Respiratory illness in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 151 Forest County individuals have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) since January 1st, 2023 with either a PCR, antigen, or home test. Since September 3rd, 2023, 1,981 Wisconsin residents have been diagnosed with influenza. As the winter months are arriving, we are seeing a rapid increase in COVID-19, Influenza, and RSV. This is a snapshot of the numbers as they are continuously changing throughout the day.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to get vaccinated, practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19 and other respiratory viruses. As of December 1st, 2023, 23.8% of Forest County residents have received their influenza vaccination. It is not too late to receive yours! Please call the Forest County Health Department at 715-478-3371 to schedule your Flu vaccine.

If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested. If positive, please isolate yourself away from others for 5 days since symptom onset and wear a mask for the 5 days following your release from isolation.

Conservation Corner

In previous articles, I talked about the Japanese beetle, an exotic invasive that is eating gardens across the Northwoods. Of course, there are many more exotic invasive plants and animals in Wisconsin including the Eurasian Watermilfoil, Common Buckthorn, Garlic Mustard, the Rusty Spotted Lanternfly, and the Spiny Water Flea to name a few. There are many other exotic plants and animals that we don't consider to be pests. For example, corn is native to Mexico, soybeans are native to Asia, tulips are native to Europe. Most of our domesticated animals are exotic with domestic cattle originating in Asia. Many of these plants and animals are exotic, but not extremely invasive. One exotic animal that I had the opportunity to see while deer hunting last week is the Ring-necked

Pheasant. The Ring-necked Pheasant, an animal native to central and eastern Asia and parts of Japan, was introduced in the late 1800's and has populated



much of the northern and western United States and southern Canada. Much of the Ring-necked Pheasant's current range is the result of multiple introductions, largely because of its popularity as a game bird.

Male Ring-necked Pheasants are beautiful birds with red faces and an iridescent green neck with a bold

In keeping with this premise, TFW has been renamed Friends of Townsend Fire (FOTF). Their mission remains the same: assisting the Townsend Volunteer Fire Department and the communities they serve. white ring. The male's very long tail is coppery with thin, black bars. As with many bird species, the females are quite ordinary - brown with paler scaling on the upperparts; buff or cinnamon underparts with black spotting on the sides; and thin, black bars on their tails.

Ring-necked Pheasants are birds of agricultural areas intermixed with areas of taller vegetation, which they use for cover. You will find ring-necked pheasants on game farms in northern Wisconsin, such as Heritage Hunt Club in Laona, but you will have to go south into the heart of Wisconsin's agricultural areas to find wild breeding populations. Look for them along rural roadsides, grassy strips in contour fields, in brushy areas, or hedgerows, which provides cover beside corn, soybean, or other grain fields.

They forage on the ground in fields, where they eat waste grain, other seeds, and insects when available. They will then roost in the cover near these fields. Ring-necked Pheasants usually walk or run and only occasionally resort to flying, usually when disturbed at close range by humans or other predators. Males give a loud, cackling display that can be heard over long distances.

Male pheasants are territorial giving crowing call while briefly drumming with wings. One male may have several mates, the females associating with each other in a small flock on his territory. In courtship, male struts in half-circle around female with back and tail feathers tilted toward her, near wing drooping, face wattles swollen. Nests are on the ground in dense cover. They consist of a shallow depression lined with grass, leaves, weeds and are built by the female.

Females lay eggs in clutches of 10-12 in April to June depending on region. Incubation is by female only, 23-28 days. Downy young leave nest with female shortly after hatching and mostly feed themselves. Male pheasants rarely accompany female and brood. Young are capable of short flights at about 12 days but stay with female for 10-12 weeks.

The Wisconsin DNR and ring-necked pheasant conservation groups release pheasants in the fall for the Wisconsin pheasant hunting season. All hunters who want to pursue pheasants must purchase a pheasant stamp. The funds generated from your pheasant stamp purchase go directly to habitat management for the ringed-necked pheasant in Wisconsin.

Remember that not all exotic plants and animals are considered invasive. Some of these exotic animals, like the ring-necked pheasant, have become an important part of our hunting and family traditions.

Pickerel Chain Lake aeration system Caution advised traveling on Pickerel, Little Pickerel, and Smoke Lake ice

Aeration systems will be in operation this winter on Pickerel, Little Pickerel, and Smoke Lakes, all located just north of Townsend in Oconto County. Caution should be used if using or traveling on the lakes ice surface this winter, as the aeration systems will create a large area of open water in each of the lakes.

The Pickerel Chain Lake Association operates and maintains these aerations systems as a means to help prevent fish kills due to the development of low dissolved oxygen levels as the winter season progresses.

The Pickerel Lake aerator is located off the north shore and across the lake from the boat landing at Townsend's Oughton Park. The Little Pickerel Lake aerator is located on the north end of that lake, and the Smoke Lake aerator is located on the northeast quadrant of that lake.

The aeration systems will be put into operation once ice thickness on the lakes is considered safe for lake association members to erect an open water warning system consisting of posts and rope. The post and rope warning system will be placed to surround each of the open water areas that will develop. Caution signs warning of the aeration system operation and the presence of open water areas will be placed at the Pickerel Lake boat landing and at other locations where fishermen, snowmobilers, and other lake users typically access the lakes.

The size of the open water areas created by the aeration systems will vary depending on wind and temperature. Thin ice conditions can extend out beyond the edges of the open water, and the lake association reminds all lake users to not assume the ice is safe at the post and rope warning system location, and to always check ice conditions prior to travel near the aeration systems or elsewhere on the lakes.
