Cut your own Christmas tree on your National Forest

A cutting permit costs \$5 per tree and can be purchased at any U.S. Forest Service District Ranger Station. Up to five permits can be sold to a household. Permits and maps may be also obtained by mail but you must allow time for a check to travel through the mail and the permit to be returned.

"Bringing home a tree from a national forest is a wonderful holiday tradition," said U.S. Forest Service Eastern Regional Forester Kathleen Atkinson. "We want to make sure families are safe this holiday season as they venture into the forest to find the perfect tree - be aware of changing weather conditions, dress accordingly and always follow safe cutting practices."

Here are some tips for a safe and successful tree search:

- Make sure your chosen tree is on National Forest System lands; visitor maps can be viewed or purchased at Forest Service offices including your local district ranger office.
- Tree cutting is not permitted in designated wilderness areas or in marked timber sales.
- Choose a cutting area that is away from private property, plantations, body of water, developed recreation or administration sites.
- Select a tree the correct size for your home. Please don't cut the top off of a taller tree.
- Arrive early at your cutting area. It may take longer than you think to find that special tree.
- Be prepared for a winter outdoor experience. Wear proper clothing, bring plenty of snacks and water and make sure your vehicle is prepared for winter travel. Many national forest roads are not maintained or plowed during the winter.
- Let someone know where you are going and when to expect you back.
- Don't rely on your cell phone as it may not work in many areas of the forest.

Don't forget a rope and tarp to protect your tree for the ride home.

- Cut your tree a bit longer than you'll need (6 to 12 inches), so you'll have room to make a fresh cut on the bottom just before bringing it into the warm house. Don't cut it too much in advance as it will begin to seal up.
- Get your tree into its stand as soon as possible.

Ron Strong, 4th Degree Black Belt, had his first class in Soo Bahk Do last Tuesday at the new Outside the Box Fitness Center soon to open in Crandon. Soo Bahk Do is a Korean style, hard and soft techniques, empty hand, type of karate. Participants do this for physical fitness, to develop better personal control and discipline, balance, personal confidence and self defense. There is also an anti-bullying program in the training. The classes are divided by age groups, and the group above is age 7 to adult. On Wednesdays, there will be a class for 4-6 year old kids. There is also a teen-age and adult class held on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

To participate, equipment isn't necessary. There is a charge of \$25 a month for the youngest, and the older groups pay \$50 per month. There are also family and veteran discounts available.


Last year, Reedsville took home the first place trophy and were followed by the Tomahawk Hatchets. Placing third were the Norway Knights.

As the tree warms and thaws it will take up water; it will need a lot more when it's new, so check the reservoir frequently in the beginning. Even though it has been cut, your tree is still "alive" and the needles will take on water. As the days go on, the cells in the cut end react to the wound and seal up and less water will be used, and the tree will begin to die.The Chequamegon-Nicolet also has permits that allow for the collection of up to 25 pounds of balsam boughs for personal use in decorating for the holidays. There is no charge for these permits however, you do need to get one from a

Sokaogon Community Youth Rain Cloud Woman - Zatrina **Marie McGeshick**

Tribal Member Zatrina Marie McGeshick appears to be much like any other high school student her age. Zatrina is the daughter of Mole Lake Tribal Chairman Chris McGeshick and Tamarr Vollmar. She has three sisters and three brothers, and is an auntie to her one year old nephew, Dalton. Zatrina shares a special relationship with Dalton and takes being an "Auntie" as serious business. As she puts it he is "her world" because of their special bond. She also takes her school work as serious business, maintaining an A average as an honor student. Every weekday morning Zatrina takes Dalton to school with her and drops him off at day care and heads down the hall to the high school. Being a small community, Laona School houses daycare through 12th grade. This happens to be ideal for Zatrina as every chance she gets she can stop in and see "her world," which not even a year ago would have been a serious struggle physically for Zatrina.

