New equipment at the Crandon Area Rescue Squad

Crandon Area Rescue Squad placed new equipment into service recently with the assistance of the Forest County Potawatomi Community and the Wisconsin Public Service Foundation's Rewarding Responders Grant.

`Funds from the Potawatomi Community were used to purchase a new cardiac monitor and LUCAS mechanical CPR device for the outfitting of a fourth ambulance placed into service in 2023. This gives all 4 of Crandon Rescue's ambulances the ability to transmit EKG's to local hospital ERs as well as heart catheterization hospitals in Wausau or Weston for heart attacks prior to patient arrivals.

Grant money from WPS was used to help purchase four universal sized pediatric restraint devices used to secure patients from 4 to 110 lbs. in size to ambulance stretchers instead of carrying a variety of sizes of car seats. The new restraint devices are designed for easy cleaning and decontamination.

The internationally recognized bluegrass band, The Special Consensus, is coming to the Northwoods. The band is hoping to play to a sell-out crowd at the Nancy Volk Auditorium, in Wabeno High School, on Saturday, May 4, at 7:00 P.M. Don't miss this great evening of music!

The Special Consensus is a bluegrass band that has achieved a contemporary sound in their four decades of performing, making their music a modern classic. Special Consensus has received seven awards from the International Bluegrass Music Association and two Grammy nominations (*Scratch Gravel Road* in 2012 and *Rivers and Roads* in 2018). The band is led by Greg Cahill, banjo player and recipient of the prestigious Distinguished Achievement Award from the IBMA, and includes Dan Eubanks (bass), Greg Blake, the 2023 IBMA Male Vocalist of the Year (guitar) and Michael Prewitt (mandolin). The repertoire of these four talented vocalists and instrumentalists primarily includes songs from band recordings that incorporate the traditional bluegrass music sound, as well as an occasional swing song or gospel quartet or even a well-known country or rock and roll selection performed in the bluegrass format. This performance will especially feature songs from their most recent albums *Chicago Barn Dance* and *Great Blue North*.

Chicago Barn Dance (Compass Records, 2020) is the 20th Special Consensus recording that celebrates both the 45th band anniversary and the long-standing connection of country and bluegrass music with Chicago. The title song "Chicago Barn Dance" received the 2020 IBMA Song of the Year award.

Great Blue North (Compass Records, 2023), the 21st Special Consensus recording, is a tip of the hat to their Canadian friends and fans made throughout nearly four decades of touring throughout the country. All songs included on the recording were written by Canadian writers and numerous Canadian musician friends of the band made guest appearances. The Gordon Lightfoot song "Alberta Bound" received the 2023 IBMA Collaborative Recording of the Year award.

Great Wisconsin Birdathon 2024

The Great Wisconsin Birdathon is Wisconsin's largest fundraiser for bird conservation. It's like a walk-athon style fundraiser, but instead of logging miles, our participants are logging bird sightings! Each year, bird enthusiasts from across the state raise support and awareness for bird conservation by forming a team or donating to a team.

Birdathon teams can participate any day from April 15th to June 15th, and donations are accepted from March 15th to June 30th. Participation is free and all skill levels are welcome to join.

How, when, and where you bird is up to you. While most teams choose to compete over a 24-hour period, many teams opt to bird over the course of a weekend, a week, or even the entirety of the Birdathon! 





Measles Resurgence: Aspirus Health's Guidance for Families The MMR vaccine is 97 percent effective in protecting people from getting sick from the measles.

As of March 21, 2024, there were 64 reported cases of measles across the U.S. in 17 states. Several cases have been reported in the Midwest, including 28 cases in Illinois, three in Minnesota, and one case in Michigan.

In light of these developments, Aspirus Health is urging parents and caregivers to remain vigilant and proactive in preventing the potential spread of measles. Vaccination remains the most effective measure to protect against measles and other preventable diseases, ensuring the health and well-being of children and the entire family.

"This vaccine has been in use for decades and we know it is safe and exceedingly effective," assures Dr. Chan. He adds that for those who get the full two-dose course, "the MMR vaccine is 97 percent effective in protecting people from getting sick from the measles."



The full 2024-2025 hook and line fishing and trout fishing regulations are available online and in print in English, Spanish, Hmong and large print versions.

As anglers head out to their favorite fishing locations, the DNR would like to remind them to: •Minimize the spread of aquatic invasive species by removing plants and animals from their boat before and after launching, draining all water from compartments and never moving live fish away from any waterbody.

• To prevent the spread of fish diseases, remove all water, aquatic vegetation and/or mud from fishing equipment before leaving their fishing location. All fishing equipment, including boats, trailers, boots, waders, nets and float tubes, should be thoroughly cleaned and dried completely before being used again.

• Practice responsible catch and release if they are letting their catch go.

•Follow safe boating procedures and always wear a life jacket.

