Changing of the guard



New Forest County Board Chairman accepts congratulations and good luck from departing Erhard Huettl

The courthouse shook a little as County Board Chairman Erhard Huettl stepped down from the chairmanship and handed over the gavel to Armstrong Creek's Paul Millan.

Huettl has been chairman since 1975 and on the county board since 1958. His long tenure has seen some huge changes in Forest County, and he recounted many of the changes before shaking hands with the new board chairman and taking Millan's vacated seat with the rest of the board.

Millan has been on the board since 1986, has served as second vice-chair and has served the last four years as 1st vice-chair. In Millan's letter to the board prior to the change of leadership, he wrote the following:

Forest County has many challenges to face. Our budget consists of the county tax levy along with funding from both the state and federal government. It is a challenge to keep our county programs running. We must be creative and provide our county workers with the tools they need to provide our county population with the programs they need to survive and flourish.

We will continue to work with the U.S. Forest Service to harvest more timber in the Nicolet-Chequamegon National Forest to keep our mills, loggers, and truckers working at full capacity. We must keep expanding our County Forest and Park system to generate income for the county. The Aging & Disability Resource Center, located on South Lake Avenue is one of the top satellite offices in the state. Working with the Forest County Potawatomi and the Sokaogon Chippewa communities will enhance our ability to make Forest County a great place to start a business and raise a family. We have a great work force of which we should be very proud.

I have been an active member of this board since 1986. I have served on many county committees and represent Forest County as a member of the North Central Regional Planning Commission, the Human Service Center, and the Regional Aging & Disability Resource Board. I believe with my experience of county government and my ability to work with and understand the concerns of people, I will keep the citizens of Forest County informed of all the upcoming changes that face us.

New board members were sworn in as well, and they are: Victor "Mick" Gifford-Laona, Larry Berg-Crandon, Steve Bunda-Lincoln, Paul Cleereman-Newald, Cheri Collins-I anna

The position of 1st Vice-Chair went to Terry Lucas of Laona, and the position of 2nd Vice-Chair is now filled by Bucky Dailey.

New members of the Executive Committee are Donald LeMaster, and Mike Albrecht, with the other two members the 1st and 2nd vice-chairs.

The Highway Committee is now Lucas, Vollmar and LeMaster.

Zora Cracraft, a long-time resident of Crandon, was honored at a 100th birthday party held at Praise Chapel Community Church in Crandon on Saturday, March 31st

Approximately 250 people, including former Sunday School students, neighbors and out-of-town friends, as well as family attended. A congratulatory 100th birthday sent by President and Mrs. Obama was read by Pastor Farr. During a short program, Pastor Bill and Sjana sang a couple of Zora's favorite hymns. Larry Berg sang a song that he had written for her for this special occasion. Her daughter - in - law, Pat Cracraft, played a video during the event. Friends and family filled out memory cards that were placed into an album.

Zora's granddaughter Susan Wege coordinated the event with other members of her family and the Praise Chapel Church Ladies.

Zora was born at Key, Kentucky, Breathitt County, the fourth child of Floyd and Maude (McGuire) Spencer. She was raised on a 150 acre farm bordered on three sides by the Kentucky River. She had one brother, Joe, and three sisters, Grace (Haney), Emma (Fultz) and Ethel (Rhoads). It was there that she acquired her love for farming and working outdoors.

Memories abound of the years that they lived by the river. Flash floods were an ever present concern, since a cloud burst farther up the mountain would bring a burst of water down it wreaking havoc in its wake. In addition to their every day farm work the family would also "set people across the river" in a boat and at times be caught on the other side until the water receded.

She attended a one room school in which all eight grades were taught. The children walked to school, there weren't any busses at that time. They carried their lunches in a lard bucket and would eat their lunches sitting on a big flat rock. They got water from a spring in the cliff behind the school. They had one water bucket and all the kids drank from the same dipper.

Teachers stayed at family homes during the school year. Zora's grandparents, Houston and Syrilda Spencer, boarded most of the teachers. Her Dad was an only child and they had the room to keep them.

She saw her first vehicle when she was 12 years

Lincoln Building Committee meets

The Building Committee for the proposed town hall for the Town of Lincoln met Tuesday, April 17, at 5 p.m. at the Lincoln Town Hall. A motion had been made at the annual town meeting on April 10 that all planning and expenditures for the town hall be stopped for one calender year. The town board had the town's lawyer look into the matter. The lawyer could find no legal reason why the committee should not be stopped from exploratory work, nor should expenditures be stopped.