To the unknowing eye she is a young pillar of health, both mentally and physical but underneath Zatrina

Family thought it was growing pains and doctors initially mis-diagnosed her with rheumatoid arthritis. Zatrina will never play sports like most teens, she cannot be exposed to sunlight for long periods of time and she will take medication most all of her life because there is no cure for Lyme Disease. But Zatrina is determined not to let a serious life altering disease stop her

As a little girl Zatrina told her mom that when she grew up she wanted to be a baby doctor. In 3rd grade, Zatrina remembers picking up a book with all the different kinds of doctors and going through it until she saw what she was looking for: Neonatologist. A Neonatologist is a doctor who specializes in high risk pregnancies, babies born prematurely, or with serious illness or injury.

from her goals and aspirations, and as far as anyone can tell,

Looking ahead at her college career, Zatrina knew she needed to take two years of foreign language. She approached Mrs. Krueger, Laona's Guidance Counselor, and asked if she could take Ojibwe Language to meet the foreign language requirement. Mrs. Krueger worked through the summer to make the Ojibwe Language course a reality and when school started this year, Zatrina was set to take "Boozhoo Speech Ojibwe 1", a four credit college course offered by Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe Community College. Every day for an hour, Zatrina sits down in an empty classroom and turns on an iTV and joins college students from Lac Courte Oreilles, four students from Unity High School and two students from Everest High School. During the Ojibwe Language course, instructors Ralph and Delores Pewaush and Marjorie Eagleman, taught and spoke of a traditional way of life and Ojibwe ceremonies. One ceremony intrigued Zatrina - The Naming Ceremony. Inspired with a goal, Zatrina went home





and asked her father if he would help her start the process of asking for her Indian name.

Her father took her to "Kekek" Jason Stark and Zatrina offered tobacco. After offering tobacco and asking for help in finding her name, Kekek said, "I knew you were coming. I dreamed about it and I already have your name. When you are ready to hold your ceremony, tell me and I will give you your name." Excitedly Zatrina made preparations with her family and friends and chose her We'eh's (sponsors). The sponsors act as surrogate, or Godparents, who provide life-long guidance and support to their namesake. The Naming Ceremony was held at the Mole Lake Tribal Center this past weekend. At the ceremony, Kekek gave Zatrina her name, a name that came to him in a dream and one that would be passed on from his own sister, as it was also her Indian name -Gimiwananakwadokwe which means "Rain Cloud Woman".

Honored with her name and inspired with a connection to her history and culture, "Rain Cloud Woman" will continue taking Ojibwe language classes 1, 2, 3 and 4, and eventually Ojibwe Literature and Story Telling throughout the rest of her schooling. Zatrina authored a Children's Book in Ojibwe called Awesiinh "Wild Animals" as part of her Semester Midterm. She has dedicated Awesiinh "Wild Animals" to Dalton, passing down the language she is learning and making it a part of her family's everyday life.






Aquatic Invasive Species under the ice

Winter has arrived and lakes are starting to freeze. With this change in season comes placing your boat in storage and bringing out the ice auger, tip-ups and shanty. The threat of aquatic invasive species doesn't go away when the lake starts to make ice. When on the ice please follow these rules to prevent the spread of Zebra mussels, Spiny water fleas, Eurasian water milfoil and other invasive species.

Inspect ice fishing equipment and

- Remove attached aquatic plants, mud and animals before leaving the ice
- Drain all water from equipment and containers containing fish prior to leaving the ice

2 gallons of water may be kept for minnows

- Do not move live fish away from a waterbody
- ** Buy minnows from a Wisconsin licensed bait dealer and use leftover minnows only under certain conditions

Leftover minnows can be taken home and reused on the same body of water. Leftover minnows can be used on other waters only if no lake water or fish were added to their container.

Remember it is up to all of us to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species.



Animal Resource Fund

It's hard to believe, but we are nearing the end of our seventh year with Animal Resource Fund.

We have made some changes along the way, and made some modifications in some of the ways we help animals, but have remained the same in the basic principles we stand by. At the close of each year, we vow to help more animals in more ways in the coming New

The one basic thing that we continue to do is make sure no animal goes hungry. That means we keep the shelves at NEWCAP food pantry stocked with both dog and cat food at all times. Schaefer's Food Mart has continued to donate the plastic bags that we re-bag the food in, and that has really helped cut our expenses. We also make sure that people feeding cats out on their own can count on our help if their finances make supplying the necessary food difficult. This year we bought and distributed 10 tons of food.

