Crandon School closes, staff and students fall ill due to carbon monoxide leak

The Crandon School will remain closed until Tuesday, April 2 following the abrupt evacuation of the building on Thursday, March 14 due to several students and staff members becoming suddenly ill. Several students and staff members reported experiencing shortness of breath, light-headedness and increased pulse rate, and were transported to the hospital after a mechanical issue with the furnace (boiler) resulted in elevated levels of carbon monoxide being released inside the school.

On March 14, the Forest County Sheriff's office was called to the school, advised that two students and one staff member who were not in contact with each other had become ill with the same symptoms and transported to the hospital. Students were immediately evacuated from building to reduce further exposure.

The Crandon Fire Department and Sheriff's Department personnel checked the school for harmful gases or any illegal or harmful substances with negative results. While the building was being checked, one more student and four more staff members became ill on the Middle/High School side of the building. While the Crandon Area Rescue Squad was assisting with transport, two EMS workers also began to experience symptoms. According to the Forest County Sheriff's Department, 39 patients received medical attention due to the incident, of which two had reported elevated levels of carbon monoxide.

The school staff worked quickly to inform parents/guardians of the situation and canceled school and any after-school activities for the rest of the day so they could determine the cause of the illness without putting the students and staff at further risk. The Forest County Sheriff's Office, Crandon Fire Department, Oneida County and Wausau Haz-Mat teams, as well as Crandon Rescue Squad, Laona and Argonne Fire Departments, Forest County Emergency Management, Forest County Public Health Department, Crandon Police Department, Aspirus Hospitals and the Oneida County Emergency Services, worked to together to discover the source of the illness and ensure the safety of students and staff. Energy Control and Design worked onsite with the school's building and grounds team to address the issue, and school was canceled for Friday.

On Saturday, parents and guardians received an update from the school district, stating that further testing and inspection was necessary to ensure the safety of the students and staff. Interim District Administrator Kirby Schultz announced via school-wide email that the school would remain closed through spring break, with students and staff returning Tuesday, April 2. During that time, to ensure the mechanical issues are corrected and potential risks are mitigated, the facility will undergo a comprehensive cleaning involving a thorough inspection, cleaning and maintenance of all HVAC components.

The administration is currently working to find a date when staff will be able to assist families and students to retrieve their personal belongings, which, at present, remain inside the building. They will provide updates when new information becomes available.

State Leaders to Introduce Bill Requiring Carbon Monoxide Detectors in Schools

Carbon Monoxide-related illness at Crandon School District prompts new safety measure

Madison, WI – State Representatives Jeff Mursau (R-Crivitz), Rob Swearingen (R-Rhinelander) and David Steffen (R-Howard), announced they will be introducing legislation that would require Wisconsin schools to have carbon monoxide detectors throughout their buildings. Schools are already required to adopt an indoor environmental quality plan—installing carbon monoxide detectors would be incorporated as a key safety measure.

Last week, 39 students and staff from the School District of Crandon were treated at area hospitals for symptoms related to elevated carbon monoxide levels in the school.

"I hope everyone who became ill as a result of the carbon monoxide poisoning is recovering and feeling better," said Mursau. "I'm thankful for the school officials and local emergency responders who took quick action and removed everyone from the school once they knew there was a serious problem. I look forward to working with my colleagues to ensure that we can prevent events like this in the future."

DMV offers information on obtaining an ID for voting

Ahead of the Wisconsin Spring Election and Presidential Preference Vote on Tuesday, April 2, 2024, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) reminds voters how to obtain identification, free of charge, that is valid for voting.

Valid identification for voting purposes includes a driver license, identification card, military or student ID card, etc. There is no separate "voter ID." A federally compliant REAL ID card is not required for voting purposes. Anyone unsure if their identification meets the requirements should visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website to check.

To obtain identification to show at the polls, begin online. A list of the required documents to bring to a DMV Customer Service Center is available at wisconsindmv.gov. If the required documents needed for an ID are not readily available, DMV has a process to obtain the necessary information. This process, available free of charge, may be used to quickly obtain a receipt valid to take to the polls for voting while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained.

