It is an age-old guestion: how many trees are there? In recent years some have asked, Are there more trees on earth than stars in the Milky Way? NASA estimates that the Milky Way has approximately 100 billion stars. So let's see how trees stack up.

In the United States, the U.S.D.A., U.S. Forest Service (USFS) supervises and assists with the collection of data. The Forest Inventory and Analysis (FIA) program has been in continuous operation since 1930 with a mission to: "make and keep current a comprehensive inventory and analysis of the present and prospective conditions of and requirements for the renewable resources of the forest and rangelands of the U.S." The Northern Research Station FIA unit is responsible for creating and maintaining a comprehensive forest inventory for 24 States including Wisconsin. The FIA program partners with states in various ways to meet the needs of the program and the needs of each state.

Ryan Heiderman, WI DNR, oversees the data needs and collection for the State. Wisconsin partners with the USFS to get the plots collected with a mix of USFS employees and local contractors. Currently, Wisconsin is on a 7-year re-measurement interval and does a double intensity relative to the national standard. Wisconsin puts in twice as many plots, about 1 plot per 3,000 forested acres. This is about 11,600 plots total, of which about 6,400 are 'accessible forested conditions'. Non-stocked or unaccessible plots can be those located in agricultural fields, parking lots, airports, or other non-forested lands which are not measured.

The FIA Data Collection and Analysis explains data collection consists of a three-stage systematic sample of sites. Plots are selected using remote sensing to determine forested conditions and accessibility. Some plots are re-measured from a prior survey and while other plots are new to the survey. Data collected includes type of ownership of the land where the plot is located and type of current land use. Some WWOA members have FIA plots on their woodlands.

Field crews follow specific measurement standards to collect data on forest type, tree species, tree size, and overall tree condition. A subset of sample plots are measured for a broader suite of forest health attributes including tree crown conditions, lichen community composition, understory vegetation, down woody debris, and soil attributes. Data loggers are used to collect the information measured on site. These are handheld microprocessors with forms that are completed as the data is collected in the field. The data can then be downloaded to computers for analysis. Research and pilot programs are looking into other ways to collect inventory data via remote sensing, such as using LiDAR and photogrammetry, but they are not in use yet.

In Wisconsin, there is an estimated 11.75 billion live trees over 1 inch in diameter at breast height (dbh), or 2.2 billion growing stock trees. Recent, FIA data showed that the USA had 300 billion trees. In 2015, a Yale-led study reported that researchers using 400,000 forested plots to collect tree density information from around the world created a model to predict the estimated number of trees at each location around the globe. This analysis resulted in 3.04 trillion trees on Earth.

The trees win - so take a walk in your woods today to celebrate! If you are a night owl waiting for dark to enjoying the Milky Way, make sure you take in the Geminids meteor shower in December!

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



Northwoods Tobacco-Free Coalition Underage Tobacco, Nicotine Sales on the Rise in Wisconsin

The rate of selling tobacco to underage individuals in Wisconsin surged from 5.5% in 2019 to 13.6% in 2023, according to the Synar Survey. The Synar Survey is Wisconsin's yearly check to see how often stores sell tobacco to people who are too young. If this trend continues, Wisconsin could lose millions of dollars in federal funding that depends on underage tobacco sales rates being low.

In 2019, Tobacco 21 became a law for the whole country, making it illegal to sell cigarettes and other tobacco products to anyone under 21. Since then, the Synar Survey has been checking if states are following this law. Wisconsin is one of just eight states that hasn't changed its own law to match the national Tobacco 21 law.

FDA inspectors are working hard to make sure stores follow the federal Tobacco 21 law in Wisconsin. However, local officials cannot enforce the legal tobacco sales age of 21 because they get their authority from state law. This confusion about different laws makes it easier for young people to get their hands on tobacco products.

If state lawmakers change Wisconsin's law to match the federal one, it would authorize local law enforcement to stop young people from buying tobacco and nicotine products. It would also allow Wisconsin Wins, a program that checks on stores selling tobacco products, complete more checks to make sure they are following the national law.

Using tobacco products at a young age puts people in danger of getting addicted to nicotine for their entire life. In fact, 95% of people who use tobacco now started before they were 21. If we all follow the national law, we can decrease tobacco-related harm and make our community healthier.

A letter from the Chairman of Lincoln,

The season's change fast here in the north but this winter feels different. Warmer than average temps and below precipitation is forecasted this winter. Let's hope for our local businesses we get the snow needed for all winter recreation activities we all enjoy.