A.R.F. has taken many animals into our foster care network in 2014. Even with no facility, we have given care, sterilization surgeries, vaccinations and new homes to every cat and dog that has been made known to us. Once in a while we may have no open foster care, but we'll always figure out a way to help in some way. We have recently begun construction of dog houses.

We get calls nearly daily from those having difficulty financing the vet care for their beloved fourlegged family member who is sick or injured. Thankfully, we have never had to say we couldn't help. Needless to say, we appreciate donations from those we have helped when they are financially able. They realize that the next person needing medical care for their pet just may be

Our biggest fund raiser of the year is our Annual Spring Rummage/Antique sale which this year was held Saturday, June 7th.

This is when we put everything in high gear because of the volume of merchandise we acquire for the sale. We always hold this event at the Nashville Town Hall, as we do all of our events, including shot clinics, etc. I'm proud to say that our Town has always been a strong advocate for animal welfare. The vendors from the Nashville Flea and Craft Market have adopted A.R.F. as their charitable organization, and Linda Radtke, Lindy Meizi, and Dan Berdan were there working with us days before, during the sale, and stayed to help with clean-up. Jeanne Kochenderfer and Jeannie Wyers were there helping also, as they do every year. Nancy Campbell from Wausau, came up to help with that sale as well.

Kathy Gibbs, another vendor at the Flea Market, who sells her great home-made bakery there, donates a portion of her earnings every week to A.R.F.

Thirteen year old Katie Campbell donates all of the earnings from the sales of her photographed greeting cards "Looking Through The Lens" to our organization.

In addition to all the other individual donations we received during the year, Tricia's Treasures and Flowers From the Heart remembered us. Our sale this year surpassed all expectations, and after the big sale, we were given donations from two estates. Lacking sufficient storage space, Dave & I decided to have a second sale at our home garage on the Saturday of Labor Day weekend.

We ran the sale only the one day, as all A.F.R.ers volunteer at the Brush Run that Sunday! Another success - we were able to sell practically everything.




Jake Kroll Wabeno High Student of the Week

The DNR look at the 2014 gun deer season

With new rule changes this year, deer hunters throughout Wisconsin embraced the excitement of another nine-day gun deer season. A continued commitment to safe hunting led to an all-time low for recorded hunting incidents during the nine-day season.

"Deer hunters throughout the state have been excellent partners in not only learning new rules, but passing on traditions to youth and first-time hunters out there in the woods," said Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Secretary Cathy Stepp. "As always, we put safety first, and the efforts of hunters to do the same led to a banner year for safe hunting in Wisconsin."

Preliminary harvest summary

This year's preliminary harvest figures indicate a total of 191,550 deer harvested. The overall buck harvest of 90,336 was down roughly 8 percent. Minnesota, Illinois and lowa have seen a similar decline in overall harvest in 2014.

Kevin Wallenfang, DNR big game ecologist, said the northeast and southern counties saw buck kills that were virtually unchanged compared to 2013. The largest decline in buck harvest figures was observed in the far northern counties, where it decreased by 18 percent compared to 2013. This area also saw a 58 percent decrease in antlerless harvest. This was a designed reduction in antlerless harvest in an attempt to increase deer numbers in the Northern Forest Zone. Overall, statewide antlerless harvest saw a 21 percent decline from 2013

Western counties saw a decrease in buck harvest of roughly 8 percent, with the bulk of the decline seen in counties that are farthest north within the region and/or counties that include portions of the Central Forest Zone.

Preliminary nine-day harvest numbers are collected through a call-around survey of over 600 deer registration stations all across Wisconsin and likely will increase when all registration tags are officially counted. Wisconsin sees all-time low for recorded hunting incidents during nine-day hunt

During the nine-day hunt, a total of three confirmed shooting related incidents were reported - this is an all-time low.

"Over one million hunters have attended a hunter education course since 1967, and with that many hunters knowing the firearm safety rules we will continue to see a safer hunting tradition in Wisconsin," said Jon King, DNR conservation warden and hunter education administrator. More than 28,000 students complete the hunter safety program every year, thanks to the work of more than 4,100 volunteer hunter education instructors. Before the hunter education course started, hunter fatalities during the season often reached double digits.

Hunters asked to participate in online Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey and County Deer Advisory Council Survey

The Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey is still active until the end of all deer seasons and wildlife managers are asking hunters to send in a report of what they saw during the just completed nine-day gun hunt and during any hunting trips they make through the end of all deer hunting seasons. This information provides valuable data biologists use to improve population estimates for Wisconsin's deer herds and other species.

