

invite folks to join us at this year's banquet and help support ongoing projects in the area. Projects targeted for this year include the maintenance of approximately 30 miles of hunter walking trails on the Chequamegon/Nicolet National Forest in Forest and Oconto Counties as well as providing financial support for two forest/wildlife management workshops for private landowners in North Central Wisconsin.

Since its inception, the Ruffed Grouse Society has provided over 3.5 million dollars for 600 projects in 28 states, encompassing more than a half a million acres. In Wisconsin alone, local chapters like the Nicolet/Wild Rivers Chapter have generated over 800,000 dollars used to improve about 150,000 acres of wildlife habitat on 85 projects, including 15 project sites in the Florence, Forest and Oconto County area.

Williams adds, "In the 21 years of our Chapter's

existence we have funded a number of successful projects in the area such as the Otter Creek Management Area east of Crandon, the Bushaefer Area north of Wabeno, the Lamon Tangue Area north of Armstrong Creek, the Binder Lake Area north of Townsend and the Scott Creek Area north of Hiles.

To: Town of Lincoln Voters and Taxpayers

There has recently been circulated to one hundred registered voters of the Township a survey questionnaire asking whether the respondent favors construction of new town facilities on County Trunk Highway W, where the existing facilities are located, or on land recently purchased by the Town on Bear Road. The author of the survey is a good friend, whom I greatly respect. However, I recommended against the mailing of this survey for the following reasons:

First, the design of the survey presumes, as does the Town Board, that the people of this Township want a building with a slew of offices and large communal space. Further, it presumes that the Town Citizens want to provide space in which the inevitable government growth will follow. No question on it is phrased such that an answer tells the Board that they want neither site for the kind of expansion planned. Thus, the survey is really kind of a red herring that diverts the attention of the public away from the question of whether to afford a massive expansion and directs them, instead, to the location of such expansion. It's a bit like asking the condemned whether he might prefer hanging or shooting. One wants to answer fneither", but cannot. Second, the purchase of the Bear Road land was

quietly engineered by Chairwoman Black about a year ago. A Town Meeting was required to authorize the capital expenditure for its purchase. Eleven citizens attended. The purchase of the property was approved without dissent. That approval was a watershed moment in this process. Some months later, the Building Committee, under the chairmanship of Lynne Black, selected the Bear Road site for the proposed construction. That decision also represents a milestone for her. She has since rejected the reopening of that issue and clearly would see a reversal of that selection as a setback to be avoided. Therefore, asking citizens to express their preference for site selection, months after the decision was made without them, seems to me to be a total waste of their time.

Third, the one and only step of this process in

which the Citizens have the legal right to exercise decisive control over the build or no build alternative is at the upcoming Town Meeting. Further, although that meeting may be dressed up to look otherwise, it is for the sole purpose of the Board gaining approval of the Citizens to make a capital investment in buildings. Once the Citizens approve any amount for capital expenditure, the way that it is spent is totally up to the Board. The Board is then completely empowered to select the building site, building design and building function without further citizen input of any kind. Thus, the power of the Citizens ends at granting or denying monetary authority as requested by the Board.

It seems clear that the time for surveys on site selection has long since passed. Instead, the voting Citizens of this Township should be focused on whether the process to date has reasonably paid attention to what the Citizens feel about the need for a community hall and offices for elected officers and employees. They might consider whether that kind of Town expenditure is justified and driven by the People's real need or whether, on the other hand, it is driven by the need of it's elected officials to realize their own dreams. If the need is not really existent. if the economic times are not right, or if the governmental process has simply run on while ignoring the Citizens, then I would think the Government should reasonably expect the Citizens to appear at the Town Meeting to reject any proposed spending authority.



April 9 spring hearings offer a smorgasbord of issues

Crane hunt, recycling, wetlands, motor trolling, year-round fishing

MADISON – Hunting for sandhill cranes, restoring recycling funding to local communities, allowing year-round fishing and statewide motor trolling, and removing local wetland permitting authority are among the natural resources topics citizens can weigh in on April 9 during the annual spring hearings at locations statewide.

