My snow has fleas!

With the recent snows, I began noticing little black spots in my tracks. Upon closer examination, I saw that most of these black spots were moving. With further research, I learned that these black spots are commonly known as "snow fleas". They are not true fleas, but belong to a primitive group of insects known as springtails in the order Collembola. Springtails are among the most abundant of all soil-dwelling arthropods.

Uniquely adapted to survival in cold temperatures, they are able to synthetize an anti-freeze like protein that allows them to function in sub-zero temperatures. During the rest of the year, these creatures simply blend in amongst fallen leaves where they scavenge upon decaying materials and help with nutrient recycling.

Their flea-like common name is derived from their ability jump using a spring-like appendage called a furcula to propel themselves into the air. Continued on page 13





Final details set for Musky Seminar March 25 and April 1 at Nicolet College

The many tactics to catch one of the most prized gamefish in northern Wisconsin will be the focus when the Outdoor Adventure program at Nicolet College holds its Musky Seminar March 25 and April 1.

"If there's a secret to catching muskies regularly, it's putting together a whole bunch of little things and doing them correctly," said Fishing Hall of Fame inductee Steve Heiting, who will be the lead presenter at the seminar.

Participants can attend one or both days with the seminar running from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each Saturday in Northwoods Center 208 and 209 on the Nicolet Campus.

Ten different presentations are planned for the two-day event with numerous new topics that focus on how and when to use a variety of different musky baits.

"We've decided to go all-in with specific lure techniques Again, congratulations on your nomination. and secrets," Heiting said. "Musky fishermen love buying Nominees are submitted by industry peers, which is a new lures, and our seminars are geared toward helping

Now, instead of having to play basketball games in the old Woodmen Hall, there was a nice modern gym to play in and hold other events, like graduation. The new additions were no doubt necessary for the continuing education of the young people, but they certainly ruined the looks of this lovely old school.

Snow fleas do not bite and are harmless to humans and wildlife. They feed on decaying plant material and bacteria in the soil. Although present throughout the year, they are most likely to be noticed when they are crawling about on white snow.

Once the snow flea senses things are beginning to thaw, it moves from its mud-bound home to feed on algae and fungi in snow. If you have a compost pile in your background, chances are you've seen them.

They have no interest in humans. They have no interest in your pets. They may prefer things really, really

They are very much important in our ecosystem to distribute the nutrients ... and they can help to keep the microbes' populations in check.

Snow fleas along with a myriad of other minute soil insects, fungi and microbes are an important component of healthy soil. Unseen but vital; Dr. Andrew Moldenke a researcher at Oregon State University once noted "Every time you take a step in a mature Oregon forest, your foot is being supported on the backs of 16,000 invertebrates held up by an average of 120,000 legs." It is much the same here in northern Wisconsin.

Occasionally, in dry weather periods, snow fleas may migrate into homes and other outbuildings. Although they don't pose any threat to the structures or inhabitants, their presence may be cause for concern.

These creatures are truly a winter curiosity if you haven't encountered them before. The next time you're out snowshoeing or cross-country skiing, keep an eye out for these tiny acrobats on the snow.

March is Endometriosis **Awareness Month**

March is Endometriosis Awareness Month, and Aspirus Health wants women to be aware of important health symptoms they should not ignore.

Endometriosis is a condition in which the tissue that forms the lining of the uterus (the endometrium) is found outside the uterus. It's most common in women in their 30s and 40s, but endometriosis can happen in anyone with menstrual periods. According to the Office on Women's Health (OWH), researchers believe it may affect at least 11 percent of women.

Diagnosis & Treatment

The condition can cause a myriad of uncomfortable symptoms, including chronic pelvic pain, painful bowel movements, heavy menstrual bleeding, pain during intercourse, digestive problems and infertility.

"If someone is experiencing pelvic pain of any kind, especially during and around menstrual time, when using the bathroom and/or during intercourse, they should discuss with their OB/GYN," says Evon Schexnaydre, MD, Board Certified OB/GYN at Aspirus Rhinelander Clinic - N Shore Dr. "It could be a sign that something else is going on, since endometriosis symptoms can mimic other conditions, so it's best to come in for an exam so we can determine a proper diagnosis and next steps for treatment."