The committee also changed the agenda so that it was easier to understand. In the past, the agenda had a line that stated, "Discuss items of information or of an emergency nature which may come before the board", The wording was changed to, "Citizen's Comments." A sign up sheet was passed around. If a person had a comment or if they wanted to be able to ask questions, that person would have to sign up on the sheet and the committee would then allow that person to comment.

The committee also made a motion to reconsider the current site on County W. The motion passed. The committee stated that they will have both sites examined, the pros and cons of each site recorded so that it can be presented to the electors.

The committee also presented a request for proposals for architect and design. The committee wrote The committee made it easier to this proposal. understand. The committee already has proposals from construction managers and now want to find out if architect and design is a better option for the town. The committee is also going to request budget bids from general contractors. The bids have to be in by May 2. The committee will convene to look over the proposals, decide who they want to interview and hold a meeting on May 10 for presentations. The committee will possibly reinvestigate a construction manager if they do not have a decent response from architects. If the committee decides to resubmit the request for proposals for construction managers, they must resend them to the two that responded to give them an opportunity to possibly resubmit their proposal. The committee will also have to finish their work with Kellor Inc. They paid \$1,500 dollars for advising and possible designs. This does not mean that Kellor Inc. will be a construction manager. It is a part of the investigative process started from almost a year

The last discussion that was brought up was a way to keep the citizens better informed with what is happening with the project. The committee discussed posting it on the building or possibly the internet. The next meeting is set for May 3. It will allow the committee to review the proposals.

Community Coalition of Forest County Holds Annual Meeting - Focus on Prevention of Underage Drinking and Restorative Justice



The Community Coalition of Forest County held their annual meeting on April 10 at the Sokaogon Chippewa Administrative Building. Membership is made up of Forest County communities, schools, non-profits and agencies who are working together to benefit all community members by promoting a process to effectively utilize community resources to identify and address community problems and goals. This year, the coalition's two main goals are to work to implement restorative justice options in Forest County to address underage drinking prevention through

April is Alcohol Awareness Month

The Community Coalition of Forest County (CCFC) is joining other organizations around the country to honor Alcohol Awareness Month in April. This year's theme is "Healthy Choices, Healthy Communities: Prevent Underage Drinking."

The CCFC wants to get the message out about the devastating consequences of underage drinking and encourage this community to help prevent alcohol use in teens. Underage drinking is extremely dangerous and is associated with traffic fatalities, violence, unsafe sex, suicide, educational failure, alcohol overdose and other problem behaviors. Youth who begin drinking before age 15 are four times more likely to develop alcoholism than those who begin at age 21. Alcoholism places an enormous emotional, physical and financial burden on family members and children of the person who is addicted.

Reducing underage drinking is critical to securing a healthy future for America's youth and requires a cooperative effort from parents, schools, community organizations, business leaders, government agencies, the entertainment industry, alcohol manufacturers/retailers and youth. Unfortunately, it remains relatively easy for teenagers to get access to alcohol and much of it goes unnoticed or unchecked by adults.

Often, kids who experience depression and anxiety may use alcohol in an attempt to self medicate their symptoms. Kids isolated from their family system without other positive connections may seek involvement with alcohol or drug-involved peer groups. Kids with family or school related stress, poor coping skills, and family members with drug or alcohol problems are also

Parents can help to reduce their children's risk of problem drinking by educating their kids and keeping a more watchful eye on them, especially as they enter middle and high school. We know that high levels of parental monitoring are associated with lower levels of high school drinking. With April being the beginning of prom and graduation season, the coalition is encouraging parents, schools, and community partners to support and promote alcohol free events for our youth.

The CCFC is once again promoting the "Parents Who Host, Lose The Most" campaign, which encourages parents and the entire community to send a unified message that teen alcohol consumption is unhealthy, unsafe, and unacceptable. The campaign stresses that hosting underage parties is illegal, and that young people can have fun with out alcohol.

The CCFC also has an underage drinking workgroup that is planning a community Town Hall meeting in the near future.

old and was afraid of it, never dreaming that in time she would one day be driving her own car.

Although there were airplanes at that time, the first one she saw looked about the size of a cigar in the sky. In 2007, at the age of 95, she and her daughter, Phyllis, took a flight to Ohio. She was amazed at the sights that could be seen from the air.

