## **Baldwin introduces** bill to delist **Gray Wolves** in Upper Midwest



Legislation would delist the gray wolf in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Michigan and create advisory committee comprised of impacted stakeholders to create final rule

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Today, U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) introduced the Northern Great Lakes Wolf Recovery Act, new legislation to develop a regional-specific plan based in science to delist the gray wolf population in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Michigan's Upper Peninsula. The legislation would create an advisory committee comprised of members representing agriculture, Native and Tribal communities, heads of impacted-state agencies, and wolf management experts and scientists to create the final delisting rule for the region. **Continued on page 14**

## Lack of staff causing problems at the Forest County Jail

#### **Moths vs Butterflies**

Wisconsin, a state known for its diverse natural landscapes, is home to a remarkable variety of insect species, including butterflies and moths. Although butterflies and moths belong to the same order of insects, Lepidoptera, they exhibit several key differences in their physical characteristics, behaviors, and ecological roles. I'll start with Wings:

Butterflies: Butterflies possess slender, delicate wings that are typically colorful and adorned with intricate patterns. Their wings are held vertically when at rest, giving them a distinguished appearance.

Moths: Moths, on the other hand, have broader wings that are usually duller in coloration and pattern. Their wings are held horizontally when resting, providing them with a more inconspicuous appearance.

Lions members for dozens of years volunteered their time to provide security and sell food and refreshments at the races.





The recently completed Indigenous Ways of Knowing report is now available to the public to see the framework Nicolet College will use to incorporate more indigenous knowledge into its curriculum and also award college credit for prior learning when Native American students enroll at Nicolet College. From 2019 to 2022, Native knowledge holders from across Wisconsin, through the Wisconsin Indian Education Association, partnered with Nicolet on the project. Along with incorporating Native ways of knowing into curriculum, other goals included creating a plan to establish pathways to college for Indigenous learners and also create a curriculum and grant credit for prior knowledge in Native culture, governance, history, and language towards a technical certificate and associate degree.

The report honors the work of the project which closely adhered to Native pedagogy and ways. Curriculum was developed by Indigenous leaders and members of area tribes with the support of college faculty and staff.

"This report highlights the depth of work of this project, which shows that institutions of higher education can value Indigenous knowledge and infuse that across our curriculum to make it more holistic," said Laura Wind-Norton, Nicolet's associate vice president of Academic Services. "The story is the pedagogy."

The full report can be viewed online at nicoletcollege.edu/about/sovereign-nations.

The report features stories from Indigenous elders and leaders that allow a glimpse into the learning that

work at the college, which includes offering a 13-credit certificate in Tribal Business Management and the new online Native American Art class.

The final report was prepared by StrategyForward Advisors, a postsecondary policy and strategy consulting firm based in Washington, D.C.

"Honoring Indigenous Ways of Knowing in Community College Programs tells the story of sovereign nations that worked with Nicolet College to grant credit to Native American learners for their knowledge related to indigenous history, culture, language, and governance,' wrote lead author Julie Johnson from StrategyForward Advisors.

"Their unique model is shared through the voices and stories of Native leaders and college participants. It shows how the project was Native-led and based on indigenous approaches and pedagogy."

Nicolet College President Kate Ferrel said she looks forward to incorporating the findings in the Indigenous Ways of Knowing report.

We have not even begun to unleash the power and energy that this curriculum can produce to advance relationships with tribal partners and help these learners achieve their postsecondary goals," Ferrel said.



Did you know that 70 percent of out-of-hospital cardiac arrests happen in homes? Statistically speaking, if you are called on to give CPR in an emergency, you will most likely be trying to save the life of someone you love: a spouse, a parent, a child or a friend, according to the American Heart Association (AHA).

When a person has a cardiac arrest, survival depends on immediately receiving CPR from someone nearby. Knowing how to perform Hands-Only CPR, which is a simplified version of conventional CPR, can be the difference between life and death.

"Hands-Only CPR has two simple steps: call 911, then push hard and fast in the center of the chest," says Amy Larson, CCP, EMS Outreach Coordinator with Aspirus MedEvac. "The outcomes we see after a call where a patient had that initial CPR without the delay of waiting for EMS personnel are vastly improved."

This is because in the first few minutes

someone is in cardiac arrest, chest compressions push remaining oxygen through the body to keep vital organs alive and buys time until someone with more skills can provide help.

