she moved the building next to her family's Service Station. That forced the Library to relocate. The only place available was the abandoned Duffy's Bar. The roof leaked and the building had a very unpleasant odor, but it had to do. It was repurposed and housed a surprisingly large collection, much of it having been donated by Rodencal.

In April 1984, Susan Klabak rep that, with the assistance of Nicolet Federated Library System, the library was fully operational with 400 registered cardholders.

#### PROTECT YOUR VALUABLE ASH TREES AGAINST EMERALD ASH BORER

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encourages property owners with healthy, valuable ash trees to treat them with insecticide this spring to protect against emerald ash borer. The pest is currently the most damaging threat to trees in Wisconsin, killing more than 99% of the ash trees it infests.

A common first sign of emerald ash borer infestation is woodpecker damage created when birds feed on emerald ash borer larvae beneath the bark of ash trees. Treatment of infested ash trees is more likely to succeed if the trees have low or moderate levels of woodpecker damage. Now is a good time to consider insecticide protection because the treatments are typically done between mid-April and mid-May.

Emerald ash borer was recently found in Bayfield and Lincoln counties for the first time, and has become so widespread that treatments are worth considering anywhere in Wisconsin. The highest risk of infestation is in communities already known to be infested or within 15 miles of a known infestation. The risk is lower elsewhere, but the DNR suspects that there are additional undetected emerald ash borer infestations. You can find more emerald a sh borer detection information at emeraldashborer.wi.gov.

Homeowners can apply some insecticide products, and others must be applied by a certified professional. Review the available options before selecting an insecticide and treatment method. Visit the Wisconsin EAB website and EAB Information Network website for more information about insecticides. Additionally, you can search for a certified arborist at the Wisconsin Arborist Association's website. Other businesses that conduct emerald ash borer treatments may be found online or in a phone book.

Stay informed and be on the lookout for emerald ash borer. Know where the pest has already been found and look for the signs and symptoms of emerald ash borer infestation. Watch ash trees for the following:

light flecking on an ash tree

Woodpecker damage called "flecking," where pieces of bark have been removed while feeding on emerald ash borer larvae beneath the bark. It usually starts up in the canopy and progresses down the tree over the next few years if the tree is not treated.

Sprouts growing from the base or trunk of the tree. Thinning canopy with smaller, pale leaves.

Small (one-eighth inch), D-shaped exit holes in the bark.
Green beetles crawling on the trunk of ash trees during the

## A Drug, Vaping, and Mental Health Crisis

From 2016 to 2020, mental health and substance use data has increased significantly nationwide in most categories. The comparison can be seen below and uses data from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) website from 2016 and 2020:


Also, there is now an e-cigarette epidemic among our youth which is concerning as vaping nicotine products has been identified as a risk factor for future cigarette use. Our community is affected by this epidemic. SAMHSA data did not include questions on nicotine vaping until 2020, as nicotine vaping has increased greatly. In the 2019, the National Youth Tobacco Survey and the Monitoring the Future study, it was indicated that vaping had become prevalent in our youth as the most common nicotine product. Nearly 2/3 of adolescents aged 12-17 used nicotine products in the past month and 63.1% vaped nicotine products.



#### Wisconsin State Patrol now recruiting troopers, inspectors Application window opens today

"It is our mission to continually grow and diversify our team of dedicated, hardworking troopers and inspectors. We want the Wisconsin State Patrol to reflect the population of our state, which is diverse," Superintendent Anthony Burrell said. "We are looking for candidates from all backgrounds and experiences, who have a strong commitment to building relationships in the communities where we live and work across this state. Those who feel a calling to serve the public are welcome in our organization."

In addition to enforcing traffic and criminal laws across Wisconsin, State Patrol officers may serve in specialized roles and units including pilots, K-9 officers, crash reconstruction experts, commercial motor vehicle inspectors, dignitary protection, human trafficking, and drug interdiction.

State Patrol is actively seeking interested candidates from April 11 until July 8. **Requirements and training** 

Qualified candidates must pass physical readiness tests, a background investigation, interview, and pre-employment medical and psychological exams. Applicants accepted into the six-month State Patrol Academy at Fort McCoy

Adamczyk was thrilled; the library had been her dream from the outset. Rodencal was equally excited. His vision of a real local library was about to become reality.