October 19, 1938 in Crystal Falls, Michigan, Zora and Mason were on their way to witness the wedding of his brother Wilson and fiancee Elsie when they decided to get married.

Mason worked on the Soo Line Railroad for 44 vears before his retirement and also worked in the woods.

Mason and Zora had five children, Ronald, Phyllis, Wendell, Betty and Karen. They had a home in Crandon and a 40 acre farm at the south end of Lake Metonga during the years that the children were growing up. In 1960 they sold the house in town and the 40 acre farm and purchased an 80 acre farm south of Crandon where Zora still lives.

Mason died in 1997, just short of their 59th wedding anniversary.

Zora's flower beds are her pride and joy and you can usually see her out digging in the soil, or out shopping to find her next flower to plant.

Praise Chapel has been a part of Zora's life since she moved to Crandon from Kentucky in 1934. She, along with the family, have always been part of Praise Chapel, helping in any position, from building the church, teaching or on the church board.

All facets of life have changed through the years with modern conveniences, electric lights, washers and dryers, gas and electric stoves, indoor bathrooms, running water, telephone service changing from party lines to individual service, computers, modes of transportation, cell phones etc. but her love of God, farming, gardening, and family and friends has never changed.

She attributes her longevity to living one day at a time and eating soup beans and corn bread.



Senior Chatter

Sunlight for Good Health?

The sun helps us make vitamin D, the sunshine vitamin, which is essential for healthy teeth and bones, heart health and better immunity. Recent studies show vitamin D may help reduce risk for certain cancers.

Very little sun exposure is needed to stimulate production of vitamin D: 10-15 minutes twice a week to the face, arms, legs and back without sun screen is usually enough. Infants and sun-sensitive folks, however, need to stay out of direct sunlight.

After your sun time is up, apply a sun screen with an SPF of 15 or more to prevent sun damage. Accumulation of sun exposure over years can accelerate visible skin aging and lead to skin cancer.

The best source of vitamin D is food: salmon, mackerel, tuna and sardines; fortified milk, soymilk orange juice; and some ready-to-eat cereals. Vitamin D supplements are an option to discuss with your provider.

Once your located the muscles, practice tightening them when you're not urinating: squeeze the muscles for 3 seconds, relax for 3 seconds, and repeat the sequence 10-15 times. Practice 3-4 times a day. Consult your provider if symptoms persist.

Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest Safety Alert

Rhinelander, WI: April 17, 2012 Over the last two vears the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest (CNNF), in cooperation with an interagency enforcement action, eradicated approximately 80,000 marijuana plants that were cultivated by large Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTO). These grow sites were located on the Nicolet land base (2010) and the Chequamegon land base (2011); both were first reported by hunters.

The illegal activity of growing and harvesting marijuana on public lands is expected to continue. The safety of the public and employees is the top priority for the Forest Service. National Forest and other public lands are being used for these illegal operations as they are often vast, uninhabited acres the growers find have the right conditions for their illegal operations. Typically planting occurs in the spring and the plants are harvested in late summer.

These DTO marijuana growers are dangerous and are known to carry firearms! The CNNF asks that visitors be aware of their surroundings and know what to do to remain safe. Knowing how to recognize grow sites is

Indicators of illegal marijuana grow sites include: --Isolated tents in the forest where no other recreational activity is present

--Garden tools, bags of fertilizer, and large amounts of garbage --Signs of cultivation/soil disturbances in unlikely areas

to 2 acre cleared areas with stumps up to approximately 3 feet tall

If you encounter a site, or unusual circumstances you should take these actions immediately:

-Leave the area as quickly and quietly as possible

--Do your best to know your location by use of landmarks or waypoints

--Notify local law enforcement authorities, if on National Forest you can also notify the local Ranger District Office.

Authorities will continue to work together to decrease this unlawful and damaging activity. Your assistance is important to help stop marijuana growing in vour National Forest.



TAXES Did you notice that the town of Lincoln property taxes did not increase the last two years, and there is no plan to increase them next year? And, the taxes paid to the town are only 12% of the taxes you paid! Not known by many is that the town operates with a levy of approximately \$300,000. That includes payroll and benefits, the trash site, snow and ice removal, road maintenance and re-surfacing, fire and rescue services, plus more. I feel your town board has done a pretty good job in this area.