The AHA suggests people may feel more confident jumping in to perform CPR if they can remember to push to the beat of a familiar song such as "Stayin' Alive" by the Bee Gees, "Crazy in Love" by Beyoncé featuring Jay-Z or "Walk the Line" by Johnny Cash. The beat of these songs corresponds with the recommended push rate of 100 to 120 compressions per minute.

National CPR & AED Awareness week is observed June 1-7 each year and serves as a reminder of the importance of learning these life-saving skills.



Dear Editor,

In a spectacle more suited to a third world dictatorship than a vibrant democracy, the Oneida County board made a strong statement against conservation of working forest lands on May 16. Ignoring the comments made by over two dozen folks including grandmothers longing for a harmonious future, the board shot a blow to the Pelican River Forest Legacy proposal.

While the action was not entirely unexpected, more than one board member's comments raised my ire. A board member rambled on about the people in Madison removing the severance (yield) tax on Managed Forest Law (MFL) lands such as the Pelican. The 5% tax on standing timber value harvested was removed on April 14, 2016 when then Gov. Walker signed Senate Bill 434, sponsored by two northern legislators- then Sen. Tiffany and Rep. Mursau. Sen. Tiffany hailed from Hazelhurst and Gov. Walker signed the bill into law at the Ponsee center in Rhinelander. Thus, that change which apparently harmed Oneida County, has an undeniable Oneida County footprint. Sen. Tiffany's April 2016 statement boasted of the elimination of the tax to 'deliver a tax cut to those harvesting trees by eliminating the severance and yield tax'.

Another part of the Senator's statement reads. We need to do all we can to ensure that Wisconsin mills continue to have a steady supply of Wisconsin timber. Maintaining the Pelican River as a working forest would do just that. Thus, I would ask now Congressman Tiffany why he has not made a public expression in support of the project.

At the May 16 meeting, the comments of over two dozen proconservation voices expressed unwavering support for the Pelican River project and against the resolution in front of the board. Yet another board member was not satisfied with simply ignoring the wishes of those attending but went on to offend those who attended by publicly saying those people do not work for a living. One could also say the same about the board members attending daytime meetings.

Additionally, in response to a comment about representing the wishes of constituents, the board member said he did not necessarily listen to constituents but listened to Jesus, as if implying the pro-conservation cementers cannot follow Jesus. In my opinion, the board member has a responsibility to both constituents and to Jesus: However, the Jesus I hear wants us to protect Creation. What a great way to accomplish just that, by conserving the biodiversity of our region's natural resources through the Forest Legacy Program. Using this program to protect the Pelican River project recognizes the economic and social needs of communities (constituents) as well as the environmental and intrinsic values our faith would require. "I have long supported commonsense efforts to delist the gray wolf in Wisconsin because the science shows that the population has recovered in the Great Lakes region. While other parts of the country have different wolf populations and management needs, this legislation will allow our agriculture, Tribal, scientific, and impacted communities to come together to create a solution that works for Wisconsin," said Senator Baldwin. "The Northern Great Lakes Wolf Recovery Act is a deliberate approach that follows the science and gives impacted communities a seat at the table as we work together to be responsible stewards of Wisconsin's gray wolf population."

The region the legislation outlines includes Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Michigan's Upper Peninsula, where the wolf population has been determined to have rebounded to the point where state management is appropriate.

The advisory committee would also be involved in the five-year post-delisting monitoring period, which ensures that the status of the species does not decline or, if an increase in threats or decline in the population do occur, there are plans and measures in place to halt the decline so that relisting is not necessary.

The Northern Great Lakes Wolf Recovery Act would require the following:

•Define the Northern Great Lakes Region: Expand the Minnesota population segment currently listed as "threatened," which has remained in place since 1978 except for periods of complete delisting, to statutorily include Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

 Create a Northern Great Lakes Region Gray Wolf Advisory Committee: Require the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to establish the Northern Great Lakes Region Gray Wolf Advisory Committee, which will include membership from the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the United States Department of Agriculture, the Forest Service, federally recognized Indian Tribes and Tribal organizations, heads of impacted-state agencies, and experts of wolf biology, management, and predation.

•Re-Draft Gray Wolf Post-Delisting Monitoring Plan (PDMP): Require the USFWS to redraft the outdated 2008 PDMP for the gray wolf as it applies to the Northern Great Lakes Region population, in consultation with the Committee both during the drafting process and during the 5-year period post delisting.

· Issue a Gray Wolf Delisting Rule: Require the issuance of a delisting rule for gray wolves in the Northern Great Lakes Region, which shall be drafted in consultation with the Committee, in order to successfully, and in the long term, return the species to state management in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.
