
Wabeno's Steam-Up Days this weekend July 7, 8 and 9

However, implementing biological control methods, such as raising purple loosestrife beetles (Galerucella spp.), offers a promising solution to manage this invasive species while minimizing environmental impact.

Understanding the Threat of Purple Loosestrife

Purple loosestrife is a perennial herbaceous plant native to Europe and Asia. It was introduced to North America in the 1800s and has since become a pervasive invasive species, particularly in wetland ecosystems. **Biological Control with Purple Loosestrife Beetles**

One of the most effective and environmentally friendly approaches to controlling purple loosestrife is through the introduction of beetles from the Galerucella genus.

Raising Purple Loosestrife Beetles

Understanding the lifecycle of purple loosestrife beetles is crucial to their successful propagation. The beetles undergo four stages: egg, larva, pupa, and adult. Eggs are laid on the undersides of purple loosestrife



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Helping fight invasive species

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds boaters to help stop the spread of invasive plants and animals in our waters as part of the Great Lakes Landing Blitz.

Starting this summer, Wisconsin's long-running Clean Boats Clean Waters Landing Blitz is now a part of the Great Lakes Landing Blitz. The effort is a collaboration of all of the Great Lakes states and provinces to educate boaters that simple clean-up steps and draining water from the boat and live wells can help to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS).

From June 30-July 9, many boaters in Wisconsin will be greeted at landings and access points by volunteers and regional aquatic invasive species prevention partners. Clean Boats Clean Waters boat inspectors will give out a brand-new red, white and blue boat trailer sticker with a graphic showing all of the places where plants, tiny animals and potentially contaminated water can hide on a boat and trailer.

'It only takes a minute to remove plants, animals, mud or debris from boats, trailers and equipment and to drain all water from bilges, livewells and bait buckets," said Erin McFarlane, the Statewide Clean Boats Clean Waters Educator with Extension Lakes. "These simple steps help keep invasive species from hitching a ride from one lake or river to another.

Every boater and angler has a role to play in protecting Wisconsin's lakes and rivers. Everyone should follow these prevention steps, required by Wisconsin state law, to help prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species in our waters:

Inspect boats, trailers and equipment

 Remove all attached aquatic plants and animals •Drain all water from boats, vehicles and equipment,

including livewells and buckets containing fish • Never move plants or live fish away from a waterbody

- · Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash
- Buy minnows from a Wisconsin bait dealer

•Additionally, only use leftover minnows when fishing with them on the same body of water. They can be used on other waters only if no lake or river water or other fish have been added to their container.

leaves, and upon hatching, the larvae begin feeding on the plant's foliage. Pupation occurs on the stem or in the soil, and adult beetles emerge and continue to feed on purple loosestrife.

Collection and Release

To establish a beetle population, adult beetles can be collected from areas where they are abundant or obtained from specialized suppliers. Care must be taken to ensure the beetles are not carrying any diseases or parasites. After collection, the beetles are released strategically in areas with purple loosestrife infestations, allowing them to disperse and feed on the invasive plants.

Baldwin, Vance Introduce Bipartisan Bill to Ensure Taxpayer-Funded Inventions Are Made in America

Invent Here, Make Here Act expands Baldwin-championed requirements to manufacture cutting-edge technologies in the US

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Today, Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and JD Vance (R-OH) introduced bipartisan legislation to ensure taxpayer-funded technologies are manufactured in the United States. While current law requires federally-funded inventions to be manufactured in the United States, the requirement is often waived, allowing cutting-edge, taxpayer-funded technologies to be licensed to foreign companies and manufactured in countries like China. The Invent Here, Make Here Act of 2023 would expand newly enhanced waiver requirements, championed by Senator Baldwin last year and passed into law, to all federal agencies commercializing federal research.

"When taxpayer dollars are used to fund innovation, American companies and workers are the ones who should be reaping the benefits," said Senator Baldwin. "By building on the progress we've made to manufacture more products in the USA, the Invent Here, Make Here Act ensures cutting-edge American innovation is also American-made, bolstering our manufacturing sector, strengthening our domestic supply chains, and supporting American jobs."

