Wisconsin Braces for Drought and Wet Days Ahead in Summer 2023

The summer of 2023 brings a combination of drought conditions and wet days, posing significant implications for the state's ecosystems, agriculture, and overall water management.

Drought Conditions

The drought conditions during summer 2023 in Wisconsin can be attributed to several factors. First, the state has experienced a prolonged period of below-average precipitation, leading to a deficit in soil moisture and groundwater levels. This deficit is expected to exacerbate during the summer months when evaporation rates are higher, resulting in drier conditions across the region.

Secondly, changes in weather patterns, influenced by global climate change, are playing a role in the prolonged dry spells. Rising temperatures and shifting precipitation patterns are altering the delicate balance of Wisconsin's climate. Agriculture, a vital sector of Wisconsin's economy, faces significant challenges as well. Crops and livestock require adequate water availability to thrive, and a lack of rainfall can severely impact yields and productivity. Farmers may face difficulties in irrigating their fields due to water shortages, leading to increased financial burdens and potential crop failures.

Wet Days and Flooding

While drought conditions are a concern, the summer of 2023 also presents the potential for heavy rain events and flooding in Wisconsin. Climate change has been linked to an increase in extreme precipitation events, and the state is not exempt from this global trend. Intense rainfall can overwhelm drainage systems, leading to flash floods, property damage, and disruption of transportation networks.

The combination of drought and heavy rainfall can result in a vicious cycle. The hard, dry ground is less able to absorb water, leading to more surface runoff and increased flood risks. Such weather extremes can strain emergency response systems and cause significant economic losses for individuals and communities affected by flooding.

Mitigation and Preparedness

Recognizing the potential challenges ahead, Wisconsin has been actively working on implementing mitigation and preparedness measures. Water management strategies are being developed to ensure efficient allocation of water resources during drought conditions. This includes promoting water conservation practices, encouraging responsible irrigation techniques, and raising awareness about the importance of efficient water use among residents and businesses.




Crandon's Kentuck Day event still has room for vendors

School of the Arts announces 2023 as a self assessment year

School of the Arts in Rhinelander has been a beloved program for more than five decades. UW Madison Professor Robert Gard founded this program in 1964, drawing about 50 students. It grew into a program that attracted hundreds of students and instructors until 2015, when UW Madison held its final School of the Arts. At that point ArtStart convened local and statewide stakeholders to brainstorm how they might keep SOA vibrant in the Northwoods. Nicolet College, Stevens Point College of Natural Resources and a host of local and statewide volunteers and artists worked together to continue the SOA legacy with some generous transition support from the University of Wisconsin.

The program was rebuilding as the pandemic hit, which severely affected participation and available resources. Our 2022 programming was strong and evaluations were positive but our enrollment was not high enough to justify the administrative efforts. While we remain committed to fostering arts in our community and providing a way for artists and community members to connect around the inspiration, camaraderie, and health benefits of art making... we also want to do so in a way that respects the program growing into what it once was: a gathering that fosters statewide connection around the arts. How do we accomplish this? What partnerships could make this possible?

In an effort to reassess our resources and grow our statewide partnerships, a newly formed advisory committee will lead a public visioning session this October in Rhinelander for those invested in exploring how and if this program can return in a way that supports its legacy.

Senator Baldwin Invites Commerce Secretary to Visit Wisconsin to See Firsthand How Wisconsin Manufacturing is Rebuilding America's Infrastructure

Baldwin invites Secretary Raimondo to see how Wisconsin manufacturers are uniquely positioned to be at the center of rebuilding our roads and bridges, expanding access to broadband, and providing clean and safe water

U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) invited Department of Commerce Secretary Gina Raimondo to visit Wisconsin to highlight the state's robust domestic manufacturing sector and discuss how the state is uniquely positioned to drive the country's efforts to rebuild our infrastructure. Senator Baldwin successfully pushed to include Buy America standards in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, ensuring that materials used to rebuild our roads, bridges, water infrastructure, and broadband infrastructure are produced in the United States.

"We have a long and proud tradition of manufacturing things here in Wisconsin, a one-of-a-kind skilled workforce, and a pipeline of talent to drive innovation and grow our economy in high-demand industries. With the new investments from our Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, Wisconsin is primed to be at the center of the manufacturing boom and we need to make sure top officials in the Biden administration know that," said Senator Baldwin. "I am inviting Secretary Gina Raimondo to Wisconsin to see the Badger State's potential as a growth center in the Midwest, show that our Made in Wisconsin economy stands ready to rebuild our infrastructure, and prove our ability to turn this federal investment into a major asset for our country and economy."

