#### Why Trees in Forest County Change Colors in the Fall

As summer's warmth fades away and crisp breezes begin to sweep through Forest County, a transformation unfolds. The lush green canopies of trees across the region start to metamorphose into a dazzling display of vibrant reds, oranges, yellows, browns and this fall especially, purple. This annual spectacle is a testament to the fascinating processes at play in nature.

To understand the transformation, you have look at the role of a pigment called chlorophyll. Chlorophyll is what gives leaves their green color and plays a vital role in photosynthesis, the process by which trees and plants convert sunlight, water, and carbon dioxide into energyrich sugars. During the spring and summer months, when sunlight is abundant, chlorophyll is in its prime, absorbing sunlight and converting it into energy. This energy is used to fuel the tree's growth, allowing it to produce leaves and

However, as the days grow shorter and the nights cooler in Forest County during the fall, trees sense the changing seasons. With less sunlight available and decreasing temperatures, the tree's internal processes begin to shift. The tree recognizes the need to prepare for the harsh winter ahead, and as a result, it starts to conserve energy.

Here's where the magic begins. The tree begins to break down and reabsorb the chlorophyll from its leaves, allowing other pigments to take center stage. As chlorophyll retreats, the hidden colors of carotenoids (yellow and orange pigments) and anthocyanins (red and purple pigments) become more pronounced. These pigments were always present in the leaves but were overshadowed by the dominant green of chlorophyll.

Carotenoids, responsible for the vibrant yellows and oranges in fall foliage, are present in many tree species, including maples and birches. Their bright colors become more noticeable as the chlorophyll diminishes.

Anthocyanins, on the other hand, are responsible for the stunning reds and purples seen in certain trees like sugar maples. Their production is influenced by factors such as sunlight, temperature, and tree genetics. The more sunlight a tree receives and the cooler the temperature, the more likely it is to produce vibrant anthocyanin pigments.

Not all trees in the Northwoods change colors at the same time or in the same way. The timing and intensity of fall coloration depend on the tree species. Some trees, like oaks, exhibit more subdued colors, with leaves often turning brown before they drop. Meanwhile, the iconic sugar maple trees put on a dazzling display of reds and

Environmental factors also play a significant role in the fall color display. A warm, wet growing season followed by a cool, dry autumn tends to produce the most brilliant and long-lasting fall colors. This combination promotes the ideal conditions for pigments to shine.

Climate change is altering the timing and intensity of fall foliage in Forest County and other regions. Warmer temperatures and shifts in precipitation patterns can affect the chemical processes within trees and disrupt the usual fall coloration. Conservation efforts and awareness of these changes are crucial to preserving this annual natural spectacle.

#### **Lakes Country Public Library Groundbreaking Ceremony**

A large crowd celebrated groundbreaking for Lakes Country Public Library expansion/renovation.

An enthusiastic crowd of well over a hundred people gathered in the parking lot of Lakes Country Public Library on September 13, 2023, for a groundbreaking ceremony to mark the beginning of a building project that will double the size of the current facility.

**Building Expansion Committee Chair Tom Thielke** introduced an impressive lineup of guests; federal, state, county and local officials, community members and donors. He reviewed the library's history, from its humble beginning as little more than a bookmobile to a 1982 building that was expanded in 1996.

"Since there is no school in Northern Oconto County, the library is our CLIC (Community Learning and Information Center)," Thielke said. "The Towns of Doty, Lakewood, Riverview and Townsend joined hands to do this in order to meet the needs of our rural residents, with an extra-special focus on our future: our children."

Keynote Speaker Department of Instruction Assistant Superintendent Darrell Williams, who oversees libraries, wowed the crowd with his life-story, selfdeprecating humor, and genuine enthusiasm for the project. "Libraries are the most important place in any school or community," he said. "Libraries allow you to go everywhere without going anywhere. I grew up in Abbeville, Alabama, a tiny rural community without one. We had to bike or hitchhike 20 miles to the library in Oxford, a magical place where I learned what opportunities were out there. I would not be where I am today without libraries."

Fundraising Chair Kathleen Marsh told the crowd that her committee is just \$125,000 short of its \$1.5 million goal. "Many people said this day would never come, that we couldn't get enough funding for the project. But here we are. Why? Because our community came together in a magnificent show of support and commitment."

"Today is for everyone who uses and supports public libraries, especially those who told me: 'I love Lakewood Library,' or 'I don't know what I'd do without the library' or 'I'd have lost my mind (or killed my husband) during the Pandemic if it wasn't for the library.' Now, let's go get those shovels. It's full speed ahead until the ribboncutting next summer!"

The new building, was designed by architect Jeff Musson, Rhinelander, with RJM Construction, Black Creek, to serve as General Contractor. Library Director Katie Essermann noted that the project should be completed by Summer 2024.



#### Sen. Baldwin Statement on Planned **Parenthood of Wisconsin Resuming Abortion**

## **Republicans Vote to "Return Your Surplus"**

Madison, WI - The State Assembly met to pass Assembly Bill 386; a proposal aimed to return \$3 billion in tax surplus by means of a middle-class tax cut and tax exemption for retirement income. Representative Rob Swearingen (R - Rhinelander) released the following statement regarding the bill's passage.

"This isn't just a tax cut; it's a commitment to every hardworking individual in Wisconsin. The aging population of the Northwoods have given so much to our community and this plan gives them the financial relief they deserve.

"Reducing your tax rate is about more than just numbers, it's about putting nearly \$800 back in your pocket every year!"

The proposal would reduce the current middleclass tax rate from 5.3% to 4.4%; saving the average taxpayer \$772 annually. The retirement income exemption applies to filers 67 or older and exempts income up to \$100,000 or \$150,000 for joint filers.

Class will be held at the Townsend Town Hall, 16564 Elm St. (Right on Highway 32). Townsend, WI. 54175. Class will meet on Saturday November 4, 2023 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

This is a one (1) day class. Student Handbooks will be mailed 2 weeks in advance of the actual class date. Students are expected to read the Student Handbook and complete the Chapter Review questions in advance of the actual class date. This format has been used previously, and works exceptionally well as the students are expected to come to class prepared.

Anyone is welcome to attend the course with a recommended minimum age of 11-1/2. Anyone born after January 1, 1985 and at least 12 years old must have snowmobile certification to operate on public areas. #### **Baldwin Calls on Biden Administration to Bring Tech Hub to Wisconsin**

Senator Baldwin voted to create the Tech Hubs program in the CHIPS and Science Act and helped secure \$500 million in funding in the FY2023 budget. Under the Tech Hubs program, the Economic Development Administration will first designate promising Tech Hubs across the country and award strategy development grants to accelerate the development of future Tech Hubs. From there, EDA will make at least five implementation awards to selected Tech Hubs.

By focusing on biohealth and personal medicine, a Regional Tech Hub in Wisconsin would accelerate growth in this cutting-edge industry in the state, enhance the health and economic well-being of Wisconsinites, and safeguard national security by keeping sensitive biohealth and genomic data in the U.S.

"A Wisconsin Regional Tech Hub would also help to accelerate advances in health care, spur economic growth in our communities, and create good-paying jobs in the process," wrote Senator Baldwin. "By selecting Wisconsin's proposal, the Administration has the opportunity to demonstrate support for our domestic gene sequencing industry, help build domestic capacity, and accelerate innovation. Wisconsin stands ready and is uniquely capable of leading the way."

The letter follows two events that Senator Baldwin hosted in Madison and Milwaukee to highlight Wisconsin's strong biohealth industry and Tech Hub application. In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by her husband, John; daughter, Beverly Gudowicz; and nephew, Joseph Mazarny.