Attendees also will be able to share their suggestions for meeting Gov. Scott Walker's call for recommendations to simplify hunting, fishing and trapping rules and to reduce barriers to getting more people outside to hunt, fish and trap.

"The spring hearings are a great chance to let us know the direction you want the state to go on a broad range of natural resource issues," says Department of Natural Resources Secretary Cathy Stepp. "Our job is to be the listener and not the teller."

There are 72 public meetings, one in each county throughout the state, starting at 7 p.m. April 9. They are hosted by DNR and the Wisconsin Conservation Congress, the agency's main advisory board for natural resources rule making. A list of meeting locations and a booklet with the questions attendees can vote on is available on the DNR website (search keywords "spring hearings") and at DNR service centers.

The informational hearings have four main parts for attendees: electing county delegates to the Wisconsin Conservation Congress; voting on DNR fisheries and wildlife questions; voting on resolutions from citizens and advisory questions from Congress members, and finally, new this year, participants can share their ideas at a town hall aimed at meeting the governor's request.

DNR questions now advisory under Act 21

This year, DNR questions are advisory only, reflecting changes made as a result of Act 21, a law passed in 2011 that changes state agency rule-making processes. Now, questions on specific rule proposals will be presented in odd-numbered calendar years; under Act 21,

review of state rule changes by lawmakers is now limited to when the Legislature is in session.

Fishing issues bulk of DNR questions

In 2012, DNR questions pertain to hunting, fishing and trapping, with the bulk of questions aimed at gauging attendees' sentiments on how to simplify fishing rules, now contained in six separate regulation pamphlets.

"The governor asked us to look at simplifying our regulations so we are asking some questions to generate discussion of longstanding tools we've used to manage fish populations and fishing," says Mike Staggs, DNR fisheries director. "Our fisheries questions are general proposals so we know the way that anglers want us to go."

Attendees, for example, can weigh in on whether to allow year-round fishing if DNR finds that closing seasons for certain species for part of the year --traditionally done now on most waters -- is not biologically necessary to protect fish populations.

They'll also be asked whether to adopt a single

statewide musky season, instead of having different seasons for the state fish in northern and southern Wisconsin.

Other questions would allow anglers to weigh in an whether motor trolling is allowed statewide, and if DNR

Other questions would allow anglers to weigh in on whether motor trolling is allowed statewide, and if DNR should eliminate separate stamps and tags required for inland or Great Lakes trout fishing and pursuing sturgeon and instead roll those costs into the annual license fee.

Among the wildlife questions being asked are ones seeking permanent adoption of a two-period bobcat hunting and trapping season with permit applicants being required to select either the early or the late season; updating licensing requirements for hunting guides; and, expanding open water hunting opportunities for waterfowl. Congress questions cover a broad range of natural resource topics

This year, as every year, study committees of the Conservation Congress have proposed questions to get feedback from the public on a wide variety of issues. The questions range from asking if people support legislation authorizing a hunt for sandhill cranes, to restoring recycling funding to local communities, to changing which level of government has responsibility for construction erosion and wetland permitting.

All Congress advisory questions are a result of citizen resolutions that were presented and supported at the previous year's spring hearings, as well as Congress study committee proposals, says Rob Bohmann, who chairs the Conservation Congress.

"It's important to recognize the process by which citizens have an impact on the rule-making process," Bohmann says. "Now more than ever it's important for the citizens of Wisconsin who care about the environment, fishing, hunting, trapping and other outdoor pursuits, to be an active participant in shaping the future of how we're able to protect and enjoy Wisconsin's resources."

Bohmann encourages people to stay for the Town Hall and provide ideas and feedback to help shape into recommendations to the governor on how to simplify regulations and eliminate barriers to hunting and fishing participation. People not able to stay for this session can submit written comments on the form in the questionnaire booklet and turn those in.