Those looking to fish one of Wisconsin's 13,000 miles of trout streams can use the recently updated Trout Regulations and Opportunities User Tool (TROUT) to learn regulations and find locations of DNR fishing easements, public lands and classified trout waters. For anglers looking for spots with easy access, try one of the several ponds stocked with catchable trout in the area. With more than 15,000 inland lakes, 42,000 miles of perennial streams and rivers, 1,000 miles of Great Lakes shoreline and 260 miles of the Mississippi River, Wisconsin offers anglers of all skill levels a variety of places to cast a line.

Be Heart Smart Kids and Salt!

(American Heart Association Excerpts) Submitted by Gayle Webster, HIT, Forest County Health Department

Most kids eat too much salt hurting their heart health. But you can set them on a healthier path from the start.

How much sodium are children and youth in the U.S. eating?

On average, children ages 2 to 19 eat more than 3,100 milligrams (mg) sodium per day about double the amount the American Heart Association recommends. The older children get, the more calories and sodium they tend to eat. Research has shown that males 12 to 19 eat the most sodium an average 4,220 mg/day, while females in the same age group eat about 2,950 mg/day.

Where do kids get their sodium?

Children 6 to 18 years old get about: 14% from breakfast, 31% from lunch, 39% from dinner, 16% from snacks. Most of the sodium that children eat comes from processed, packaged and prepared foods commonly in grocery stores and restaurants.

The top 8 foods that contribute to excess sodium in the diets of U.S. children are:

- Pizza
- Mexican food (such as burritos and tacos)
- Sandwiches (fast food/restaurant burgers, chicken, egg and hot dogs)
- Bread and rolls
- Cold cuts and cured meats (pepperoni, sausage, etc.)
 - Soups
 - Snacks (such as chips and pretzels) Cheese

Some food manufacturers and restaurants make lower sodium versions of the same food. So, make healthier food choices for your children by reading the Nutrition Facts label to compare sodium content among different brands.

How can too much sodium hurt my child's health?

Eating too much sodium is associated with higher blood pressure in children and teens, and the effect is even greater if they're overweight or obese. Kids with highsodium diets are almost 40% more likely to have elevated blood pressure than kids with lower-sodium diets. <u>High blood pressure in childhood</u> can also result in early development of heart disease and risk for premature death. Also, high blood pressure in childhood is linked to high blood pressure in adulthood. <u>But lowering blood</u> pressure during childhood can help decrease the risk for high blood pressure as an adult. And it can be as simple as helping them eat less sodium.

How can we shape children's taste buds so they won't miss the extra salt?

Start young! Our taste preferences for salt are shaped by what we eat early in life. Kids may not prefer so much salt if they're given foods with less sodium from an early age. You can also help by gradually reducing the sodium in their foods they might not even notice the difference.





The April 2023 election brought in two new supervisors, Chuck DeMoulin and Willie Evans, and a new chairperson, Monica Zeller. While reviewing all the responsibilities that come with these positions, they also knew that the state of the current town hall needed to be addressed.

The floor continued to buckle with the humidity, the ceiling gave way in a section, the lighting flickered and...what is that smell?? The first thing they did was get an inspection done. Basten Home Inspections diligently evaluated and reported the deficiencies that need to be addressed. The board immediately corrected the easy items (some electrical and door jams) and, that smell turned out to be the furnace room that will be dealt with this summer, the floor and ceiling also needs to be replaced, nothing awful. Then they decided to have the Planning and Zoning Commission look at the options for the hall. Lead by committee member, Ken Schwebke, numerous experts came to the building to look at the trusses, check the stability of the supporting posts, check the concrete under the flooring and look at the wiring. Maiden Lake Plumbing was hired to perform a complete private onsite waste treatment system evaluation. After all of this, it was determined that the bones of this building, and the septic and well are in fine shape. To replicate the 2022 new building plans, the Planning & Zoning suggested adding a 30x50 addition to the south side of the building.

This would be offices from the clerk, treasurer, and board on the east side along with a unisex bathroom, and on the east side, a conference area, file storage area and furnace room. Then the hall would be remodeled with new flooring, ceiling, bathroom, kitchen, the tables, and chairs can go in the existing office, new roof and the whole building wrapped in new siding. This plan would be just 200 sq ft less than the new building design.

The advantage of this plan is the hall stays in the same location, there will not be another empty lot on Hwy 32, and building cost savings will be over \$500,000.00 compared to new construction. The Board agreed. They have secured estimates for everything, from the cost of the flooring, the new parking spaces, roofing, siding, down to the towel dispensers. The project also calls for painting the fire station and garage to make everything look uniform.

As the clerk for the Town of Townsend in my 3rd term, I am probably in the building more than anyone. It is a hub for our community. We hold our monthly meetings as well as all elections in this hall. The blood mobile comes 6 times per year, Red Arrow holds their annual Snow Fest There have been and continue to be many here. weddings, celebrations of life and other parties. Many weekly groups have used this building, also. The offices in the south end will eliminate a lot of traffic interrupting some of these events, as well as making it safer for the employees.

I encourage all Townsend electors to look at the project and participate in the vote. I believe that the Planning and Zoning and the board have come up with a solution that will fit the town's needs for many years to come, and I hope you think so, too.

Vote YES on May 4th, 2024, at the Townsend Fire Station, Front Street at 11am.