Pam Ellingson replaced Klabak in 1986 as Librarian. In her annual report, she stated that the library had almost 700 users with an annual circulation of over 10,000 books. "The Library is proving to be a great asset to the community," Pam said at the Townsend annual meeting. The next year Townsend offered to donate its deteriorating Town Hall to be used as the Library, but the Board decline the proposal as the building would require expensive repairs and updating.

Instead, the Board voted to build a new library on land donated by Rodencal on Highway 32 in Lakewood. A rancorous feud between Townsend and Lakewood ensued. An infuriated Townsend Town Board terminated the joint agreement, effective December 31, 1987. Hard feelings from that bitter falling-out persisted for over thirty years. The rupture would not be healed until 2020 when Townsend joined Lakewood, Doty, and Riverview in an historic Joint Library Agreement.

Built on the land Rodencal donated in 1987, the current Lakewood Library opened its doors in 1988. A wellbuilt 24X36 structure with a price tag of \$88,000, it was designed by architect and project manager Stanley Bye of Neenah. His total fee was \$3080. The building contractor was Chuck White Builders of Mountain, with several generous in-kind donations by local subcontractors. State Bank of Wabeno financed the construction loan. The bank note on the property was retired quickly, using property taxes from the Town of Lakewood, donations by surrounding towns, private donors, and grants. NO money from Oconto County or the State of Wisconsin was ever used to finance construction of Lakewood Library. From the time it officially opened in 1989, Lakes Country Public Library was a fixture in Lakewood, a facility whose popularity continued to grow. Six years later, it had clearly outgrown its space. ## Conservation Corner Cont. from pg. 1 present in the bottom of the dug well. If so, that will need to

be properly filled before the dug well is filled in.

To properly abandon dug wells, the well can be filled in with clean clay silt clean native clay or silt type soil

filled in with clean clay, silt, clean native clay or silt-type soil (if compacted), concrete, sand-cement grout or bentonite chips. Well Drillers will commonly have excavators with heavy equipment knock in the top 5 feet of the well and place the fill material to abandon these wells.

Drilled wells can commonly vary from 4" to 6" in diameter and vary in depth depending on the location. Drilled wells have a steel sleeve called a "casing" that helps to protect the well from contaminants seeping down into it. Typically, bentonite chips are used for filling in drilled wells. However, neat cement grout, concrete, sand cement grout can also be used. Bentonite chips come in 50-pound bags and are poured out over a screen to keep bentonite dust called "fines" out of the well.

A well driller or pump installer pours the bentonite slowly down into the well to make sure it doesn't "bridge" and allow gaps to occur. Once the well is filled, moisture will cause the bentonite chips to seal the well. The casing can be cut off below the ground surface and either seeded or landscaped over.

A DNR Well Abandonment Report (form #3300-005) must be completed. Be sure to get a copy for your records. It will also be required if you are receiving any cost sharing.







Our fourth year of Backpacks-To-Go has been a busy one. We currently serve 20 children (for a total of 12 families) in the Laona School District for the 2021-22 school year. The bags are filled with nutritious food items that provide one breakfast, one snack and one lunch for each child. It is our hope that this program will help fill the gap of some families not being able to provide all three meals a day on the weekends. However, we only provide food during the school year excluding holidays and breaks, which would be too costly for us to supplement. Also new during the time of Covid, we switched from backpacks to plastic bags for health concerns.

We appreciate the generosity of everyone who has donated monetary contributions, food and backpacks to our program since we began it is greatly appreciated! It was a warm and comfortable home as long as you kept wood in the stove. This is one of the homes in Padus that would have belonged to the Hammes Lumber Company. If you worked there, you could get a company home if there were any available. It looks like rough living these days, and there are some very nice homes in Padus now, but when you worked in a sawmill that was in the wilds of northern Wisconsin, this would have looked like a nice home too!

For those not familiar with the area, Padus was a sawdust town that operated from about 1900 until about 1930. This is a guess, as there isn't much history on the place. It lasted until the trees were cut. It was one of the sawmill towns that sprung up along the C&NW railroad tracks as they laid track north. Padus is between Laona and Wabeno, just a short way from Hwy 32. None of the original buildings are left. The Padus Nicolet Gun Club has a trap range about where a saloon used to sit in Padus. The town was named after a dog that was left there by an itinerant preacher. The story is that

the dog was well liked so they named the settlement after him.

The last resident of the town was the old maid daughter of John Hammes. Annie lived alone in the building that was a hotel, store, post office and the Hammes home. She until just before she died at age 84, in 1965, in the nursing home.