In a noteworthy example of the flawed process, an investigative report in August 2022 found that a breakthrough battery technology invented in a federal lab had been licensed to a Chinese company and was being manufactured in China.

In the 2023 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), Senators Baldwin and Rob Portman (R-OH) included a provision to strengthen the waiver process for inventions resulting from federal research at the Department of Homeland Security. These new rules add an additional layer of review for all waivers and prohibit waivers for companies that will manufacture in hostile countries.

The Invent Here, Make Here Act would subject each waiver request to the review process established by the Made in America Office as required by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. Additionally, the legislation would prohibit waivers for license applications that intend to manufacture in a "country of concern" – currently China, Russia, North Korea, and Iran.

The bipartisan legislation will also require the National Institute of Standards and Technology to improve coordination with other federal agencies to encourage the commercialization of federal research by domestic manufacturers and ensure that projects funded through the Technology, Innovation, and Partnerships Directorate at the National Science Foundation prioritize domestic manufacturing.



Reduce wildfire risk in the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest "Let the stars in the night sky be your fireworks."

As drier than usual conditions persist in the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest (CNNF), USDA Forest Service officials urge recreationists to celebrate wisely and recreate responsibly in order to reduce the risk of wildfire.

Please, remember that fireworks are prohibited on all National Forest System lands, including the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest (Code of Federal Regulations 261.52 (b and f)).

Use of fireworks in a national forest may result in penalties, including fines of up to \$5,000 and/or up to six months in jail.

"On these public lands that we share, let the stars in the night sky be our fireworks," said CNNF Acting Forest Supervisor Sitka Pence. "This is an incredible time of year to experience the wonders of the Forest, but it also a time when it is critical to be aware of and follow fire safety guidelines. Please, do your part to help prevent wildfire as the Forest experiences drier conditions than usual now. Take time before heading out to review safety reminders and encourage others to do the same."

Here are some safety reminders to help prepare for your next CNNF adventure:

· Check with the local ranger district for fire restrictions or area closures. Restrictions vary depending on local conditions and may be posted with little advance notice. •Keep an eye out for signs or kiosks on site when you arrive.

• Even if there are no restrictions, consider alternatives to campfires during periods of high fire danger.

• If you do use a campfire, keep the campfire small and select sites away from flammable material, preferably in a designated campfire ring if one is available.

• Keep water and a shovel nearby your fire and make sure everyone knows where they are located.

• Never leave a fire unattended.

• Make sure the campfire is fully extinguished and cold to the touch before you leave the area. Completely extinguish your campfire by drowning the fire with water and stirring with a shovel. Confirm the fire is out by touching it with the back of your hand. If the fire is too hot to touch, it is too hot to leave.

• If you use a portable stove, make sure the area is clear of grasses and debris that may catch fire. Be sure stoves are steadied and secured to prevent stoves from tipping and starting a fire.

• Put Leave No Trace ethics into high gear: Be sure that all cigarette butts and burned materials at your campsite or picnic area are fully doused out.

·Watch the weather and beware of sudden changes. For example, if you see a thunderstorm approaching, consider leaving the area. Lightning strikes can cause fire. If you see smoke, fire, or suspicious activities, note the location as best as you can and report it to authorities. Call the National Fire Information Center ((208)387-5050) or call 911.

• Avoid parking or driving your car or all-terrain vehicle in tall, dry, vegetation, such as grass. The hot underside of the vehicle can start a fire.

Aspirus' Fruit and Vegetable Prescription **Program continues**

From farm to table, the fresh produce at your local farmers market is one of the healthiest ways to get all your nutrients.

'Summer is the perfect time to give canned and frozen produce a break - to give our bodies and minds a healthy boost with some fresh fruits and veggies," says Kari Due, Aspirus Community Health Improvement Lead. • Talk to the vendors. The sellers want to talk about their fruits, veggies, and jams. Ask for buying and storing tips. They can often give you recipe ideas too.


