Conservation Corner

Along with trilliums and trout lilies, invasive garlic mustard has become another harbinger of spring in Wisconsin. Right now, the pesky plant is popping up along roadsides, trails and streams, (at least, in Southern Wisconsin) carpeting fores floors and taking hold wherever it finds open ground or disturbed soils.

Garlic Mustard plant

First-year plants, called basal rosettes, appear as serrated, round-leaved ground cover. Long, 1- to 4-foot stems bolt from second-year plants, sporting spring clusters of tiny, white, fourpetaled flowers. Crushing the leaves or stem releases the plant's telltale garlic odor.

A small patch of garlic mustard plants with serrated, heart shaped leaves and small, white flowers. Anyone who has experience managing a garlic

mustard infestation is familiar with its persistence. Hand-pulling is the most common method of control and can yield bags and bags of plant material

that spread easily to start new patches. Garlic mustard exhibits habits common to successful invaders. It gets an early start and covers a lot

each spring. Plants can produce hundreds of tiny seeds

of ground, ensuring it will out-compete most native plants. Continued on page 3





It's not picky about where it puts down roots. Sun, shade, moist or dry soils - it seems anywhere is suitable for this widespread plant. Garlic mustard has one more tool in its toolbelt – allelopathy – the ability to release chemicals that can limit or prevent the growth of other plants.

Native to Europe, garlic mustard is an herb with both food and medicinal uses. It was brought to the United States intentionally by settlers in the 1800s. Without its native predators, garlic mustard thrives here relatively unchecked.

The plant is a favorite of "invasivores" - a term combining "invasive species" and "devour" to characterize one who eats invasive species, according to Invasivore.org. Its garlic flavor can season soups, meats and sauces, and its leaves and stems can be added to salads or used as a garnish.

Though the goal of using, instead of wasting, edible invasive species is worthy, unfortunately, it hasn't made a dent in the invasive plant's population, leaving invasive species managers looking for new solutions.

What if there was a creature out there that just loved to eat garlic mustard? Thanks to Rebecah Troutman, a natural areas biologist at Holden Forests and Gardens in Ohio, we now know there is.

While pulling garlic mustard at Holden in 2021, Troutman noticed a plant covered with tiny insects. "I did some Googling and made a preliminary identification of the garlic mustard aphid, Lipaphis alliarae," said Troutman. "I then sent a sample to Doris Lagos-Kutz, research associate at the U.S. Department of Agriculture, who confirmed it was the first official sighting of the European aphid in the U.S."

The garlic mustard aphid is a small, dark gray to green insect sometimes called the "grenade" aphid due to the pattern of raised blotches on its back. It sucks sap from garlic mustard plants, causing puckered, yellowed or wilting leaves and twisted seed pods.

Garlic Mustard Aphids

Troutman communicated her find to the Midwest Invasive Plant Network, where coordinator Michelle Beloskur is helping spread the word in hopes of finding more places where the garlic mustard aphid is already at work.

"Since 2021 we've identified isolated populations in Connecticut, Massachusetts, Michigan,



Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin," said Beloskur. "We're seeing impacts like shorter plants, fewer and twisted seed pods, and less overall biomass at these sites. It appears that even a small number of aphids can affect plant growth."

This spring, Beloskur and Troutman hope to identify more garlic mustard aphid locations to better understand the aphid's range and impact, and they're

A final reminder, when removing garlic mustard, be sure to double-bag all plant material and place bags in sunlight for a few days to allow plants to decompose before disposal. Composting is not recommended, as seeds can remain viable.



Wisconsin Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week is April 17-21 Statewide Tornado Drill April 20

MADISON, Wis. - Spring has returned to Wisconsin and so has an increased risk of severe weather. To encourage everyone to be prepared for tornadoes, thunderstorms and flooding, Gov. Tony Evers has declared April 17-21 Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week in Wisconsin, along with statewide tornado drills on April 20.

Wisconsin averages 23 tornadoes annually. In 2022, the National Weather Service (NWS) confirmed 28 tornadoes touched down in the state, damaging homes, trees, and power lines.

Tornadoes and severe storms can develop quickly, so know what to do and where to seek shelter.

To stay safe during severe weather, ReadyWisconsin encourages people to do the following:

- Create an emergency plan and practice it.
- Know where designated shelters are located at home, work, and school, and be ready to go there when a tornado warning is issued.
- · Have multiple ways to receive alerts about approaching severe weather. Outdoor warning sirens, NOAA Weather Radios, local media, and smart phone apps are all important tools. Don't rely on any single source for important lifesaving information. · If you have a mobile device, make sure it is enabled to
- receive Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA). On many devices, that option is available in the settings menu. Find out more about WEA at https://readywisconsin.wi.gov/beinformed/be-alert/.
- Stay weather aware by checking the daily forecast for your area.
- Create an emergency kit for your home. Find making a kit at https://readywisconsin.wi.gov.