Anyone with questions related to obtaining an ID that can be used to vote should call DMV's toll-free hotline at (844) 588-1069. Questions regarding voter eligibility, poll locations, voter registration information or other election information can be directed to the Wisconsin Elections Commission at elections.wi.gov.



He was preceded in death by his parents and stepmother, Dorothy Djupstrom.



Message to the Taxpayers of **Forest County**

As someone who has lived in Forest County my whole life, I've seen the cost of groceries, utilities, and insurance rise exponentially over the previous few years.

As a county board supervisor, I've also seen costs for the county rise. Our dollars for insurance, facility maintenance, and salaries/benefits don't go as far as they used to. One example of increased operational costs is that the County's utility costs have increased by about \$79,000 since 2020.

Our county revenue, which primarily comes from property taxes, the State of Wisconsin, and other formula funding (dependent on what service levels the County provides) sources, has remained (flat). We've dipped into our savings to avoid making budget cuts, but those funds are the savings on which our credit rating and bond issuance consideration depend. It is also a reserve account to ensure the County has adequate funds available in times of emergency.

As we look at 2025 and beyond, the Forest County Board unanimously decided to put a question on the April 2 ballot asking voters whether they want to maintain county services at their current levels or cut services to balance the budget.

The April 2 ballot question will let voters decide on a tax increase that would raise property taxes by about \$10 per month or around \$116 per year on a \$100,000 home. This would raise \$2 million annually for the County to continue providing services at the same level residents are

These funds will also allow the county to offer competitive salaries for our employees, who have dropped below the regional average. With competitive wages, retaining and recruiting top talent will be easier.

Some have asked how long this property tax increase will sustain the county budget. We hope for a long time. This will require some help from the Wisconsin Legislature to approve new funding measures to help all counties in the State. One way the State has done this is through the new shared revenue process, which offers additional funding for public safety and a built-in funding source that can increase through state sales tax revenue

We are experiencing a financial shortfall earlier than many counties because about 83% of land in Forest County is owned by government entities. This means 17% of the land supports 100% of county operations. As I talk with colleagues from other Wisconsin counties, many anticipate the need to go to voters for additional funding to continue providing services to their residents.

The county board has exhausted all options to cut expenses and now leaves the decision up to voters to decide whether they want to keep the existing level of county services with a "yes" vote or if the board will need to cut costs by cutting and/or reducing services to balance the budget with a "no" vote.

All of our county services are very important, and no one wants to make cuts or reductions, but without a successful referendum, we will need to make cuts and reductions to balance the budget. That is why the board of supervisors is bringing this issue to the citizens of Forest County and asking for direction as to how it should proceed.





Work Zone Safety

"Our highway crews work very hard for our communities, often within feet of traffic," Chrisman said. "Just like you, they want to make it home at night to their families. Please focus on the road ahead and slow down especially in work zones."

According to data provided by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT), over the past five years (2019-2023) there have been more than 10,600 crashes in Wisconsin work zones causing 64 deaths and more than 3,800 injuries.

In Wisconsin, work zones can vary in all shapes and sizes. They could include major highway construction and rehabilitation, maintenance, emergency response, utility work, municipal projects and more any time in which there are flashing lights, signs, barrels or workers on the road.

This year's National Work Zone Awareness Week takes place April 15-19. This year's theme is "Work Zones are temporary. Actions behind the wheel can last forever." Work Zone Awareness Week is sponsored by federal, state and local transportation officials to draw attention to the safety needs of road workers throughout the construction season.

Wednesday, April 17 is "Go Orange Day" in which people are asked to wear something orange in support of highway safety. Show your support on social media by posting your pictures and use the hashtag #OrangeForSafety, but please always refrain from using electronics while driving.

"We ask everyone on the road to eliminate distractions and be mindful of their speed,"

Chrisman, said. "Even in areas with reduced speed limits, things can happen in an instant. Always expect the unexpected."