Key provisions of Senator Baldwin's Made in America Act were included in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, including:

· Making permanent an American iron and steel requirement for the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund.

 Expanding Buy America to many common construction materials beyond just iron, steel, and manufactured products. New materials could include: non-ferrous metals (like copper), plastic, concrete, glass (including optical glass in broadband), lumber, and drywall.

• Requiring that all of the manufacturing processes used in making the material be completed in the United States in order to qualify as "American made."

• Requiring the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) to consider how many American jobs are created when setting its standards.

In addition, the infrastructure legislation includes a reform that would extend Buy America requirements to infrastructure programs that don't currently have them. This means that all future federal infrastructure funding would be subject to Buy America requirements. Senator Baldwin also worked to tailor the Buy America rules so that they addressed concerns raised by Wisconsin roadbuilders and foundries.



PSC "Wisconsin Energy Statistics" Online Portal

MADISON - Today the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSC) unveiled the "Wisconsin Energy Statistics" portal, an online resource that provides a snapshot of energy use in Wisconsin and its economic and environmental impacts.

Prior to the "Wisconsin Energy Statistics" online portal, the State Energy Office known as the Office of Energy Innovation at the PSC - compiled this information and regularly published revised editions of the "Energy Statistics Book" since 1976. The "Energy Statistics Book" has served as a comprehensive source of data on energy consumption, generation, prices, expenditures, and renewable energy development in Wisconsin. The Office of Energy Innovation prepared the new online portal to make this information more accessible and support more frequent and regular data updates.

"For more than 45 years, the Office of Energy Innovation has collected important energy statistics to inform and involve the public. This interactive online tool now makes it even easier for public officials, researchers, and citizens to learn how we, as a state, are generating, consuming and developing electricity in Wisconsin as well as the progress being made on Governor Evers' goal for all electricity consumed in our state to be carbon-free by 2050," said PSC Chairperson Rebecca Cameron Valcq.

The portal updates the most recently published Energy Statistics Book with data through the year 2021, while maintaining data on long-term historical trends. The data addresses all sources of energy used, from petroleum for transportation to renewables and fossil fuels for electricity generation in Wisconsin.

Key findings in the "Wisconsin Energy Statistics" Online Portal:

- •Since 2015, Wisconsin's annual solar energy generation has grown from 1.41 Megawatt hours to 830.54 Megawatt hours, which is enough to power more than 150,000 average Wisconsin homes.
- Since 2015, the use of coal for Electricity Generation has decreased by 37.86% from 380.6 trillion BTU to 236.3 trillion BTU.
- As of 2021, energy sector jobs in Wisconsin contributed to 4% of the total employment in the state, with the largest percentage being energy efficiency jobs at 56,241.

Property Fraud Alert

Property Fraud Alert is an online subscription service offered to the public that allows them to have their name monitored within the Register of Deeds Office in order to track possible fraudulent recordings that affects their property.

The threat of mortgage fraud and identity theft crime continues to rise and all too often victims of these types of fraudulent activities are unaware their homes or identity have been stolen. While Property Fraud Alert does not prevent fraud from happening, it provides an early notification for property owners to take appropriate action should they determine possible fraudulent activity has taken place.

A common fraud scenario involves a criminal filing a bogus deed making it appear that the actual owner had transferred ownership of a parcel to someone else. The criminal then takes that deed to a bank, fraudulently obtains a mortgage and then disappears with a



To the Editor

I was happy to read about Mr. Kobylarz's concern for climate change in his letter-to-the editor this past week. However, he goes on to question "the seriousness of the problem" by listing quotes from three well-known activists, whom he refers to as "Global Alarmists." A broader understanding of the context of these quotes would be useful in moving us forward to address the increasing intensity and speed of climate change.

True, the "Snows of Kilimanjaro," continue to sometimes fall on the highest peak in Africa, but overall the Kilimanjaro glaciers are melting over an ever larger area and at a more rapid rate. Al Gore's reference back in 2006 should be understood, not as a daily weather forecast, but as part of a general and worrisome feedback loop that shows Kilimanjaro and many other glaciers receding throughout the world, including some in our own national parks.

Greta Thunberg's 2018 tweet was an attempt to rephrase Harvard professor of atmospheric chemistry, James G. Anderson's, warning in 2018 about the rate of loss of floating ice on the Arctic Ocean. If this rate were to continue, he said, there would be no more floating ice in the Arctic within five years. This melting is already causing sea levels to rise and coastal flooding in many places. Back in 2018 Anderson and Thunberg were warning that there was an urgent need to stop producing carbon pollution in order to preserve any permanent ice in the Arctic.

