

Wabeno Area Players present



Have you ever wondered what rural schools were like in the early 1900s? For starters, you'd have to imagine eight grades of students, sharing one teacher, and in only one classroom. On Saturday, June 24, with shows, at 2:00 and 6:00pm, the Wabeno Area Players will take audiences back in time for a glimpse at the one-room schoolhouse, with an original readers' theater production of, "A Day at the Old School House."

The Players' production will be performed on a stage in front of the one-room schoolhouse in the park in downtown Wabeno. The play is a collection of historical and comedic skits that explore the system of education that served rural Wisconsin for 150 years.

The story will be told through the eyes of Grandma Clara who was once a student and later a teacher in a one-room school. Costumed actors will bring to life what it was like to be a teacher, student, parent and even the schoolhouse itself during that time in our history. Topics will also include the beginnings and demise of oneroom schoolhouses, discipline in the classroom, the daily schedule and even outhouse protocol. The Wabeno Area Players promise it will be a fun, educational, and eyeopening event for all ages.

Tickets will be sold at the schoolhouse in the Wabeno Park, beginning one hour before each show. The cost is \$5 per person. Proceeds will be donated to the Wabeno Park Department for the upkeep and painting of the schoolhouse. There will be folding chairs, but you may wish to bring your own chair. If it is a sunny day, wearing a hat is a good idea. There will be lemonade, water, and popcorn available. Contact 715-473-5466 with questions.

Wisconsin Bag Limits vs. Possession Limits: Understanding **Regulations and DNR Fines**

On a recent fishing outing, I observed another fisherman with a 'large amount' of panfish. This got me thinking about bag limits and possession limits in Wisconsin.

Fishing regulations play a crucial role in preserving the natural resources and ensuring sustainable fishing practices. In Wisconsin, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has established bag limits and possession limits to maintain fish populations and protect their habitats.

Wisconsin Fishing Bag Limits:

Fishing bag limits refer to the maximum number of fish an angler can catch and keep within a single day or a specific fishing trip. These limits are designed to prevent overfishing, maintain fish populations, and allow for fair access to resources. In Wisconsin, bag limits may vary based on species, water body, and fishing season.

For example, let's consider the bag limits for some popular fish species in Wisconsin:

Walleye: The daily bag limit for walleye in most inland waters is five fish, with a minimum size limit of 15 inches. However, specific lakes or rivers may have different regulations, so it is crucial to check the fishing regulations for the particular water body you intend to fish in.




American Legion Post 44 holds Annual Installation

Neighboring 4-H project hosting 2 horse shows in June

The Langlade County 4-H Horse & Pony Project is hosting two horse shows, June 17th and June 18th to raise funds for youth education. The shows will take place at the Langlade County Fairgrounds on Hwy 45 in Antigo and is open to riders of all ages and skill levels. "It is our goal to make the day fun for all age riders and affordable for families" says show Co-Chairman Carol Lese. June 17th starts the weekend of horse competition with a Gymkhana Speed Show, Barrel Racing, Pole Bending, Plug, Flag and Keyhole classes. Age brackets are divided into Tiny tot (10 & under) Children, Intermediate, Senior, and Senior-Senior, age 55and over. Top riders are awarded with 80% pay-back, horse related prizes for Tiny-Tot. Money has been added to the purse for Jackpot classes!

The second day of horse competition takes a slower but still intense pace. The competition begins on June 18th with horse at halter classes, and continues with Lead-line, Western & English in-hand and riding classes. Classes are again divided by age, Tiny-Tot, Youth, Junior and Senior. Ribbons will be awarded for those placing 2nd through 5th place, Trophies for 1st place. High-point ribbons will be awarded by age bracket. New this year is Ranch Riding! Ranch Riding is described as a horse/rider team that has the ability to maneuver at a working speed while navigating required obstacles and patterns. The horse should have the skill and movement of a working ranch horse. High point for Ranch Riding is sponsored by Pampered Paws Pet Grooming.