Treatment options vary and depend on the extent of the disease and the symptoms, and whether the patient wants to grow their family. Endometriosis may be treated with medication, surgery, or both. When pain is the primary problem, medication usually is tried first.

"Medication may include pain medications, birth control to prevent menstrual cycles and reduce the amount of menstrual bleeding when a period occurs, or special medications to suppress the ovaries from ovulating and menstrual bleeding temporarily. In some cases, surgery is needed but should be discussed with your provider," explained Dr. Schexnavdre.

Risk Reduction

Endometriosis cannot be prevented, but there are ways to lower estrogen levels, the hormone that helps to thicken the lining of your uterus during your menstrual cycle, and reduce the chances of developing the condition. To keep lower estrogen levels in your body. OWH offers the following suggestions:

- Talk to your provider about hormonal birth control methods, such as pills, patches or rings with lower doses of estrogen.
- Exercise regularly (more than four hours a week). This will also help you keep a low percentage of body fat. Regular exercise and a lower amount of body fat help decrease the amount of estrogen circulating through the
- · Avoid large amounts of alcohol. Alcohol raises estrogen levels. No more than one drink per day is recommended for women who choose to drink alcohol.

 Avoid large amount of drinks with caffeine. Studies show that drinking more than one caffeinated drink a day, especially sodas and green tea, can raise estrogen levels.

This is the reason that many families can say they are or were from Newald. The Cleereman-Jauqet Lumber Company moved there from the Green Bay area around 1911, when the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad finally laid tracks this far north.

The Jauget family opted out as the years went by, but Bill Cleereman continued on, and built a new sawmill just a bit north along the railroad tracks. The sawmill business was given up by the Cleereman family eventually, but the family is still tied to sawmills. Francis Cleereman invented the Cleereman sawmill carriage, and it worked better than anything on the market. To date, about 1235 of these carriages have been built, and now the business is in to a lot of other sawmill machinery. They currently employ about 50 people in Forest County both in Newald and their new installation in Crandon.

Tips to Spring Forward to Daylight Saving Time

National Sleep Awareness Week is March 12-18

When Daylight Saving Time (DST) begins on March 12, people across the country will set their clocks forward and lose an hour of slumber. As the sun begins to set later in the evening and the sight of spring peeks through after the long winter months, one hour of sleep seems like an easy trade-in.

However, the American Academy of Sleep Medicine (AASM) warns that the one-hour loss can throw off the body's internal clock, or circadian rhythm, and have negative health and safety effects in the days that follow. The circadian rhythm is a 24-hour cycle that is closely aligned with the sun's daily cycle. It regulates sleep and other key bodily functions such as body temperature, appetite, digestion, and mood. During DST, the local clock time changes, but the timing of sunrise and sunset remains the same. This causes a misalignment between your body clock, the sun time, and local clock time.

"An abruption to the circadian rhythm can affect physical, mental, and behavioral processes. For the body to reset each day and receive high quality sleep, our internal clock relies on the light-darkness cycle to release a hormone that makes the body feel tired and sleepy called melatonin," says Kate Blaubach, AspirusPolysomnographic Technologist. "On the days leading up to the time change, it's important to practice good sleep hygiene."

The AASM suggests taking the following steps to help your body prepare for the time change:

Get at least seven hours of sleep (for adults) or eight hours of sleep (for teens) per night before and after the time change. You can use the AASM's bedtime calculator to identify an appropriate nightly bedtime.

Gradually adjust your sleep and wake times. Shift your bedtime 15 to 20 minutes earlier each night for a few nights before the springtime change, or 15 to 20 minutes later each night for a few nights before the fall time change. (If you are experiencing chronic insufficient sleep, you should avoid shifting your bedtime later before the fall time change; you will benefit from getting an "extra" hour of sleep on the night when you "fall back" to standard time.)

Adjust other daily routines — such as mealtimes — to match your new schedule prior to the time change.


Set your clocks to the new time on Saturday evening and go to bed at your normal bedtime.

Use light and darkness to help your body adjust. In the spring, head outside for some sunlight on Sunday morning and dim the lights in the evening. In the fall, minimize light exposure until your target morning wake time. Adjusting your exposure to light and darkness will help set your body clock, which regulates the timing of sleep and alertness.

Get plenty of sleep on Sunday night to ensure you're rested and ready for the week ahead.
