#### CoVantage Cares Foundation provides over \$435,700 to local non-profit organizations

For eight years, the CoVantage Cares Foundation and CoVantage Credit Union have partnered to hold a two-week fundraising campaign, kicking off every year on Giving Tuesday. This year's donations pushed the campaign's eight-year total to \$2.7 million in support for 90 local organizations.

CoVantage Cares Foundation announced that this year checks totaling \$435,783 were presented to local non-profit groups that serve communities where CoVantage Credit Union has branches. ### And Time Flies By

Time flies by, and we are only here for a very short while when we look at history. What we do while on the surface of the earth does affect the generations that follow us.

A good example are all of the country schools that dotted the countryside and provided an education to all of the farm kids that were within walking distance. Argonne changed that system with the building of a big new brick school and horse-drawn school busses that brought in all of the farm kids to the central school, and that building was not just a grade school, it was also the Argonne High School. Things changed again. The high school kids went to Crandon in about 1940. Since then, of course, the school closed completely, then burned, and all that remains is a flat spot on a huge former school yard.

A look at old photos of the main streets of our communities shows businesses that nobody alive remembers. A short walk down Crandon's main street brings different memories for different ages. When I stop at Flowers From the Heart, I often think of Adolf Anderson walking the aisles of his Ben Franklin store, and he didn't start it either. The Krohn family put up the Ben Franklin probably in the 1920's.

Tricia's Treasures is also an example of those alive today living with what was built by previous generations. How many remember Gravitter's Hardware when eating a sandwich in Tricia's, or Vern Russell selling shoes in another part of her store? Or what about Harry Pfeiffer selling groceries out of his Red Owl Store? Most older men will remember George Krohn and his sporting goods store, along with the totem poles that are still there and a holder full of long bamboo cane poles for fishing panfish. It is obvious that whoever is running a business out of these buildings will someday quit and somebody else will make a living from inside those walls. The same is true for the old homes in a community. How many generations of kids are raised to adulthood in a home built in the early 1900's, when the county was just coming to life and expanding because of the sawmill industry?

Most of us drive by this building on a daily basis, and many of us enter it to do business quite often. No, it isn't a restaurant anymore, it is the north side of the Laona State Bank in Crandon. The old white house that used to sit in the current parking lot is also partially shown. In years past, it was a jewelry shop when Doc DeHart came from Kentucky to do business back in the 1920's. To the last, it was a second hand shop, and then it was gone to make the parking lot.

It should be noted that the other side of the Laona State Bank in Crandon, was the Freimuth Garage. You used to be able to buy a new Oldsmobile in that side of the building! Art and brother Mel ran the business after their father, Gust Freimuth, started the business. It should be noted that the Freimuth garage, like the current Crandon Pharmacy building were built with help from the Page & Landeck Lumber Company located on Clear Lake.

It should be added that the Feavel family was related to Doneda Schaefer. When Jack (the first one) moved here from Appleton to cut meat, the Feavels came to visit and liked it here to. They opened a restaurant.



After picking up visiting relatives from Rhinelander's airport and driving to Crandon, I expected my passengers would be duly impressed when we passed through an area of low-lying tamarack swamp and approached the first in a series of drumlins left behind by massive ice sheets nearly 11,000 years ago.

Five miles from downtown Crandon, travelers must climb upward for almost two miles before cresting the top of the first ridge. Steep banks on the north and south sides reveal the drumlin's actual height before it was cut down to create the current stretch of Highway 8 in the late 20's.

From that first lofty point, the landscape falls and rises three times before making the city limits. The valley-like troughs in between the ridges are called dungeons and the view in the first dungeon to our left caused one of my guests to gasp, "Oh, no!".

I immediately understood. He was looking down on an area that had, until just a month before, hosted a twenty acre woodlot of aging popple trees. That day, only a few scraggly fir trees poked above a scalped forest floor that was crisscrossed with temporary dirt roads. In his mind, he was witnessing devastating DEFORESTATION!

I quickly explained quaking aspen (popples) are short-lived, fast-growing trees that made their appearance in Wisconsin after the first cut-over. They are particularly good for making paper and usually regenerate through root sucking after a clear cut of the mature trees. Due to the stage of forest succession when early records were examined and summarized, they are not listed as an original species in Wisconsin's northern forests, but they're abundant now and need to be managed accordingly. Besides that, a slashing, as it is sometimes called, creates wonderful habitat for animals such as deer and birds of every kind. Little warblers, for example, are well protected when nesting inside closespaced popple saplings four to five years after a clear cut.

Furthermore, old decaying trees "eat" less greenhouse gases compared to young, growing trees. Like teenagers at a dinner table, young trees sequester far more carbon than dying or fallen trees that release their carbon when they rot.

As a retired school teacher and landowner living atop a drumlin in Forest County, I am blessed to own a 28 acre parcel of woods enrolled in Wisconsin's Managed Forest Law. According to my MFL plan, my property was due for a "mandatory practice". MFL supports landowners as they try to achieve their management goals, ensure healthy forests, and potentially earn a little money when marketable timber is sold.