Battling the Bullhead population on Lake Metonga

Come join! For the past two years, the Lake Metonga Association Fisheries and Habitat Committee has been urging lake property owners and recreators to capture as many bullhead eggs as possible, along with minnows, and adults from the lake system. Why? Well, in 2018-2020 there were no bullhead harvests occurring and in conjunction, the bullhead population was rising while the walleye population of age-0 fish was in sharp decline. This posed an interesting problem, as with a small amount of age-0 walleye, this means in the future less adult walleye. To help with this sharp decline, the Fisheries and Habitat Committee set out to decrease the population of bullheads in hopes to help the walleye population we all

This year we are urging everyone out on the lake to capture bullhead adults, minnows, and eggs when they see the opportunity. The adult bullheads will be in shallow, easier to catch locations during June for spawning. During this time, it is easier to catch the adults before any eggs may be laid. However, if anyone sees eggs, net those up! It is way easier to catch non-moving eggs than hundreds of minnows. But, if you see minnows, grab those too. We want the bullheads gone.

To help add incentivie this capture program, on Saturday's following 4th of July (approx. July 8 through August 12, 2023) bring your bullhead harvests to the north fishing pier, where volunteers will be collecting the captured bullheads. In return we will be handing out Gift Certificates to Palubicki's Eats and Treats and Yeti's. For every time you bring in a load of bullheads, you will get one entry into a larger raffle at the end of summer.

There is only one thing interested bullhead collectors need to do: Obtain a collecting permit required by WI DNR. You can go to www.lakemetongawi.org to download a copy of this document and submit to LMA with directions on the form.

Please do help us better our lake ecosystem for everyone's enjoyment!

Trout: In general, the bag limit for trout in Wisconsin is five fish per day, with a minimum size limit of 9 inches. However, different waters may have specific regulations, such as catchand-release-only or slot limits, so it's essential to consult the fishing regulations for accurate information.

Panfish: Panfish, including bluegill, crappie, and perch, often have generous bag limits in Wisconsin. The bag limit for panfish is typically 25 fish per day, but there may be exceptions based on the water body and regional regulations.

It is crucial for anglers to adhere to these bag limits to ensure the sustainability of fish populations and maintain a healthy aquatic ecosystem.

Wisconsin Fishing Possession Limits:

Possession limits refer to the maximum number of fish an angler can have in their possession, either at home or while traveling, including fish caught on previous fishing trips. The possession limit is typically three times the daily bag limit for most fish species in Wisconsin.

For instance, if the daily bag limit for walleye is five fish, the possession limit would be 15 fish. However, possession limits may vary for certain fish species or water bodies, so it's important to consult the fishing regulations for accurate information.

The Wisconsin DNR takes fishing regulations seriously and enforces strict penalties for violations. Anglers found exceeding the bag or possession limits may face fines and other legal consequences. Sen. Johnson introduces the Safe Baldwin Slams GAO Report That Routes Act of 2023

WASHINGTON - On Tuesday, U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) introduced the Safe Routes Act of 2023. This commonsense legislation allows logging trucks that meet state requirements to drive up to 150 miles on federal highways. Current laws limit logging trucks from using interstate highways when traveling from harvest sites to storage or processing facilities.

"The forestry and timber industry is important for many Wisconsin counties. Yet logging trucks are forced to take longer and more dangerous routes through towns and local two lane roads," Sen. Johnson said. "My bill fixes this problem by opening federal highways to logging trucks, allowing them to take safer routes to the mills and more efficiently deliver for the people of Wisconsin.

Background

Under current law, logging trucks are required to transport raw forest materials on state and county roads.

The current routes taken are both longer and more dangerous for truckers than interstate transportation.

Research shows that logging trucks traveling on non-interstate roads have a greater risk of accidents as they encounter two-way traffic, intersections, school zones, pedestrians, and driveways.

A 2018 study found that 96% of logging vehicle collisions occurred on city, county, or state roads where they encounter school zones, cross walks, intersections, stop signs, oncoming traffic, and railroad crossings.

The bill is supported by groups such as the American Loggers Council, the Great Lakes Timber Professionals Association, the Forest Resources Association, and the American Forest and Paper

Greenlights Private Equity-Owned Company to Manufacture JLTVs Instead of Oshkosh Defense

Baldwin questioned Army's decision to award the contract to a company with 'very high credit risk' and no experience making JLTVs

WASHINGTON, D.C. - This week, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) announced that they have denied Oshkosh Defense's protest to the Army's decision to award a contract for Joint Light Tactical Vehicles (JLTV) to a New York private equity-owned company, AM General, instead of Oshkosh Defense. Senator Baldwin expressed her deep concern that this decision could cause a gap in the production of these essential vehicles because of AM General's "very high credit risk" and lack of skilled workforce, experience, or infrastructure manufacturing these vehicles. Senator Baldwin also noted in her letter that Oshkosh Defense has seven years of successful JLTV production, helping ensure that the JLTV program has performed on schedule, under budget, and delivering promised capabilities.