BUILDING FUND The building fund was started about 11 years ago by a different town chairman. Your present town board has continued to contribute to this fund ever since, and in my opinion it is a good plan. I'm sure you realize that buildings at some time will need to be replaced. We now have approximately \$680,000 for use now or in the future without, hopefully, having to secure a loan. As an example, if the town were to borrow \$700,000 at this time, the interest would almost be \$200,000 for a ten-year note. This kind of borrowing has occurred in other towns that did not plan abadd.

THE BUILDING COMMITTEE One year ago, a nine-member building committee was formed and consists of five men and four women, all of which have different backgrounds and areas of expertise. And, oh yes, many different opinions as to what kind of building the town needs and where it should be located. This is not unusual. The key is to let your thoughts be known, realizing that not all ideas can become reality. I believe that after only twelve or so meetings, this is occurring to this committee.

What has the committee accomplished so far? Let me try to summarize. At our first meeting in April 2011, it became evident that this was a really big undertaking, and we felt that we needed help to get organized. Two firms were contacted. The Keller Construction Management Division of Kaukana was selected with the best fee of \$1,500. (Note: There is also a Keller Building Division which we have not had contact with) We asked Keller to help us get started with a preliminary plan, estimate and suggested time and action calendar.

On May 16, 2011, five town halls were visited, and since then two additional halls were visited. We gathered meaningful information.

In June of that year we provided Keller with our preliminary suggestions of what we felt the building should include. I called it a wish list. Just like when I planned my first house, the sky was the limit, but when the cost was established, out came the chopping block. Such was the case here.

Our preliminary cost estimate was between \$1,368,000 and \$1,681,000 (Keller letter dated 11/8/11). This was for a town hall, garage and community room for about 300 people. We were amazed at the numbers and realized this would never fly. We down-sized many times and reviewed many more economical plans, and at the writing of this letter, no final decision has been made. I must note that the private offices and the 1.5 million dollar plan often referred to in recent articles were dead many months and

The large community room is replaced by a 1,500 sq. ft. meeting room which could accommodate 100 or less people and would not require a sprinkler system. For example: If you were at the April 10th town meeting, which was held in the town garage, that portion of the garage is 2,000 sq. ft. Approximately 90 people used up about three-quarters of the space. So one might say that 1,500 sq. ft. is appropriate for the future. But, this is still not final. The electors will have the final vote some months from now when the committee is ready to present options at a town meeting.

In the last meetings we began soliciting proposals for a construction management firm and/or an architect. We are not sure at this time which way we will go, or if any of this is needed in part or in whole, but we must investigate both options in order to make an intelligent decision. Keep in mind that all local contractors will have the opportunity to hid the project

CURRENT BUILDINGS I must share some thought with you regarding our current two buildings. It is possible that the current town hall and garage have a safe and secure foundation. But we must consider other facts, such as, the roof is flat and has a rubber membrane. Leaking has occurred in the hall ceiling and should be replaced in the near future. The cement block walls are cracked and uninsulated and the restrooms are not handican accessible. The window frames are rotted and will need to be replaced some time soon. Our building inspector has requested that the ceiling in the garage must be made fire proofed with drywall or steel, and this must be done soon. In heavy rain, water runs in the back door and out the front. The other out-building has a ground floor and no heat, and we keep some of our expensive equipment in this building. This must be dealt with.

Do we spend money on the old buildings or replace them? This must be taken into consideration.

In closing, please understand that whatever options the building committee comes up with, you, the electors, will have the final vote. One option is to vote to do nothing.

When will that meeting be held? When all information has been obtained and a plan has been agreed upon that we feel will meet the needs of the community.

I feel better now and hope for a good night's sleep. It would be great to see more smiles out there in this Great Northwoods community that we all love!

Letter to the editor:

After attending the Town of Lincoln Annual Meeting last Tuesday, April 10th, I felt I could not remain silent on the actions taking place in the Town in recent months, especially since residents have been receiving only one-sided opinions, misinformation and slanted viewpoints during this time. I commend the Pioneer reporter for the accurate and unbiased report of the meeting in the April 16th edition of the paper. Unfortunately, the reporter could not express the distaste I and others felt for the actions of a large contingency of residents who attended with apparently one purpose in mind: to accuse, embarrass and malign the Town Board and Chairman and the good people who volunteered to serve on the building committee. I can't blame all of them however, since they have been fed a lot of incorrect information intended to stir up just this reaction.

