The Natural Rhythm of Change: Understanding Lake Turnover in Forest County

Among the many natural phenomena that grace the Northwoods, one of the most intriguing is the annual event known as "lake turnover."

What is Lake Turnover?

Lake turnover, often referred to as lake mixing, is a vital process that occurs in temperate and polar regions, including the lakes of Forest County. This natural phenomenon takes place when lakes undergo a seasonal shift in water temperature and circulation. There are two main types of lake turnover: spring turnover and fall turnover.

Spring Turnover occurs as winter gives way to spring. During winter, the surface of the lake becomes colder than the deeper layers. As the air temperature rises and the ice melts, the warmer surface water starts to mix with the colder water below. This mixing is driven by changes in water density due to temperature and, in some cases, wind. As the lake turns over, it becomes fully mixed, allowing nutrients and oxygen to be evenly distributed throughout the water column. This is a crucial event for the health of the lake's ecosystem.

Fall Turnover, on the other hand, occurs when the weather cools down in autumn. As the surface water cools and becomes denser than the water below, it sinks, initiating a similar mixing process. Fall turnover is essential for replenishing oxygen in the lower layers of the lake and ensuring that nutrients are brought up to the surface where they can support aquatic life.

Why Does Lake Turnover Matter?

Lake turnover plays a pivotal role in maintaining the health and balance of Forest County's aquatic ecosystems. Here's why it matters:

Oxygen Distribution: Lake turnover ensures that oxygen is distributed evenly throughout the water column. This is vital for the survival of fish, insects, and other aquatic organisms that rely on oxygen for respiration.

Nutrient Cycling: During turnover, nutrients, such as phosphorus and nitrogen, are mixed from the lake bottom to the surface. This process supports the growth of algae and phytoplankton, which are the base of the aquatic food web.

Temperature Regulation: Turnover helps regulate the temperature of the lake, preventing extreme temperature fluctuations that could harm aquatic life.

Fish Habitat: Many fish species in Forest County lakes rely on specific temperature ranges for spawning and feeding. Turnover ensures that these temperature gradients are maintained, providing suitable habitats for different fish species.

Impacts on Forest County's Ecosystems

The annual cycle of lake turnover has farreaching effects on Forest County's ecosystems. Some of the notable impacts are:

Biodiversity: Lake turnover promotes the growth of algae and phytoplankton, which serve as the primary food source for a wide range of aquatic life. This abundance of food supports a diverse community of fish, insects, and other species.

Recreation: Turnover can affect recreational activities such as fishing. Anglers often target certain fish species during specific seasons when turnover creates optimal conditions for their catch.

Water Quality: By redistributing nutrients and oxygen, turnover helps maintain water quality. Properly mixed lakes are less susceptible to issues like harmful algal blooms.

Conservation and Management

Understanding and managing lake turnover is crucial for the long-term conservation of Forest County's lakes. Conservation efforts should focus on:

Monitoring: Regular monitoring of water quality, temperature, and nutrient levels can help identify changes in lake conditions and potential issues.

Educational Initiatives: Promoting awareness about the importance of lake turnover and responsible lake use among residents and visitors can help protect these valuable resources.

Preservation: Protecting the surrounding forests and wetlands is essential, as they play a role in regulating water quality and providing habitat for wildlife

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



Baldwin, pushes FDA to crack down on lab-grown imitation dairy products

Letter builds on Baldwin's longstanding effort to stand up for farmers and stop the unfair practice of mislabeling non-dairy products using dairy names

U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and Jim Risch (R-ID) led a bipartisan group of colleagues in standing up for American dairy farmers and calling out the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for letting non-dairy lab-grown products illegally label their products with dairy terms. The bipartisan group highlighted the proliferation of imitation products, specifically the new cell-based, lab-grown imitators that are using dairy terms like milk, cheese, and yogurt.

"For decades FDA has allowed non-dairy products to illegally use dairy terms to label their imitation products, most of which are nutritionally inferior to the real dairy foods they purport to emulate," wrote the Senators in a letter to FDA Commissioner Robert Califf. "Public health is now facing a new, additional perpetrator – Cell-based dairy imitation products. These are synthetically created options posing as natural foods, many of which are nutritionally inferior to the dairy products they imitate."

Current FDA regulations define dairy products as being from dairy animals, however, the FDA has failed to enforce these regulations, allowing non-dairy products to use dairy names, leading to the rapid growth of mislabeled alternative products that contain a range of ingredients and nutrients that are often not equivalent to the nutritional content of dairy products – including cell-based, synthetic dairy imitation products. By using dairy names like milk, these synthetic products are posing as natural foods, clearly violating the FDA's standards of identity, which requires the food product be made from milk from an animal.

"It is critical that FDA intervene to prevent this new violation committed by cell-based foods from compounding the harm Americans are already experiencing from FDA's decades of inaction on plant-based mislabeling," wrote the Senators. "New developments in food science should advance new and innovative products, not cause deeper injury to public health. It is FDA's job to ensure a stable and transparent marketplace to support safe innovation while protecting Americans."

Senator Baldwin has been leading the charge for years to get the FDA to properly enforce their own guidance on dairy labeling, introducing the bipartisan DAIRY PRIDE Act again this year – bipartisan legislation to combat the unfair practice of mislabeling non-dairy products using dairy names. In May, she sent a letter to the FDA slamming the Biden Administration's misguided draft guidance that allows non-dairy product imitators to use dairy names, like milk, when labeling their products.

