World Wetlands Day is celebrated each year on February 2nd to raise awareness about wetlands. Why do we have a World Wetlands Day? We do to establish awareness that nearly 90% of the world's wetlands have been degraded since the 1700s, and we're losing wetlands three times faster than forests.

Freshwater is rare. Wetlands provide most of it.

- Only 2.5% of water on earth is freshwater, mostly stored in glaciers and aquifers.
- Less than 1% is usable, 0.3% is found in wetlands such as rivers and lakes.
- Wetlands store more carbon than forests.
- Peatlands cover 3% of our planet yet store around 30% of all land- based carbon.
- · Coastal wetlands like mangroves sequester and store carbon up to 55 times faster than tropical rain forests.

Wetlands help us cope with storms and flooding. • 60% of humanity lives and works in coastal areas.

- Saltmarshes, mangroves, seagrass beds and coral reefs shield coastal communities in extreme weather.
- Inland, a single acre of wetland can absorb up to 1.5 million gallons of floodwater.

Wetlands are a source of livelihoods and food.

· More than a billion people live from fishing, aquaculture and tourism Wetland paddies provide rice for 3.5 billion people.

Last Friday, the Mole Lake Tribal Council welcomed officials from the Town of Nashville and nine area organizations to present donations totaling \$92,523.30.

Under the terms of the Class III 2003 Amended Gaming Compact between the Tribe and the State of Wisconsin, the Tribe may direct a portion of its annual payments to the State or to any local government(s) with whom the Tribe has entered into a written agreement regarding the use of said funds.

Chairman Robert VanZile, Jr. welcomed the attendees and spoke wholeheartedly of partnerships and cooperative efforts.

"It's important that all of us work together with one another. We all have the same reasons and concerns about the water, the fish, the plants, the animals. We all share that. Look outside and see the snow - we have snowmobilers coming. They come to your lakes. They come to your towns and cities. Tourism dollars. We need to expound on that. ... We need to be able to work with one another," said Chairman VanZile.

Presenting the donations were the newly elected and incumbent members of the Tribal Council, including: Robert VanZile, Jr., Chairman; Robert J. Smith, Jr., Vice Chairman; Sonya Knueppel, Treasurer; Rachel DeCorah Toyebo, Secretary; Leelyn VanZile, Councilman I; and Caleb McGeshick, Councilman II.

"We don't need colors to distinguish us; we have the same goals," Chairman VanZile said. "We want to make the fish bigger and better. We want to work with one another. We want to have this relationship with you. We choose to work with you if you choose to work with us. If we work together, the three counties, the towns and the lakes associations, we will be the beneficiaries."

Chairman VanZile ended his remarks by saying, "I wanted to be able to say this in a kind and respectful way, and I thank you all for coming today."

Various people representing the organizations who received donations spoke to the Council Members and others in attendance, thanking the Sokaogon Chippewa Community for their generosity.

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




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
Congratulations to junior, Elias Glinski, on his 100th win!

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DMV offers info on obtaining an ID to vote in the Spring primary

Start the process now for a free ID to vote

Ahead of the Wisconsin Spring primary on February 21, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) reminds voters how to obtain identification, free of charge, that is valid for voting.

Valid identification for voting purposes includes a driver license, identification card, military or student ID card, etc. There is no separate "voter ID." A federally compliant REAL ID card is not required for voting purposes. Anyone unsure if their identification meets the requirements should visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website to

To obtain identification to show at the polls for voting, begin online. A list of the required documents to bring to a DMV Customer Service Center is available at wisconsindmy.gov. If the required documents needed for an ID are not readily available, DMV has a process, called the Voter ID Petition Process (IDPP), to obtain the necessary information. This process, available free of charge, may be used to quickly obtain a receipt valid to take to the polls for voting while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained.

Anyone with questions related to obtaining an ID to vote should call DMV's tollfree Voter ID hotline at (844) 588-1069. Questions regarding voter eligibility, poll locations, voter registration information or other election information can be directed to the Wisconsin Elections Commission at elections.wi.gov.

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

Everyone has a story or memory about a favorite tree or forest. Whether climbing trees, jumping in leaf piles, touring fall colors, visiting forested campgrounds, or making maple syrup, trees are a big part of our northern way of life. It turns out that trees are also a nature-based solution to help address climate change. Trees absorb carbon, an important greenhouse gas, and currently, U.S. forests take up 12% of our carbon pollution. We could increase that amount to 22% by 2030 by carefully managing existing forests, and planting more trees.

These are great ideas, but one important issue needs consideration. Non-native forest pests and diseases interfere with the ability of forests to absorb carbon. Insects like emerald ash borer beetles, spongy moths, and oak wilt are already in Wisconsin and worsening. Researchers have found that trees impacted by insect pests sequester or trap 69% less carbon than healthy ones, while trees suffering from disease sequester 28% less carbon. The combined impacts of current insects and diseases in the U.S. reduce carbon capture potential by 50 million tons annually - the same as the emissions produced by an astonishing 10 million cars!

So, what can you do as an individual? Take care of the trees and forests on your property to prevent spread. Learn how to identify and prevent forest health issues, and what to do with any problems found. Support local, state, and national efforts to maintain forest health with carbon sequestration as a goal. You can also support the Citizens Climate Lobby (CCL; citizensclimatelobby.org) and the new Healthy Forests policy initiative. CCL is a national, nonpartisan, nonprofit organization promoting action to reduce greenhouse gases.

