No Mow May is a growing movement in Wisconsin and across the United States that encourages homeowners to leave their lawns uncut during the month of May. The initiative aims to promote biodiversity and sustainable landscaping practices by allowing native plants and wildflowers to grow and provide food and habitat for pollinators and other wildlife.

The idea behind No Mow May is simple: instead of mowing your lawn every week, let it grow wild and see what happens. By doing so, you are creating a mini-ecosystem that supports a variety of native plants and animals. Native plants, such as milkweed, black-eyed Susan, and goldenrod, are essential for pollinators like bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds. These plants provide food and habitat for these important species, which are critical for the health of our ecosystems and the food supply.

When is a permit required in Forest County?

The purpose for our General Zoning Ordinance is to promote the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare; more specifically, to fix reasonable standards to which structures shall conform, to regulate lot coverage and population density; to conserve the value of land and structures in all of the unincorporated areas of the county and to promote safety and efficiency of the streets and highways to provide for adequate light, air sanitary and drainage, and to conserve natural resources. Additionally, in the shoreland, the purpose is to protect the public trust in navigable waters by controlling water pollution; to protect spawning grounds, fish and aquatic life and to preserve and restore shoreland vegetation and natural scenic beauty.

Forest County Zoning administers the Shoreland Zoning Ordinance in all areas of Forest County that are within a shoreland boundary.

This boundary is any area within 300 feet of a river, stream, or creek and any area within 1000 feet of a pond or lake.

This is regardless of whether or not your township has adopted county zoning.

Zoning Permits Cont. from pg. 1

This office administers the General Zoning Ordinance in all areas outside of the shoreland boundaries in the townships of:

•Argonne •Town of Crandon •Hiles •Lincoln •Nashville Wabeno

A Zoning/Land Use permit is required for any development in the above shoreland and general areas. The cost or size of the project has no bearing on the requirement to get a permit. The fact that the structure is not permanently attached to the ground also has no bearing, even the canopy shelters require permits.

Development is defined as: Any man- made change to improved or unimproved real estate.

Development may include construction of sidewalks, retaining walls, driveways, patios and fire pits. If you move a pre-built shed onto your property or a shipping container for storage a permit is required.

Permits are also required for any excavating or land daughter of Amellia disturbance. If you disturb an acre of land or more you will need a Stormwater Permit through the DNR.

Nothing beats real-world, on-the-job experience when honing professional skills.

Many Nicolet College students got as close to that as possible when they recently participated in two different simulation training scenarios that closely mimicked real world situations.

The first exercise, called the Burn Sim, had students team up with professionals in their area of expertise to extract and treat burn victims from a simulated house fire. The second simulation, the Partners in Health: Northwoods Mental Health Sim conducted in partnership with Wisconsin Northern Highland Area Health Education Center (AHEC), had teams

No matter emergency, professionals from several different Crandon Senior Crandon Senior fields will often need to work together efficiently and effectively to give the patients the highest level of care possible," said Jolene Guenthner, Nicolet Medical Assistant Program director and Instructor.

"We wanted students to experience that before they graduate. It's often a high-stress situation. Everyone needs to keep a level head, use the training that they have received, and communicate effectively as the patient moves from team to team, from stage to stage of the treatment protocol."

For the Burn Sim, the multi-faceted exercise started with a 911 call to report two individuals trapped inside a burning building, prompting a response by Firefighters, who then entered the college's smoke-filled Burning Building to extract the victims.

It's perfectly fine to can issue fines of double the permit fee and also refer violations to the County for issuance of citations.

If you question at all the need for a permit, it is best to call the zoning office for guidance. If you start the project before procuring your permit you will be subject to an afterthe fact fee of \$1000 + the cost of the permit.

If you neglect to get a permit after attempts from this office for compliance, Forest County does issue everyone who kept hope for citations of which the fine is \$500 + \$100 per day the violation exists.

Failure to abide by the terms of placement of a structure as allowed in a land use permit as issued by the zoning office may be subject to the issuance of a fine up to \$20,000.00

Was it her lifelong plan to graduate at an early age? Actually, the journey started only a few years ago in her hometown of Crandon. By the time Ackley was in eighth grade, she had exceled through all the math courses available at her middle school. School leaders moved her into a high school course.

'That one class opened the door for me to start taking college courses once I was in high school," said Ackley. "I took advantage of the opportunity immediately. I loved that class and knew I needed to take more." At the time, her high school did not offer many college courses or help cover the cost. But she took the initiative to find classes that would fit both the needs for her future career in accounting and her high school requirements.