A mandatory practice requires making contact with the DNR, finding a qualified forester to assist with the project, and locating a capable logging company to complete the work.

I felt very fortunate when Matt Carothers (*FYI - not Crandon's Matt Carothers*) of Superior Woodlands Company agreed to be the forester who would assess my land and lay out the harvest. One of Matt's missions in life is to help families wanting to keep and manage their precious forests. My property lies adjacent to my brother's and as third generation landowners, we like to work together to achieve our mutual goals and maintain a special place for family and friends to gather.

I was glad that Matt and his team of foresters took care and consulted with both my brother and me every step of the way. They listened to our goals and concerns, stopped to describe best management practices when questions arose, and actually turned the project into a kind of learning/working fun. The trees were marked, ready to be cut, and I was very happy with the outcome.

There were others who contributed a great deal to my project, too. Steve Kircher of the Forest County Land and Water Conservation Department helped me secure funding to cover the cost of forestry assistance. A forester needs to spend a lot of time in the woods marking individual trees, mapping, and laying out areas to be opened up or clear cut. That can be costly.

Liz Wood, our local DNR Tax Law Forestry Specialist who administers the MFL program, was also very helpful. She answered my questions and addressed a number of concerns. For example, I have quite a few ash trees. The Emerald Ash Borer is on its way and my original MFL plan didn't take that new threat into account. She was willing to consider an amendment to the plan. We have many highly regarded logging contractors in our area and my family has been fortunate to work with a number of them. Now, when I see a loaded or empty logging truck on its way to or from a mill, I can no longer pass by without appreciating the enormous amount of work. investment and skill involved in making those runs. So it is with a group effort, trees on my 28 acres were harvested this past fall. I am grateful for the expertise and participation of all the people involved. My woods may look a little worse for wear for a year or two, but that's okay. Its future is bright.

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#### Kathryn J. Kalata December 24, 1953 ~ December 20, 2023 Age 69

After a short battle with cancer, on December 20, 2023, Kathryn J. Kalata of Argonne, WI quietly passed at her home with her husband and large, loving family, including her magnificent white cat Stuey by her side. She came into this world above the Rexall Drug Store in Crandon, WI on the cold night of December 24, 1953, shortly after midnight with her identical twin sister Karen following only a few minutes later.



Except for a few preschool years in Milwaukee, she had the good fortune of being able to live in Argonne her whole life, close to brothers, sisters, extended family, and only being less than a minute away from her twin. The third child in a family of seven busy, normal, rowdy kids; she grew up on her grandparents' farm west of Argonne. She attended Argonne Grade School, where she and Karen had a great lot of fun coming to class with each other's name embroidered on their dresses, to sit at each other's desks the whole day to fool their teacher. After graduating from Crandon High School, she married Ted Kalata on July 15, 1972, in the little white St. Mary's Catholic Church in Argonne. They made their solemn promises before God, and kept them sacred for 51 years, never wavering, through many, many tough times, serious health setbacks, and tribulations that would have torn apart lesser men and women. Together they raised four children, all growing to be successful adults just like them.

Kathy was generous to a fault. If she got wind of something you needed, it was just as good as done. If you commented on something in her house you liked, you would get home to find it in your pocket or backpack. You might even receive rutabagas in the mail. She loved gardening, her apple trees, and her chickens, whom she called "chickers"; they followed her around like she was the mother hen.

Her artistry was famous, and her artistic flair is evident throughout her home, which is a veritable museum of art. Each mural and each piece lovingly created, rich in personal meaning. Kathy earned her Bachelor of Arts from the University of Wisconsin - Stevens Point. Through the culmination of years of hard work and tenacity, while battling ill health and simultaneously nurturing everyone around here and raising her children, she graduated with the highest honors from Stevens Point. She worked into the wee hours of the morning, crafting Little House on the Prairie Easter dresses for her girls, flawlessly tailored, complete with pantaloons and bonnets, and put together a little Easter suit for her son as well. Kathy designed and put together amazing costumes for her brothers and sisters for Argonne Halloween dances and the Argonne Day Parade; like the time she made each of them a Crayola Crayon costume, each a different color, complete with felt cone hats. She made a huge Crayola box for them to dance in. Orchestrating elaborate birthdays for dozens of cousins with professionallooking decorated cakes was one of her favorite pastimes. She professionally made the wedding cakes for each of her children. Kathy was always putting final "touches" on everything for her family and loved ones. When Santa Claus came down the chimney at her house, he went back up, saying "I can't compete with that!"

Most importantly of all, Kathy was the anchor for her family and friends. Her personal trials and tribulations were always put to the back burner to care for and be there for her family. Her kitchen table was ground zero for all the joys, celebrations, sorrows, wounds, healings, good times and bad to which the whole family naturally gravitated. Kathy doled out support, sympathy, humor, hot food, advice, day care, and if necessary, was the enforcer, fearlessly and undoubtedly taking up the case against any foe unfortunate enough to cross any family member.