"Our servicemembers rely on these vehicles and it is irresponsible to risk a gap in production of them. I remain concerned that the Army's decision to award this contract to a New York private-equity-owned company that has never made these vehicles poses a risk for our servicemembers and national security," said Senator Baldwin. "Oshkosh Defense and its workers have manufactured the highest quality vehicles on time and below budget for the better part of a decade, while AM General has no experience manufacturing JLTVs for the Army. I look forward to getting responses from the Army on my questions because the American people need certainty that our men and women in service are getting what they need, when they need it."

Sen. Johnson Reintroduces Legislation to Delist Gray **Wolf as Endangered Species**

WASHINGTON - On Thursday, U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.), along with three of his Republican colleagues, reintroduced legislation to return management of gray wolf populations to the states and delist the gray wolf as endangered and threatened wildlife under the Endangered Species Act of 1973.

"Control of the gray wolf population must be returned to state wildlife agencies, who can best handle the recovered population," said Sen. Johnson. "This legislation would do just that and provide relief for the farmers, loggers, sportsmen, and others that are most impacted by the gray wolf."

The legislation comes after a previous federal court ruling in 2022 that restored endangered species protection for the gray wolf in the lower 48 states, rolling back policies supported by the current and previous administrations. Since 2015, Sen. Johnson has advocated a narrow approach to delist the gray wolf and allow wolf management plans that are based on state wildlife expertise.

Sen. Johnson is joined on this legislation by Senators Cynthia Lummis (R-Wyo.), Mike Lee (R-Utah), and John Barrasso (R-Wyo.).

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3rd class of inductees announced for CHS Athletic Hall of Fame

The Organizing Committee of the Crandon High School Athletic Hall of Fame has released the names of its third class of inductees.

After analyzing many nominations, the Committee has made its selections for the 2023 Class of Inductees. As with the first two classes of inductees, the Committee is still concentrating on candidates from before the turn of the century. While it is difficult even now to get much information about some of these candidates from the distant past, the Committee is still trying to honor that group of outstanding athletes and contributors to Crandon High School's achievements. This is meant to be a reminder that the Committee is not ignoring the more recent outstanding athletes; and their time will be coming soon. The 2023 Inductees are:

KARL "CUB" CASE (Class of 1953) - Cub was a 10 letter winner; 4 in football, 3 in basketball, and 3 in baseball. He was 1st Team All-Conference in Basketball in 1951, 1952, and 1953. He scored 226 points his senior year for a 12.3 per game average. Two of those three years, Crandon won the Conference Championship. As a senior in baseball, Cub batted .384. He was team captain for both football and basketball his senior year. Unfortunately, Karl "Cub" Case died on January 17, 2023, before he could participate in the upcoming Induction ceremonies.

WILLIAM SEKEL - Mr. Sekel is being honored as a Contributor to the Crandon High School Athletic Programs. He graduated from Beaver Dam High School and then attended Wisconsin State University-Stevens Point, where he was an outstanding basketball player, a member of a championship team, and has been inducted to the college's Hall of Fame. He came to Crandon as a teacher and basketball coach in 1962. His 1963-64 basketball team scored a major upset when they defeated the Number 1 ranked small school team in the state in a regional tournament game. He served as basketball coach 1962-67, was baseball coach two years, assistant football coach three years, became Assistant Principal in 1967 and High School Principal in 1968; a position he held until 1990. He was Dean of Students from 1991-1993; and passed away on July 3, 1993. As part of the administrative team, he was a huge promoter of CHS athletics and was very active in developing quality athletic facilities for Crandon's athletes. That included building a baseball field. re-surfacing the football field, lights, new bleachers, and new scoreboards; all of which were located at what is now Cardinal Park. NICK SAMZ (Class of 1971) - Nick Samz was a standout

in a class of many good athletes. Records indicate that he was awarded 8 letters in his career; 3 in football, 2 in basketball, 2 in baseball, and 1 in track. His class included 2022 Hall of Fame Inductee, Mark Cook, and their class of good athletes won conference championships in 4 consecutive seasons covering baseball, football, and basketball. Nick was All-Conference in Football in both 1969 and 1970 and was Most Valuable Player in 1969. A defensive star, he led the team in tackles in both 1969 and On the basketball floor, Nick was also All Conference in 1970 and 1971. He led the team in free throw percentage each year and helped lead the team to consecutive conference championships in 1970 and 1971. GREG CIHLAR (Class of 1973) - Greg was a very talented athlete whose outstanding speed afoot made him a