First of all, let's talk snow. The Town Board is aware of the issues that plagued snow removal last year from our roads. Here are a few things we have addressed to help things flow smoother going forward. First and foremost, we have one full time employee and several part-time employees. We have upgraded the loader and purchased a large snow blade for the front for heavy snows that the trucks might struggle with. Plow route maps will be in each of the plow trucks so roads and homeowners are not missed. We believe these changes will help with snow removal. Typically, we plow after 2-3" of snow has fallen. If the snow is less than that, we will go do a touch up plow and get the hills, curves, and intersections sanded. We typically only salt-sand intersections, hills and sharp curves while plowing. Ice storms require us to salt-sand all roads after the event, but not during. Please keep in mind we do not have the budget to keep roads plowed to bare pavement, so please drive with caution and be safe this winter.

Last year's late snows created some real headaches with road washouts, culvert failures, and other issues. The road failures came fast and at a cost, we were able to repair and recoup over \$44k of the repair costs with state grants we took advantage of. Broadband/internet is something we keep fighting for to improve on. Bug Tussel keeps promising to put up a tower in the town for the last few years and still has not delivered. We were also told we were getting fiber buried this past summer and this did not happen either. This is very frustrating to all the board members and we will continue to fight for better internet for all. In the meantime, Star Link is available for everyone in our township and has worked flawlessly for the past few years.

Finally, we made changes to the dumpster pick-up schedule half way thru summer and hopefully you noticed a difference with not having to throw your trash in the roll off dumpsters. This also helps keep things cleaner at the dump since the critters can't get to household trash in the compactor. Please remember the dump takes no construction waste, tires, furniture, yard waste, electronics as well as some other items that are on the board as you pull into the dump. Please follow accordingly. Prescription for a Safe Celebration Tips on navigating alcohol and medication during the Holidays

"Mixing alcohol with prescription drugs or over-thecounter medications can compromise their effectiveness, worsen side effects, and even introduce new, unpleasant symptoms over time."

Recent research from the University of Wisconsin (UW) reveals a sobering fact: Wisconsin leads the U.S. with a 26 percent rate of excessive drinking, including both binge and heavy drinking. This statistic gains even more significance this time of the year. With the holiday season in full swing, it's important to prioritize responsible choices and promote a safe and enjoyable holiday for everyone.

"Mixing alcohol with prescription drugs or overthe-counter medications can compromise their effectiveness, worsen side effects, and even introduce new, unpleasant symptoms over time," cautions Matthew Wateski, Aspirus Pharmacy Resident. "The side effects really depend on the specific medications you're taking, so it's important to learn your individual risks to help you make informed choices while enjoying the holiday season."

For individuals managing high blood pressure or chest pain with medications, the combination with alcohol can lead to adverse effects. Wateski explains, "Drinking alcohol, even in short periods, can increase blood pressure, rendering medications less effective. Symptoms such as dizziness, headache, and lightheadedness may intensify, accompanied by an elevated heart rate."

In the realm of diabetes management, Wateski points out a critical concern. "Common medications like metformin come with a warning for lactic acidosis, which is an increase in lactic acid. Alcohol can also cause increases in lactic acid production, so when taken together, lactic acid buildup can reach dangerously high levels. You may experience nausea, vomiting, fainting and lightheadedness."

For those grappling with depression or anxiety, combining medications such as Elavil, Zoloft, Xanax, Valium, Ambien, or Lunesta with alcohol can be dangerous. Matthew advises, "This mixture may result in increased dizziness, extreme fatigue, and even dangerous decreases in consciousness or breathing rates."

When it comes to antibiotics, take extreme caution. "Alcohol and antibiotics, when combined, can have harsh side effects on the stomach, such as nausea and diarrhea. Severe reactions are possible with specific antibiotics like Flagyl or Bactrim, taken for certain infections, and can lead to facial flushing, sweating, increased heart rate, or drops in blood pressure," says Wateski.

Matthew emphasizes the need for open communication with health care providers, especially for those prescribed opioids like Vicodin, Lortab, or Oxycodone. "Combining these medications with alcohol can lead to life-threatening respiratory issues and extreme fatigue. Discussing your alcohol use with your provider is crucial to avoid these dangerous side effects."

Even seemingly harmless over-the-counter pain medications like Tylenol require caution. Wateski says, "When you're drinking alcohol and taking Tylenol together, your liver is working double duty with these two agents." Wateski also highlights the risk of stomach bleeding or ulcers when combining nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory medications like Ibuprofen or Naproxen with alcohol.

Wateski concludes that, ultimately, moderation and transparency are key. He adds, "It's extremely important to have open communication with health care providers and pharmacists when considering alcohol and medication interactions. Everyone should be aware of any potential side effects to ensure safe and healthy holiday celebrations."