First of all, saying the town board and building committee are rushing into spending taxpayers money is almost funny. These people have been meeting for 13 months and so far have barely determined the best site for the building, let alone the type, size or construction method. The only money spent has been for the site reviews to see which location was the most feasible and best suited. They fully expect it will be at least another year before anything is even near ready to present to the electors.

Second, NOTHING, I repeat NOTHING, can be built until the committee holds a PUBLIC HEARING with the electors to present their recommendations as to what they feel are the best options. Usually, a couple of different options are presented at that time for the electors to consider. That public hearing will be properly noticed per state statute for all to be informed. (This might be a good time to mention that all our "concerned residents" should make it their priority to watch the official town paper for all such notices so they can keep themselves informed. The town uses the Forest Republican and the front notice board of the town hall.) Anyway, at the Public Hearing the electors can review, discuss, make suggestions, recommend changes or even TURN DOWN the proposals of the committee.

Third, the issue of Village Powers for the town was brought up. I can only guess this was brought out of left field in an attempt to scuttle the possible building of the new town hall. A Town should NEVER give up village powers once it has been given them by the electors. The Wisconsin Town's Association, UW Extension and other entities all highly recommend towns adopt village powers to insure their autonomy from counties and states. Village Powers for a town does NOT mean the board can go out and do things without the electors consent, because state statute dictates these powers are super-ceded by the town statutes in matters of land purchases, capital expenditures, town board size and salaries, taxes and other things. Giving up Village Powers also means giving up your own town planning, zoning, site review, regulatory rights and many other things that would leave a town at the mercy of the county or state. I personally believe we are much better off with our own town-oriented planning and zoning than someone else's opinion of what is good for us and that is the sole reason I volunteered for the Plan Commission in the first place





Bear Lake Study

The Town of Blackwell will host a meeting on Saturday April 28, 2012 to review the findings of a two-year study on Bear Lake. The Town, with support from the U.S. Forest Service, the Association for Bear Lake and Environs (ABLE), the Aquatic Invasives Program of Forest County, and Bear Lake Shores Association, applied for a Department of Natural Resources Lake Management Grant to look into reasons for some algae issues the lake had been facing for several years and how the problem can possibly be managed. The meeting will be held at the Blackwell Town Hall at the intersection of County Highways H and T and will begin at 10:00 a.m.

Under the direction of the Center for Watershed Science and Education at the University of Wisconsin Stevens Point, teams of lake area residents had been taking water samples and recording various findings every two to three weeks from ice out to freeze over in 2010 and 2011. Center Director Nancy Turyk will be reviewing the results after a short session to get the thoughts of residents and users as to their expectations of a future Bear Lake. Besides reviewing some of the final data participants will also hear the results of several lake vegetation studies which have been conducted. In addition, they will learn about the equipment used and how testing is done. There will be ample time for questions. Lunch will be served.

Fourth, the motions to appoint a "Transportation Oversight Committee", a "Town Building Exploratory Committee" (isn't that what we have already?), and a "Budgetary Review, Audit and Oversight Committee". The group was already complaining about the "abuse" of taxpayer dollars. Do we need a committee to review hiring someone to oversee a 2-man highway crew? Is someone looking for a Job? In many towns, this is usually done by one board member being selected to monitor the actions of the town crew. I do agree a personnel file should be kept and information on the employees kept for review and, if needed, disciplinary actions recorded. The issue of clutter around the garage and improper storage of equipment was dealt with by the board quickly, within 48 hours of it being brought up, and I would venture Mr. Webb has also been talked to regarding his actions. As for budget review, audit and oversight, the Annual Budget Meeting in November, held per state statute, duly noticed and attended by any elector who makes themselves aware of it, serves that purpose. What better oversight could there be than to have the taxpayers of the town present to ask questions and get explanations for all expenditures? The budget is approved at that time by the electors (there's those people again!), not the town board. And, as Ms. Black stated, the town has a full audit EVERY year, and that audit report is public record and can be viewed at any time, just like the annual budget.

Incidentally, none of these items were on the agenda for the Annual Meeting but Chairman Black allowed everyone to have their say (for 3+ hours!) and did not tell anyone to shut up.

I realize this is somewhat lengthy but others have had lots to say and some of it does not deserve a response. I will just say I did not know any of the town officials before moving here but have made it a point to attend "my" town meetings and get involved in the community, and I have been impressed with the time and effort they put in on behalf of the town. They did not deserve the accusations, innuendoes and disrespect they were afforded last Tuesday.