Baldwin. Sullivan Introduce Bipartisan Legislation to Help Veterans Access Earned Benefits

Of the 19 million veterans, less than half are enrolled in VA Health Care System and only five million were receiving disability compensation

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Today, U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwins (D-WI) and Dan Sullivan (R-AK) introduced the Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act to expand a community-based outreach program that helps veterans learn about and access their earned benefits. The legislation would expand and support County Veterans Service Officers (CVSO), the community-based employees who work directly with veterans to inform them of eligibility for Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) programs and services, file pension and compensation claims, and help them enroll in job, housing, disability, and education benefits. CVSOs play an outsized role in helping veterans in rural, native, and other hard-to-reach communities connect with VA services.

Out of the estimated 19 million veterans in the United States, only a small fraction utilize the care and benefits they are entitled to. As of 2020, nine million veterans were enrolled in the VA Health Care System, five million were receiving disability compensation, and three million were active VA home loan participants.

"We have a commitment to do right by the troops who defended our country, and that includes helping them get the benefits and support that they have earned," said Senator Baldwin. "Unfortunately, too many veterans do not, or are not able, to access the health care and support services they have worked for, particularly those in our rural and Native communities. This bipartisan legislation will help reach our veterans where they are and connect them with local advocates to get the benefits and support that they are owed."

"Less than half of Alaska's more than 75,000 veterans are currently enrolled in the VA system, meaning a majority are not accessing the benefits and health care services that they have earned, including those struggling with mental illness. That is unacceptable," said Senator Sullivan. "Alaska's vast size and sparse population certainly contribute to this challenge, but local partners and veteran service officers present an opportunity to reach these off-the-grid veterans. Senator Baldwin and I are introducing legislation that will reinforce the VA's mission to expand its reach and ensure veterans who live in rural, frontier states-like Alaska-do not get left behind."

Specifically, the legislation would authorize \$50 million annually for five years to hire more CVSOs and support current officers or similar local entities through a competitive grant program. By increasing the number of CVSOs, states will also be better able to leverage their local and federal resources to serve our veterans.

"This act would benefit CVSOs as most offices are working on a shoestring budget," said Ali Nelson, President of the County Veterans Service Officers of Wisconsin. "Additional funding would help us to do more outreach to Veterans, especially regarding the new benefits and eligibility resulting from the PACT Act."

The legislation is supported by the National Association of Counties, the National Association of County Veteran Service Officers, the Wisconsin and Alaska Departments of Veterans Affairs, the Wisconsin State Association of County Veterans Service Commissions and Committees, the Wisconsin Association of Counties, and the National Association of State Directors of Veterans Affairs.

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
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
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

Human activities are driving wetland degradation.

- Wetlands are being drained and filled in for agriculture and urban construction.
- Water pollution and over-shing are harming wetland ecosystems, along with invasive species.

Wetland species are facing extinction.

- One in three freshwater species and 25% of all wetland species face actual extinction from wetland decline.
- 81% of inland wetland species and 36% of coastal and marine species have declined in the last 50 years.

A well restored wetland can provide many of the services performed by the original natural wetland. Here are seven ways restored wetlands can bene t us directly:

1. Improve livelihoods Wetlands create livelihoods in

- fishing and aquaculture, and also provide goods like reeds and grasses. These opportunities often benefit indigenous populations.
- 2. Revive biodiversity 40% of the world's species live or breed in wetlands. Restoring wetlands powers the local food chain and attracts wildlife.
- 3. Blunt the impact of floods and storms Restored wetlands can act as sponges against excess rainfall and flooding, buffer coastal storm surges, and can shield communities in extreme weather.
- 4. Store carbon Specific types of wetlands, especially peatlands, mangroves, intertidal marshes and seagrass beds are exceptionally efficient carbon sinks.
- 5. Replenish and filter water supply Wetlands naturally filter water, remove pollutants and boost the local water supply.
- 6. Boost eco-tourism
- A restored wetland can be a sustainable magnet for visitors; a natural attraction that draws tourists along with opportunities to serve them.
- 7. Enhance well-being

Revitalized wetlands provide a place to relax, experience nature – and enjoy sense of satisfaction at their resurgence.

She also complimented Poppy Chair Mary Ellen Krizek and her volunteers who raised over \$2600 in the annual Poppy Fund Drive. Their success enabled the Unit to support the needs of local veterans, Wisconsin VA hospitals, Camp American Legion, female veteran homeless shelters, just to name a few.

One of the most rewarding Auxiliary endeavors that has been carried out annually for almost two decades is using poppy funds for its Christmas Cash Contribution. This program gives a \$50 cash stipend to veterans living at Lakewood Assisted Living and The Bay at NuRoc Center in Blackwell. Kathleen Marsh and her husband Jon continue the tradition of visiting these veterans in person sometime between Veterans Day and Christmas. "What a wonderful gesture," Social Activities Director Cindy Behling said. "The Auxiliary's donations and these visits really brighten the holiday season for our heroes."

Overcoming complications due to the Covid Pandemic, Unit #44 also continued another of its key missions: sponsorship of Wabeno High School and Laona High School junior girls as delegates to Badger Girls State held each summer at University of Wisconsin Oshkosh.