Northwoods Dental Project: Preserving Smiles One Child at a Time

Tooth decay (cavities or caries) is the most common childhood disease. In Wisconsin, one in three children have untreated tooth decay. Early Childhood Caries (ECC) can start as soon as the first teeth appear. Often children are not able to communicate their dental pain so the effects extend way beyond the pain and infection, causing anxiety, fatigue, irritability depression and withdrawal from normal activities. ECC has the potential to affect a child's speech, communication, nutrition, productivity and quality of life even into adulthood. Untreated tooth decay can affect the general health of a child. In children 5-17 years of age an estimated 51 million school hours are lost each year because of dental related illnesses. Poor oral health of children in this age group can decrease school performance, attribute to poor social relationships and cause less success later in

Northwoods Dental Project (NDP) has been working to prevent tooth decay and create awareness of

oral health and general health issues since it was formed in March 2007 by Oneida and Vilas County Health Departments as a public-private partnership providing children access to preventive oral health care. NDP expanded its partnership in 2009 and 2011 to include Forest and Florence County Health Departments. NDP's dental staff and dental volunteers provide free preventive dental services to any family who wishes to participate. Services are provided using portable dental equipment and supplies at area schools and public sites. By bringing preventive programs to area schools, treatment needs will be decreased for those with no means or resources to obtain dental access

Northwoods Dental Project works with children, families, and other health professionals to help prevent tooth decay (cavities) by providing: oral health exams of children's teeth; oral health education to children and community members; dental sealants and fluoride varnish for children at risk for tooth decay; help to families earching for a dental office; dental resources for schools, day cares and Head Start centers; participation in

NDP has two primary preventive programs: Seal-A-Smile and Healthy Smiles. Seal-A-Smile is a dental sealant program that takes place at scheduled times in area school districts. Seal-A-Smile is the largest of the Northwoods Dental Project's preventive oral health programs reaching over 1,300 children annually for classroom oral health education with over half of those receiving dental sealants. Last year alone, over 3,000 dental sealants were placed providing children with access to preventive dental care that they otherwise may not have received. Students participating in Seal-A-Smile receive individual oral health education, oral health exams, dental sealants, fluoride varnish and dental supplies.

Healthy Smiles is a fluoride varnish program offered to children six months to five years of age enrolled in or eligible for Early Head Start, Head Start or Pre-K classes, The goal of the Healthy Smiles program is to increase awareness and prevent Early Childhood Caries (ECC) or tooth decay which usually occurs before the age of two years and primarily affects the child's front six teeth. NDP currently works with schools or centers throughout the four counties providing education, oral health screenings, dental supplies and fluoride varnish applications to over 600 children annually. All parents are notified of findings and treatment provided during their child's oral health exams receiving referral information if necessary.

Northwoods Dental Project relies on funding from the generosity of community members, area foundations organizations, various grants and the ability to bill Medicaid for sustainability of its programs. It is important to stress that Northwoods Dental Project programs are not meant to take the place of regular dental visits but to be used as a tool in addition to regular dental care. Families are encouraged, to seek a family dentist for routine dental care. 

Most people, whether they are Irish or not, wear green on this day. One of the Irish traditions is to pinch anyone who is not wearing green on St. Patrick's Day.

6. Irish immigrants began observing the holiday in Boston in 1737 and the first St.

Patrick's Day parade was held in New York City in 1766.

7. Corned beef and cabbage are traditional foods eaten on this holiday.

8. The shamrock, pot-of-gold and leprechauns are also associated with St. Patrick's Day. The shamrock was worn as a badge on the lapel. Three is Ireland's magic number and the three petals that make up the shamrock are supposed to bring good luck. The three leaves also represent the Trinity in the Christian religion.

9. The leprechaun is a small Irish fairy. He is dressed like a shoemaker, with pointed shoes and hat. He also wears a leather apron. Leprechauns are supposed to be unfriendly little men who live alone in the forest, spending all of their time making shoes and guarding their treasures. If someone catches a leprechaun, he will be forced to tell where he hides all his pots of gold. However, the leprechaun must be watched at all times. If his captor looks away, the leprechaun will vanish along with his treasure.