While typical construction work zones are prevalent throughout the county and state, there are also significant numbers of maintenance operations that may be short-term or moving operations. Drivers are reminded of the state's Move Over Law, which requires drivers to shift lanes or slow down to provide a safety buffer for a law enforcement vehicle, ambulance, fire truck, tow truck, utility vehicle, or highway maintenance vehicle that is stopped on the side of a road with its warning lights flashing.

In addition, emergency or work zone areas are protected by laws that aim to keep workers safe. Hand-held cell phone use is illegal and fines double in construction zones as well as areas surrounding emergency response vehicles with flashing lights.

Give your undivided attention to the road:

- Eliminate distractions. Eating, drinking, talking on the phone, or simply changing the radio station can divert your focus to the road ahead.
- 2. Expect the unexpected. Speed limits may be reduced, traffic lanes may be changed, and people and vehicles may be working on or near the road.
- 3. Slow down. A car traveling 60 mph travels 88 feet per second, and the faster you go the longer it takes to stop.
- Give yourself room. Rear-end collisions are the most common work zone crashes, so don't tailgate.
- 5. Allow about three seconds of braking distance. Look for signs. Orange, diamond-shaped signs usually give you ample warning of lane closings, construction areas, and flaggers and other workers ahead.
- 6. Be patient. If you don't see workers, that doesn't mean they're not there. Observe the signs until you see one that says you've left the work zone.
 - 7. Plan ahead. Leave early or map out an alternate route. Find the latest road conditions and work zone news at 511 Wisconsin.
 - 8. Follow the law. Move over, if possible, or slow down when you see flashing lights
 - .9. Consider turning off the phone until you reach
 - 10. If you have to make a call, find a secure place to pull over and stop, such as a wayside or a gas

Trends in drug and alcohol abuse and the impact on young people

As society evolves, so do the patterns of substance use among young adults. One notable trend observed by Saba Khan, DO, a Family Medicine Resident Physician at Aspirus Wausau Family Medicine, is the rising prevalence of marijuana and nicotine vaping among young people.

According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (WI DHS), 11 percent of middle schoolers in Wisconsin have experimented with electronic tobacco products, and four percent are current users. These figures notably increase by high school, with 32 percent of students having tried e-cigarettes, and 20 percent considering themselves current users. In Michigan, the OK2SAY student safety program reports that half of high school students have tried vaping, and one out of five currently engages in vaping.

Vaping gained popularity as an alternative to traditional tobacco smoking, maintaining its appeal among younger populations due to a variety of flavor options, accessibility, and its discreet nature. Dr. Khan expresses a major concern: "It can be done indoors and doesn't have a strong odor like cigarettes, making it easier to use these products in secret."

The act of vaping involves inhaling steam that comes from hot nicotine liquid. Despite claims of being a healthier alternative to smoking conventional cigarettes, research indicates that vaping still poses health risks, including exposure to harmful chemicals, nicotine addiction, and respiratory issues.

Beyond the medical risks, substance use during adolescence can impede cognitive development, disrupt academic achievement, increase the risk of legal issues, and exacerbate mental health challenges, leading to longterm health consequences.

Dr. Khan underscores the importance of understanding the underlying reasons driving this behavior and promoting healthier coping mechanisms.

"Prevention is key," she emphasizes. "Having an open dialogue and fostering supportive environments can help them feel safe to confide in you when they need help, instead of turning to drugs and alcohol.

National Drugs and Alcohol Facts Week (NDAFW), taking place from March 18-24, serves as a platform for health care professionals, parents, caregivers, and community members to address the realities of substance use among youth and promote preventive measures.

In order to ensure all schools are able to meet this new safety standard, the proposal would include a process for districts to seek reimbursement for costs associated with purchasing carbon monoxide detectors. Currently, five states, including Connecticut, Florida, Maryland, Rhode Island, and Utah require their schools to have carbon monoxide detectors.

"Student and staff safety should be a top priority, and the fact that carbon monoxide detectors aren't already mandatory in our schools is frankly shocking," said Rep. Swearingen. "Every floor of a residential home in Wisconsin must have a carbon monoxide detector. This legislation is a no-brainer. It's time we take the necessary steps to ensure our schools are equipped with the basic safety measures to stop something so preventable from ever happening again."