Wisconsin's annual statewide tornado drills will take place on April 20, 2023 at 1:45 p.m. and 6:45 p.m., offering an opportunity to practice your tornado sheltering plans. Schools, businesses, and homes are encouraged to practice going to their nearest tornado shelter during the drills, as if there were an actual tornado warning in effect. During the drill times, Wisconsin's NWS offices will conduct NOAA Weather Radio tests that can be heard if you are actively listening to those devices or have one programmed to activate on test alerts. Many communities may also choose to test their outdoor warning sirens during drill times. Check with local emergency management offices for information on siren testing schedules.

If there is a threat of severe weather in Wisconsin on April 20, the statewide drills will be postponed until Friday, April 21. The drills will go on in all other conditions, including non severe weather (clouds, rain, dark sky, scattered thunderstorms, etc.). If severe weather is also expected on Friday, the drills will be cancelled.

Notification of the drill status will be posted at http://readywisconsin.wi.gov by 10 a.m. on the morning of April 20.

Dr. Daniel Thomas

Boatright Jr. passed away on Thursday, April 6, 2023, after complications from surgery due to underlying medical conditions. Daniel was born to Daniel Thomas Sr. and Jessie Louise on December 20th, 1951 in McAlester, Oklahoma. He was preceded in death by both parents and his sister, Dorothy McGee.



A registered member of the Cherokee Nation and a lifelong Oklahoman, Dr. Boatright was known for his boundless curiosity, his intellect, his humor, his keen sense of absurdity, and his deep commitment to family and friends. He was a modern-day "renaissance man"- a storyteller, a playwright, a scientist, a musician, an actor, a dancer, a chef, an engineer, an artist, and an educator to all

Dr. Boatright graduated from McAlester High School in 1970 and earned a B.S. in Environmental Health from East Central State College, an M.S. in Environmental Health Engineering and a Ph.D. in Environmental Systems Management from the University of Oklahoma.

After completion of his Ph.D., Dr. Boatright spent most of his exemplary career in academics, retiring from the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center in July 2016. Over his 26-year tenure, he served as Senior Associate Dean and Presidential Professor of Occupational and Environmental Health in the College of Public Health and directed over 50 Master of Science students and 18 Ph.D. and DrPH candidates.

Dr. Boatright directed the graduate program in Public Health Preparedness and Terrorism Response and was Principle Investigator and Director of the Southwest Center for Preparedness and Emergency Response Learning Center (a program funded by the Centers for Disease Control) and the Public Health Training Center (a program funded by the Health Resources Services Administration). He was also a member of the Medical Reserve Corps and led teams in many natural disasters, including the Oklahoma City bombing in 1995 and Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

Dr. Boatright held Visiting Scientist credentials at Los Alamos National Laboratory for over 15 years, was a Fellow of the Royal Society for Public Health in the United Kingdom, and was a member of Delta Omega Public Health Honor Society. Prior to joining the University in 1990, he spent over 15 years in the private sector in the field of environmental health engineering working with a wide array of local, state and federal agencies, especially the U.S. Public Health Service, Indian Health Service. Dr. Boatright maintained an endless commitment to public health, and during the COVID-19 pandemic came out of retirement, despite the risk, to advise the Oklahoma State Department of Health.

After retiring, "Grandpa Dan" found great joy in diverse activities. He was passionate about creative writing and found time to author and direct plays, performed extensively in community theater, and participated in all facets of the performing and visual arts. In retirement, he divided his time between Norman, Oklahoma and Wabeno, Wisconsin where he was happiest while buried in the chaos of his study, sipping wine during jam sessions at the Bistro, or just existing somewhere with a dog and a book nearby. He sang in the bass section of Norman's First Christian Church Choir, traveled extensively with his wife Linda, made wine, cooked, baked, played the Ukulele and other stringed instruments, and, in his words "struggled to complete the endless list of tasks enthusiastically provided by his lovely wife."

Daniel is survived by his wife, Linda, who was the center of his life, his source of joy and companionship, and for whom his love was unwavering. He is also survived by his children Jennifer, John and Christi Robberson, and James and Kelly Robberson; grandchildren Jackson, Tim, Everett, Emily, Asher, Caedon, Alina, Bella and Jaycee; and brothers and sisters in-law: Diane and David Margenau of Minnesota and Danny and Donna Youstra of Texas; as well as an extensive "family" of colleagues and friends with whom he managed to keep in close contact.

The world will have less light, insight, and laughter without Daniel in it, and he will be dearly missed.

A memorial service for Dr. Boatright will be held on Saturday, April 15, 2023, at 1 p.m. at First Christian Church in Norman, Oklahoma. In lieu of flowers and gifts, donations can be made to Second Chance Animal Rescue of Norman, OK.