In addition to Senators Baldwin and Risch, the letter was co-signed by Senators Angus King (I-ME), Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY), Tina Smith (D-MN), Susan Collins (R-ME), Roger Marshall (R-KS), and Mike Crapo (R-ID)

Wild rice harvest opportunities limited in 2023

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) today announced that northern Wisconsin's natural wild rice crop production is generally below average to average this year across lakes, flowages and rivers.

"Following a flush of high water after this past winter's snowmelt, water levels in many lakes and flowages in northern Wisconsin have since been lower than normal due to droughty conditions between late spring and late summer," said Jason Fleener, DNR Wetland Habitat Specialist. "This may provide a challenge to harvest wild rice on some waters if it makes access and navigation by canoe more difficult," he added.

Harvesters should not be discouraged, however, as there are still plenty of waters in the north that are producing strong rice beds with adequate water levels for navigation. It may take a little extra research and exploration by harvesters to find these beds. The Great Lakes Indian Fish & Wildlife Commission maintains the Off-Reservation Wild Rice Harvest Regulations webpage, which includes helpful information for harvesters and wild rice production conditions for some wild rice waters.

Wild rice harvesting is open to all Wisconsin residents. Harvesting wild rice provides the opportunity to forage a highly nutritious, natural food source that is unique to the upper Midwest. Wild rice maturity typically ranges from late August through mid-September across the state and varies by water body and rice bed.

The DNR stresses the importance of waiting to harvest wild rice until it falls with relatively gentle strokes while "flailing" or "knocking" using ricing sticks. If little to no rice is falling, it is best to come back and try harvesting at least a few days later. Kernels toward the top of the seed head tend to mature and fall first. Harvest efforts on immature beds inhibit the maturation of the rice kernels, which negatively impacts the harvest experience for others and the long-term sustainability of wild rice production.

As a reminder to boaters, one of the main threats to wild rice production is improper watercraft use throughout the growing season. If wakes are created near wild rice beds in shallow waters, it often results in the uprooting and destruction of wild rice while it's most vulnerable in the submerged or floating-leaf stages of growth (between early June and early July). Additionally, the use of watercraft, especially those with mud motors, directly through wild rice beds will cut and uproot rice. The DNR encourages all watercraft users to educate themselves on how to identify wild rice and modify their boating activities to reduce damage to this treasured Wisconsin resource.

- Speaker's Task Force on Artificial Intelligence
- Speaker's Task Force on Childhood Obesity
 Speaker's Task Force on Truancy in K-12 Education

Currently, Representative Mursau serves on the Wisconsin Department of Justice's Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Taskforce. The Taskforce has been working to identify the factors that contribute to missing and murdered indigenous women and the response from social service organizations.

"It's imperative that we prevent vulnerable people from being exploited and we need to protect victims and get them the services they need," expressed Mursau. "I look forward to working with my legislative colleagues to identify policies and resources to help address this horrific reality."

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



DNR buying red pine cones

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is asking for help collecting red pine seed for their reforestation program. This fall, the DNR's tree nursery in Boscobel will be sowing the last of the red pine seed they have in storage and are asking members of the public to collect seed to replenish their supply.

Red pine (Pinus resinosa) can be found throughout the state, especially the sandy soils of central, northwest and northeast Wisconsin.

"The DNR's supply of red pine seed has been depleted due to the lack of good cone crops over the past couple of years," said Jeremiah Auer, DNR Forest Regeneration Specialist. "Red pine is Wisconsin's number one conifer for timber production and many red pine plantations are now being harvested as they reach maturity. For sites that will be returned to red pine production, that most likely means planting seedlings for regeneration so help in collecting seed now is vital to ensure the future of this valuable timber resource."

Early September is the prime time to collect the red pine cones as they turn from green to purplish brown and reddish-brown tips develop. The DNR is seeking red pine cones at that mature stage, when the color has just turned brown but the scales have not yet opened to release the seeds. They are at maturity in southern and central Wisconsin and are mostly ready for collection in northern Wisconsin.

The DNR pays \$125/bushel for properly collected red pine cones. A bushel typically nets about a half of a pound of viable seeds. This means the nursery needs to purchase more than 120 bushels of cones to get enough seed for one year's worth of red pine seedlings. Collecting

cones is a win-win as the collector earns some pocket money and helps ensure the next generation of red pine trees in Wisconsin.

HOW TO COLLECT

Before collecting cones, contact one of state nurseries to ensure purchasing is still open. Griffith Nursery – Wisconsin Rapids 715-424-3700 Wilson Nursery – Boscobel 608-375-4123

All seed must be of natural origin. Trees in your yard are not appropriate for seed harvest.

Seed must be separated and labeled by county of origin.

Cones must be closed. Red pine cones open and close quickly in response to humidity changes but they disperse most of their seed after opening the first time.

Red pine cones are mature when they have turned from green to purplish with red-brown tips. Use clippers to snip these mature, unopened cones at the base of the branch.

Wear gloves so your hands don't get covered in sap.

Do not mistake Austrian or Scotch pine for red pine. Scotch pine bark is flaky (especially toward the upper part of the stem) and orange and their cones appear twisted and green, even at maturity. Austrian pine tends to be found in urban environments, has a stocky appearance and darker bark compared to red pine. The DNR's "Forest Trees of Wisconsin" booklet can help collectors identify red pine.

Get permission from the landowner before collecting cones.

HOW TO SELL

After collecting, store the cones in a cool, dry area

to limit mold growth or cone opening.

Store the cones in breathable containers.


Deliver the cones to one of the DNR buying stations as soon as possible. View buying stations on our Sell Tree Seed webpage.


If there is excess debris mixed in with the cones, they may be rejected or a price reduction applied. The DNR reserves the right to refuse purchase if the cones don't meet specifications.


