Conservation Corner

Decoding Wisconsin's Eccentric El Niño Winter

Wisconsin's winters are often characterized by biting cold, heavy snowfall, and frozen landscapes. However, the recent emergence of a peculiar weather phenomenon has brought unprecedented changes to the state's winter climate. El Niño, a climate cycle characterized by warmer-than-average sea surface temperatures in the Pacific Ocean, has been exerting its influence on Wisconsin's winter weather patterns, leading to what many are dubbing as the "weird El Niño winter."

El Niño occurs when the surface waters of the central and eastern Pacific Ocean become unusually warm, disrupting global weather patterns. In Wisconsin, El Niño tends to bring milder temperatures and reduced snowfall compared to a typical winter. However, the effects can vary widely depending on other atmospheric factors, leading to unpredictable and sometimes extreme weather

One of the most conspicuous features of Wisconsin's weird El Niño winter is the anomalous temperatures experienced across the state. While El Niño tends to result in warmer winters overall, the extent of temperature deviations can fluctuate dramatically. Some regions may experience mild conditions reminiscent of spring, while others may still encounter brief but intense cold snaps. These temperature swings can confound residents and wildlife alike, disrupting seasonal behaviors and ecological processes. Continued on page 13

The WCC is an independent organization of residents that advises the Wisconsin Natural Resources Board and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) on how to responsibly manage Wisconsin's natural resources.

Each year, residents have an opportunity to submit ideas as resolutions to the WCC.

Wisconsinites can submit proposed resolutions online now through Feb. 26, 2024. Resolutions must meet the following

- The concern must be of statewide impact.
- The concern must be practical, achievable and
- The concern must be within the mission and vision of the

An individual resident may submit up to two resolutions per year and must present their resolution in person during the annual spring hearings on April 8. Resolutions will be accepted until Feb. 26, 2024.

At the close of the submission process, the resolutions will be reviewed by a committee of WCC delegates to ensure they meet the criteria for inclusion and will be prepared for the online input, which begins on Wednesday, April 10, and closes on Saturday, April 13.

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






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Wabeno Elementary Special **Education receives grant**

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factors that go into a prognosis of how someone heals and meeting their anticipated outcome. There are immediate changes one can take to help maximize rehab following an unexpected injury (like a broken bone or strained muscle) or surgery (such as a total joint replacement or rotator cuff repair). The four common variables I like to mention to patients are exercise regularity, sleep quality, diet

intake, and stress management.

Now how do I exercise when it hurts to exercise? This is the perfect dilemma with reintroducing movement where physical therapy can often help bridge the gap. There is great news though! Beneficial exercise does not need to be a daunting, time-consuming, and complicated task. Setting aside 10 minutes at any point in the day to walk, utilize a stationary bike, or do a combination of body weight squats, lunges and modified push-ups on a countertop can be a simple way to get our heart rate pumping. The specific exercises that we do may not matter quite as much as doing them. Overall, the risk of not exercising

far outweighs the risk of exercising.

Patients will probably hear me say very frequently that our body adapts to what we ask of it, and I am always amazed at how much further our body can be challenged.

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

Another hallmark of Wisconsin's El Niño winters is the erratic nature of snowfall patterns. While El Niño typically correlates with reduced snowfall in the region, it does not guarantee a snow-free season. Instead, Wisconsin may witness sporadic snowstorms interspersed with stretches of unseasonably warm weather, leading to a patchwork of snow cover across the landscape. For winter sports enthusiasts and businesses reliant on snow-related tourism, such variability poses challenges in planning and operations.


The implications of Wisconsin's weird El Niño winter extend beyond recreational activities to the agricultural sector. While milder temperatures can mitigate some of the challenges associated with winter farming, such as frost damage, they also disrupt the natural rhythms of plant growth and pest populations. Farmers must navigate the uncertainty of fluctuating weather conditions, adjusting their practices and timing accordingly to optimize yields and minimize losses.

Wisconsin's diverse ecosystems are intricately linked to the state's winter climate, making them particularly sensitive to El Niño-induced fluctuations.

Wildlife species may experience disruptions in migration patterns, breeding cycles, and habitat availability, impacting populations at various trophic levels. Moreover, changes in snow cover and temperature regimes can alter the composition and dynamics of plant communities, with cascading effects on associated fauna and ecosystems.

As Wisconsin grapples with the challenges posed by its weird El Niño winter, adaptation and resilience emerge as critical strategies for mitigating risks and maximizing opportunities. Building climate-smart infrastructure, implementing adaptive agricultural practices, and fostering ecosystem resilience can help buffer the state against the impacts of future climate variability.

Wants to keep your surplus tax dollars in Madison Madison, WI – On Friday afternoon, Governor Evers vetoed three of the four GOP middle class tax cut bills, confirming what we already knew - he believes your surplus tax dollars are better spent by bureaucrats in Madison, instead of returned to Wisconsin families who are struggling to keep up with federal inflation.

Throughout this session, the GOP-controlled Legislature has been working on different proposals that would return hard-earned tax dollars back to Wisconsin families, who can decide how to spend them based on their own particular household needs. In the most recent tax cut plan, the Legislature addressed his concerns and targeted it towards families making less than \$150,000. Governor Evers took it upon himself to once again veto these cuts and keep that money in Madison.

Senator Felzkowski commented: "When the state has a surplus and we're discussing tax cuts, we have to remember that we're specifically talking about money that does not belong to the state - these are your hard-earned tax dollars that are sitting in an account in Madison. In an effort to get those dollars out the door and back into your family budgets, we drafted four bills that would cut income taxes for families making less than \$150,000; exempt up to \$150,000 of retirement income from income taxes; increase the married couple credit; and expand the child and dependent care credit. The Governor made the unilateral decision that middle class families - including single moms who make \$28,000, retired Wisconsinites, and married couples - are doing just fine and don't need tax relief. Frankly, that's a slap in the face to the majority of Wisconsin."