Global warming is in large part due to the release of carbon, methane, and other greenhouse gases into the atmosphere. Carbon dioxide released into the atmosphere through the burning of fossil fuels remains there for well-over 300 years. A safe level of CO2 is considered 350 parts per million (ppm), and this June the monthly average recorded at Mauna Loa Observatory was 423 ppm.

Congresswoman's Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez's comments in 2019 were in reference to the 2018 UN-backed report that stated that the effects of climate change will be "irreversible and unavoidable" if carbon emissions are not reigned in over the next 12 years. Others refer to this concept as a "tipping point" beyond which it will be impossible to return to life on this planet as we have known it. Younger Americans, such as the Gen Z's, are looking for bold solutions, and cost should not be the predominant consideration, Ms. Ocasio-Cortez stated.

What these activists have in common is not "control," as Mr. Kobylarz states, but rather a deep concern for their futures and for that of all humanity and our ecosystems. Admittedly, quotes that include a precise timeline in what is considered "uncharted territory" can be taken out of context and can focus discussion on "proving who's right and who's wrong," rather than on the bigger picture. Climate change has been set in motion, as Mr. Kobylarz agrees. The problem is urgent; you may have seen this week the news report from the European Copernicus' Eyes on Earth that on July 3 the daily surface air temperature was the hottest ever recorded on earth. Let's agree to address the problems and possible solutions to climate change together, and do it soon.



Governor Evers approves WIS 55 improvements in Forest County

To invest in Wisconsin's transportation system, Governor Evers signed a \$3.2 million contract to improve WIS 55, between WIS 70 and the Michigan state line in Forest County. Work is scheduled to begin the week of July 17, 2023.

Pitlik and Wick is the prime contractor for the project. Crews will resurface the highway, install new guardrails and replace 12 drainage pipes along WIS 55.

During construction, WIS 55 will be closed and detoured for 12 days starting July 17, 2023 via WIS 139, WIS 70, MI 189, US 2 and MI 73 during the drainage structure replacements. After the 12 days, WIS 55 will be open to traffic with flagging operations and single lane conditions.

The Spongy Moth Caterpillar



Large areas of the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest (CNNF) are being impacted by spongy moth caterpillars. Spongy moth caterpillars have a voracious appetite for deciduous tree leaves and have left many areas nearly leafless, especially on the Washburn and Lakewood-Laona ranger districts. In some places, there are great lengths of leafless trees in areas that are typically lush with green tree leaves this time of year.

A single spongy moth caterpillar will eat a square yard of foliage of green leaves in its lifetime of just a few weeks, causing trees to have to regrow leaves to convert carbon dioxide and water into sugars and oxygen. The trees will re-flush new leaves, however some mortality may result in trees of lower vigor from the stresses of defoliation, as well as the recent drier-than-usual conditions in Northern Wisconsin. Most of this mortality will be seen in oak trees, especially in sandy, droughtprone areas. Spongy moth caterpillars also feed on aspen, birch and nearly 300 other species of trees and shrubs.

The following 10 counties in the CNNF are under quarantine for spongy moths (datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs Services/SMQuarantine Regs.aspx): Ashland, Bayfield, Florence, Forest, Langlade, Oconto, Oneida, Price, Taylor, and Vilas. The quarantine aims to help reduce the spread of the spongy moth.

Landowners can help in the fight against the spongy moth by, while wearing gloves, collecting caterpillars, pupae, and egg masses on their property. They should drop them into soapy water or a bleach solution. Spongy moth caterpillars search out places to pupate underneath loose tree bark flaps or under the eaves of a cabin or shed; or under a picnic table.

"This will help to reduce next year's caterpillar hatch," said USDA Silviculturist John Lampereur.

"Please, do your part in helping to reduce the risk of spreading the spongy moth by adhering to quarantine guidance and following USDA Forest Service firewood rules," urged CNNF Forest Supervisor Jenn Youngblood. "It is so important that we each do all that we can to help slow the spread of threats to the health of our Forest and all that is dependent upon it."

Over 240 meat prizes were raffled off, including steaks, bacon, pork loins, cheese and the Lions' signature prize of eight ribeye steaks.


The meat raffle is the major fundraiser for the Wabeno Lions Club. It supports the many service activities and financial donations made by the club.