Her hard work and perseverance paid off, with Ackley finishing high school in just two years. At age 16, she graduated and moved to Stevens Point to pursue her bachelor's degree at UW-Stevens Point. She followed in the footsteps of her aunt, Megan Gerber, '07, who also studied accounting.

Ackley did not plan to finish her undergraduate degree in two years. But a year ago, while sitting in class, she listened to seniors talking about their graduation, which got her thinking.

"I hadn't really considered when my graduation would be," she said. "At first, when I looked at completing in another year, I was like, no way. But after a bit, I thought, why not? So I sat down with Professor Bo DeDeker and devised a plan. It was an aggressive schedule, but I knew I was up for it."

Once the plan was in place, Ackley also checked with Institutional Research about how many other students in the university's history had graduated at a young age. She learned she would set records by completing the rapid path to graduation. That was a motivating factor for her.

The schedule required Ackley to take classes yearround and maximum credit loads in the Sentry School of Business and Economics. She also took courses from other institutions and had the credits transferred to UW-Stevens Point. "Due to classes not always aligning with the schedule, I needed to take some external courses. But they all transferred in and helped me to meet my deadline," she said.

While at UW-Stevens Point, she was involved with the Native American Center, Toastmasters and Chi Alpha. She has also worked up to 50 hours weekly at Laona State Bank since 2021 and runs her own business as a microblading artist.

DeDeker, an assistant professor of accounting, said he was honored to teach and advise Ackley.

"Madison is an amazing student, who has applied and worked hard to obtain success " he said She is a direct descendant of the Great Chief Ackley, the last hereditary Chief of the Sokaogon Chippewa. Chief Ackley was known as a true leader of the people. He represented the Great Spirit and taught many what it means to be a good person. I have found that Madison has her great-great grandfather's spirit within her." What is next for the student who has completed through high school and college in record time? She is planning a trip to Israel with Chi Alpha after graduating. "I'm taking the summer off. I haven't had one in a while and want to enjoy everything I have accomplished," she said. And by taking the summer off, she means from classes. She will begin a job at KerberRose in Rhinelander as a staff accountant, which she secured last November. She plans to pursue her master's in accounting in fall. As for her long-term goals, she hopes to become the chief financial officer for Mole Lake Sokaogon Chippewa Reservation. Personally, Ackley is planning her winter 2023 wedding to her fiancé, whom she met on her first day at UW-Stevens Point. She also dreams of buying her grandparents' family home. Her parents are Jeff and Holly (Ison) Ackley. Holly is the daughter of Ted and Renee Ison. Madison is also Deward Ison's great granddaughter. 

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

Popple River bridge replacement Forest Road 2159

A temporary bridge that was put in place in 2021 needs to be replaced.

"Replacement of the bridge is to help ensure safe, efficient passage of the Popple River in the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest," said USDA Forest Service Technical Services Staff Officer Mark Beuning. "Be sure to plan ahead and allow for extra time to navigate your route while the bridge and Forest Road 2159 are closed. Bring a map with you, even if you have GPS."

National Forest Campground openings delayed

Much of the 1.5 million acres of the Cheguamegon-Nicolet National Forest (CNNF) has experienced more snow fall than usual during the 2022-2023 season. Due to safety concerns caused by lingering snowpack and high water in areas, it is anticipated that the opening of the CNNF's 53 developed campgrounds will be delayed until as late as May 19 this year due to weather-related conditions. Openings of boat launches at campgrounds will also be delayed.

USDA Forest Service specialists are working to re-open campgrounds as soon as possible. The snowpack persists in shady areas and in plow piles. River and lake levels are high and the ground saturated. Hazard tree assessments and removals, well testing, and general campground prep has started for sites that can be accessed.

Crews will regularly re-assess conditions. If there are changes that allow for earlier re-openings, the public will be notified right away through the CNNF website; and Facebook and Twitter pages.

Campers are asked to be flexible and have alternate lodging plans if they intend to visit the forest in the beginning of May.

Campgrounds will open on a rolling basis as they are ready and sites will be available on a first-come, first served basis. All sites are expected to be open by May 19. Reservations can be made for May 19 and later dates through the website www.Recreation.gov.

She would like to thank teachers and coaches for God, her parents, family and supporting him throughout friends for helping her accomplish her goals.

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
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
