Camp 5 & the Lumberjack Steam Train begin 2022 season



After sitting out the 2021 season because of covid, the Lumberjack Steam Train will once again be carrying passengers to the Camp 5 Museum Complex.

The ride on Ol' 4-Spot will bring them to the Logging Museum, complete with a working blacksmith shop, along with vintage photos and the tools that were used to provide lumber to an expanding nation.

The Farm Corral will give the visitor a chance to interact with farm animals, along with feeding and petting. The Nature Center gives insight into the ecology of the Northwoods of Wisconsin and is a delight to the eye. A ride on the Green Treasure Forest Tour will give a look at a managed hardwood forest, from the seat of a trolley car, and the visitor gains insight into how a forest can provide the products we use in our life and still maintain its beauty and sustainability.

There is also the Ecology Walk to enjoy, shopping can be done at the Cracker Barrel Store, and later in the growing season, the 7-acre maze.

With all of the things to see and do, the visitor can build up an appetite, and Choo-Choo Cafe will be waiting with delicious hamburgers, hot dogs, deep-fried foods, chips, cold drinks and other taste delights.

The steam train leaves the vintage depot on Hwy 8, on Laona's west side, starting at 10:00 a.m. and each hour until the last run at 1:00 p.m. The last train returns to the depot at 3:00 p.m. Camp 5 is open Tuesday through Saturday.

The charge for adults is \$20, children age 4 to 16 \$8, and there is a family rate for two adults and three or more children ages 4 to 16 of \$60. Children under three have free admission. Seniors age 65 or older receive a \$2 discount from admission, and active duty military servicemen with proper ID receive free admission for them and their families.

The Lumberjack Steam Train will give an insight into how people traveled back in the days of steam trains, and the whole experience will be a delight for the entire family, no matter what the age.

August Henkel was born October 16, 1891 in Germany. He served in the military in 1911. Later, he crossed the ocean and ended up in Wisconsin in search of farmland to settle and raise a family.

He took a job as the team driver with the Flanner-Steger Lumber Company in Blackwell. In 1913, he returned to Germany to bring his intended bride, Emily Monte, to Blackwell.

While there, WWI broke out and August did not have a passport to board the ship. He folded his work papers and put them in his pocket. With everyone rushing to board the ship, when it came his turn, he motioned to the papers in his pocket and was passed through.

August and Emily married married in the Wabeno Lutheran Church, in 1914. Emily took a job in the boarding house, and they became naturalized citizens in 1919.

August purchased his farmland in Blackwell and raised cows, pigs and chickens and put in a huge garden. Children would come to their house with containers for milk, and Emily always had cookies or piece of freshly baked bread for them.





table, the produce is one of the healthiest ways to get all your nutrients.

"Summer is the perfect time to give canned and frozen produce a break – to give our bodies and minds a healthy boost with some fresh fruits and veggies," said Danielle Polega, APNP, a Family Medicine Nurse Practitioner at Aspirus Tomahawk Clinic. "As a bonus, buying them at a farmers market is a fantastic opportunity to support our local farmers."

Aspirus has launched another year of their Fruit and Vegetable Prescription (FVRx) Program which helps provide patients with access to fresh produce. Patients are identified by the Patient-Centered Medical Home team and Health Resource Team as having a need, whether it be food insecurity, low-income, chronic conditions, or lack of access. Eligible patients are given a "prescription" to use at one of many participating farmers markets in the Aspirus service area.

"We know that a diet that's rich in fruits and veggies is healthy for us, but not everyone has the same access to these items," adds Polega. "This program is designed to get more nutritious foods in the hands of more families in our communities."

Oftentimes farmers market vendors provide free tastes of things like raspberries, local jellies, and fruit. The aromas of fresh vegetables and fruits are so wonderful that it makes you want to start planting. You are bound to taste or see something that triggers a smile.

Here are some tips for getting the most from your trip to the farmer's market:

· Go early. You may not need to be among the first arrivals for a weekday market, but weekend markets get busy fast. If you arrive too late, the best pickings may be gone.

• Bring cash and reusable bags. Transactions will go easier if you have a pocket of small bills. Plus, you need sturdy bags to carry your items home.

• Talk to the vendors. The sellers want to talk about their fruits, veggies, and jams. Ask for buying and storing tips. They can often give you recipe ideas too.

Recognizing a Stroke: At any Age

Chaylen Kuklinski woke up one morning and couldn't walk or stand. She managed to get out of bed, crawl outside and lay on the ground with her dog. Her mother eventually found her, and Chaylen was taken to the hospital.

At the age of 36, having a stroke wasn't at the top of life concerns for Chaylen.

She was a young working professional who spent the previous nine years as an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) at Aspirus Wausau Hospital (AWH).

Despite that, she found herself at AWH being told she was having a stroke.

"I didn't believe it until I heard the medical team call for a code stroke," says Chaylen.

She didn't notice any stroke warning signs. She only knew that she couldn't walk.

"Patients don't often realize they're the ones having a stroke. Even people in the medical profession such as Chaylen," says Lisa Ebert, Aspirus Stroke Network Coordinator.

She was eventually flown to UW Madison for a neuroendovascular procedure.

This is common for many patients suffering from an Ischemic or Hemorrhagic stroke.

Recognizing and treating a stroke in a timely manner is critical. Outcomes are much better when treatment is quickly administered. For every minute the brain is deprived of necessary blood flow, 1.9 million brain cells die.

"Fortunately, members of her family knew the signs and symptoms of a stroke and got her medical attention," says Ebert. "Time is critical when one is having a stroke."

Chaylen was eventually transferred back to Wausau where she started her recovery at the AWH Inpatient Rehab Unit.

Today, Chaylen continues her path back to her past life. Her stroke affected the left side of her body and she's left-handed. She's also a self-proclaimed talkative person and the stroke has affected her speech as well.

"I was a hockey player and an EMT. I worked my way up to a paramedic position with Aspirus MedEvac," says Chaylen. "I want to get back to doing those things."

The signs of a stroke often appear suddenly. By knowing the warning signs, you can help get the treatment you or a loved one needs as quickly as possible.

This might not look like much of a house, but according to some of the old timers, this was the first house in Crandon. The Van Zile brothers came to this area seeking their fortune, and built this place. It was located right behind Jerry Hauser's garage, and you can still see the ridge in the ground where it stood.

The Van Zile brothers were Abraham, William, and Charles. Charles married a Mole Lake Chippewa girl and they moved to Minneapolis. William stayed in Crandon, and built the first frame house in town. Abraham, however, actually started the town of Argonne in anticipation of the railroad coming through and building a big switchyard. He did have a false start, building the town of Wall to the east of current Argonne, but when the switch went in on the flats of Argonne, the town was moved and was called Van Zile. Then it was called North Crandon, but in 1921, it became Argonne. EYES – Sudden change in vision

FACE – Sudden weakness on one side of the face or facial droop

ARM – Sudden arm or leg numbness or weakness

SPEECH – Sudden slurred speech, trouble speaking, trouble understanding speech

TERRIBLE HEADACHE – Sudden onset of a terrible headache

Approximately 10-15 percent of all strokes occur in adults aged 18 to 50 years. May is National Stroke Awareness Month and aims to raise awareness about the prevention and treatment of a stroke. Understanding the many risk factors for a stroke could save your life.

"Educate everyone around you," says Ebert. "60 percent of the time it's not the stroke patient that notices they are having a stroke. It's children, grandchildren, friends."

Chaylen continues to work on her rehab. She's working her way back a little bit each day.