success in whatever sports he decided to try. He earned 9 letters and spread them out with 3 in football, 2 in wrestling, 3 in track, and 1 in baseball. He was All Conference in Football and Most Valuable Player on the 1972 Conference Championship Football team. He wrestled on Crandon's first Conference Championship Wrestling team in 1972. He held, or still holds school records in track in the 100 Yard Dash, the 220 Yard Dash, and the 180 Yard Low Hurdles. Following time in the U.S. Navy, Gregg played football at Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh, where he was the second leading ground gainer in the conference in two consecutive seasons.

ORPHA STATEZNY PACIOREK (Class of 1978) - Orpha Statezny earned 11 letters in her high school career; 3 in volleyball, 4 in basketball and 4 in track. She earned All Conference Honorable Mention in Volleyball in 1978, but it was in Basketball and Track where she really excelled. As a tall girl, Orpha was a dominant inside post player and earned First Team All Conference in both 1977 and 1978. In Track, she set school records in the disc in 1977 and the shot put in 1978.

COLLEEN GRETZINGER KINCAID (Class of 1984) Colleen Gretzinger was an outstanding all-around athlete who relied on her knowledge of the games and her quickness to take advantage of opponents. She earned 9 letters in high school; 2 in volleyball, 3 in basketball, and 4 in softball. In volleyball, she was All Conference 2nd Team in 1983 as the team won the Conference Championship. In basketball, she was All Conference First Team in 1984, when she was also Captain of the team. In softball, she was All Conference 2nd team in 1982 and moved up to All Conference First Team in both 1983 and 1984. Both of those years she was also Captain of the Team and Most Valuable Player. The softball teams she played on were Conference Champions in 1982 & 1984; Regional Champions in 1981 & 1984; and WIAA Sectional Runnersup in 1984.

JOEY MARVIN (Class of 1985) - Joey earned 9 letters in high school; 2 in football, 3 in basketball, and 4 in baseball. Joey was an outstanding all-around athlete. After being the team Most Valuable Player in 1983, it was in 1984 that Joey put together was of the most outstanding seasons ever in the history of Crandon High School Football as the team won a Conference Championship. He was again Most Valuable Player, but piled up several other honors. He was First Team All Conference on Offense and Defense. He joined the 1,000 yards gained club. He was a Channel 7 All-Star, was named to the UPI All-State First Team, and was a Wisconsin Football Coaches' Association All-Star. In basketball, Joey was All-Conference 2nd Team in 1984 and First Team in 1985, when he was the leading scorer in the Northern Lakes Conference. He won team Free Throw Awards in both 1984 & 1985 and has one of the highest single game scores in school history with 41 points in one game. In baseball, Joey lettered all 4 years of his high school career. In 1985, Joey Marvin received a National Scholar/Athlete Award and an appointment to the Air Force Academy. He later played 4 years of college football at University of Wisconsin - River Falls.

DAVID FERK (Coach) - Mr. Ferk was a resident of central Wisconsin and a graduate of the University of Wisconsin -Stevens Point. He came to Crandon to be a teacher and coach in 1969. His teaching career in Crandon lasted 41 years, but he extended his coaching career in Crandon to 44 years, much longer than most coaches in Crandon High School history. He began as the JV Basketball Coach in 1969 and held that position until 1981. He coached Track from 1970 through 1977. He stepped in as Volleyball Coach in 1989 and 1990. That 1990 Volleyball Team won the Conference Championship. However, it was in Golf that Coach Ferk put together an amazing record. He coached Golf from 1978 until 2013. His teams won 10 Conference Championships and 7 WIAA Regional Championships, with several of his players qualifying for the WIAA State Golf Tournament.

The Hall of Fame Committee is also releasing some of the details of this year's Induction. The new inductees are posted at the Annual Hacker Golf Tournament. This year's golf outing will be at Nicolet Country Club in Laona on Saturday, August 5, 2023. The 2023 Class of Inductees will then be introduced at halftime of the Crandon High School Football game on Friday, September 22, 2023. The formal Induction Ceremony will be held at Water's Edge Lodge on Saturday, September 23, 2023. The Committee is looking forward to another successful round of events.