December County Deer Advisory Council meetings will be open to the public for any additional comments as the councils finalize their recommendations. To view a meeting schedule, visit dnr.wi.gov and search keyword "CDAC."

An online survey is also available through Dec. 5 for those who are unable to attend their county's meeting and would like to provide feedback.

2014 license sales

The department's license sales office reported 608,711 gun deer and 226,872 archer and crossbow (not including upgrades) licenses sold through midnight on Nov. 30, which signaled the close of the 2014 nine-day deer hunt. Deer license and tag sales will continue through additional hunting seasons.

Approximately 38,000 licenses were issued to hunters 12 years of age or older who were purchasing a license to hunt deer for the first time, or to those hunting for the first time in 10 years. Female deer hunters have continued to increase in number, and accounted for 35 percent of adults and 36 percent of juniors who purchased a first time resident gun deer license.

Whether you enjoy fall foliage or chasing that trophy white-tailed deer, it's time to grab your camera and snap pictures or shoot a video showcasing your favorite activities to share with friends and family this time of year.

Additional deer hunting opportunities continue through December

There are additional opportunities to hunt deer in Wisconsin after the close of the nine-day season. The muzzleloader season is currently open through Dec. 10. The late archery season is also underway and continues until Jan. 4, 2015. There is also a Central Forest and Central Farmland antlerless hunt Dec. 11-14, and a Southern Farmland Zone Holiday Hunt, which runs from Dec. 24 through Jan. 1, 2014. It is important to note that the gun deer season for metro sub-units continues through Dec. 10, and archery through Jan. 31.

Deer Advisory Council meetings to be held in December

MADISON -- The final County Deer Advisory Council meeting of 2014 will be held in each county in December, and will provide the public with an important opportunity to provide input regarding each county's deer population objectives before recommendations are advanced to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

These objectives will guide deer management decisions for the next three years - the public is encouraged to attend and participate in a local council meeting.

December meetings will be open to the public for any additional comments as the councils finalize their recommendations. To view a meeting schedule, visit dnr.wi.gov and search keyword "CDAC."

An online survey is also available through Dec. 5 for those who are unable to attend their county's meeting and would like to provide feedback.

Preliminary recommendations, made during October council meetings, suggested an increase, decrease or maintenance in the local deer population. Councils considered scientific deer metrics and stakeholder and public opinion to develop a preliminary population objective recommendation.

To develop a final recommendation, each council will consider survey responses and professional opinions from department wildlife biologists, foresters and law enforcement. Final population objective recommendations will be presented to the department following December council meetings, after which they will be sent to the Natural Resources Board for approval in March. Once approved, population objectives will go into effect for the next three years, starting with the 2015 deer season.

Beginning in February, County Deer Advisory Councils will reconvene to develop antlerless quota recommendations that will move the deer herd toward their population objectives.

New Members sought for Forest Service Resource Advisory Committees

Rhinelander, Wis. (Nov. 25, 2014) – The Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest is seeking community members to serve on the Forest's Resource Advisory Committees (RAC).

The Chequamegon-Nicolet has two advisory committees one serving the east land base, the Nicolet, and the other serving the west land base, the Chequamegon.


The purpose of Resource Advisory Committees is to improve collaborative relationships among the people that use and care for the National Forests and to provide advice and recommendations to the Forest Service concerning projects and funding consistent with Title II of the Secure Rural Schools Act.

These projects must have broad community-based support with objectives that improve Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest lands and resources. Projects must be on public land, but can occur on private land if it can be demonstrated that there is a benefit to public land resources.

Title II funds are used to fund projects that have broad community-based support with objectives that may include, but are not limited to: road, trail, and infrastructure maintenance or obliteration; soil productivity improvements; improvements in forest ecosystem health; watershed restoration and maintenance; restoration, maintenance, and improvement of wildlife and fish habitat; control of noxious and exotic weeds; hazardous fuels reduction; and reintroduction of native species. Projects must be on public land, but can occur on private land if it can be demonstrated that there is a benefit to public land resources. Resource Advisory Committees are responsible for reviewing and recommending projects for implementation.


