


Thirty students took part in this lake lesson, and they moved from station to station, where different subjects were taught.

To obtain an official ID card, there are documentation requirements such as a birth certificate, but if all documentation is not available, the ID Petition Process (IDPP) can be used to quickly obtain a receipt valid for voting while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained.

DMV offers this IDPP service free of charge if needed for the purpose of voting.

Targeted CWD surveillance efforts ramping up in Oneida, Forest and Vilas Counties

RHINELANDER, Wis. - In cooperation with local businesses, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources will collect deer heads for chronic wasting disease surveillance testing Oneida, Vilas and Forest counties during the 2016 archery and gun hunting

If you harvest an adult deer within these counties please consider submitting a sample from any harvested adult deer for CWD testing.

These efforts are in response to two deer harvested in an Oneida County hunting preserve testing positive for Chronic Wasting Disease in late 2015. The first step toward protecting the wild deer herd in this area of the state was the legislatively mandated enactment of a baiting and feeding ban in the three counties on Jan. 11, hunting, search keyword "deer." 2016 to reduce risk for disease transmission.

Steps that followed for this targeted area of the state included developing sampling strategies including car-killed deer, sick and injured deer reports, and deer harvested during regular hunting seasons and is a consistent response to new CWD detections in either wild or captive cervids.

Sick deer reports

Samples will be collected from sick adult deer exhibiting signs of CWD in all three counties. Everyone is encouraged to keep an eye out for deer that appear sick or are otherwise acting abnormally so biologists can assess if symptoms are consistent with CWD infection. Sick deer can be reported to the Woodruff, Rhinelander, and Florence DNR offices or directly to the following DNR Wildlife Management staff:

Vilas County - Michele Woodford, 751-356-5211, ext. 207;

Oneida County - Jeremy Holtz, 715-365-8999; and Forest County - Chuck McCullough, 715-623-4190, ext.

Car-killed deer

DNR staff will collect samples from adult deer killed by vehicles within ten miles of Three Lakes as

opportunities arise. Individuals who wish to keep car-killed deer can still do so, but are encouraged to allow DNR staff to collect samples beforehand. Deer can be sampled by contacting the biologists listed previously.

CWD samples will be collected from adult deer harvested by hunters in all three counties during the 2016-17 deer hunting seasons. Head samples will be collected at cooperating locations throughout the area. Sampling location information is still being updated - check the CWD sampling webpage for updates as additional locations are added. In addition, hunters may also contact the DNR Wildlife Management staff listed above.

Wisconsin's citizens and cooperators have played a key role in CWD sampling efforts in Wisconsin, and department staff would like to thank all participants and collection cooperators for their continued efforts.

Johnson offers bill to give people in Wisconsin more options on health insurance next year

Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) joined Sen. Lamar Alexander (R-Tenn.) and six other colleagues Wednesday in introducing the State Flexibility to Provide Affordable Health Options Act, legislation that would give states the ability to help their residents who are faced with significant premium increases and limited options on Obamacare exchanges.

"I have worked for years to limit the damage and harm done to real people by Obamacare, a partisan policy that promised marketplace competition and higher quality health plans at lower costs and instead delivered the exact opposite," Sen. Johnson said. "This bill would provide necessary relief to Wisconsinites who, under Obamacare, would be penalized for not purchasing a product that they cannot afford or does not meet their needs. It will allow the state to provide Wisconsinites receiving subsidies more options than just those offered on the Obamacare exchanges for 2017.'

While this bill would only apply for plan year 2017 as a temporary step while work continues on efforts to repeal and replace Obamacare with more successful reforms, it would be a significant step to free Americans who are currently suffering the serious negative consequences of Obamacare. It would give states with failing Obamacare exchanges the authority to allow residents to purchase plans outside of the exchanges, even with subsidies. Residents in states that elect to do so will not be subject to the individual mandate.

Projections for 2017 include premiums rising by double-digit percentages and more limited options under Obamacare. Over 30 percent of U.S. counties are expected to have just one insurer offering plans on Obamacare exchanges; four counties in Wisconsin are expected to only have one insurer, according to the Kaiser Family Foundation. Despite increasing costs and decreasing competition, Americans and Wisconsinites are being forced either to purchase a product that they do not want and cannot afford to use - or to face a tax

The legislation, introduced by Sens. Ron Johnson, Lamar Alexander (R-Tenn.), Kelly Ayotte (R-N.H.), John Barrasso (R-Wyo.), Thad Cochran (R-Miss.), Mark Kirk (R-III.), David Perdue (R-Ga.), and Rob Portman (R-Ohio), would:

· Give states with a failing Obamacare exchange the authority to allow residents to use their Obamacare subsidy to purchase any health plan of their choice, even those off the exchange, for the 2017 plan year.

If the state chooses to use this authority to allow residents to use subsidies outside of the exchange, the legislation will waive the Obamacare law's requirement that you must buy a specific health care plan or pay a fine of as much as \$2,000 for a family of four next year.

DNR asks for hunters to record their wildlife observation

MADISON -- With the start of the 2016 deer hunting season Sept. 17, the Department of Natural Resources is kicking off its eighth annual Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey, an easy-to-do survey where hunters can record their observations of deer and other wildlife while out hunting. Survey results help track population trends for Wisconsin's deer herd and other wildlife.

"The Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey is a fun opportunity for hunters to share their enthusiasm for wildlife while helping survey efforts," says Jes Rees Lohr, DNR wildlife research scientist.

The DNR asks hunters to record all of their hunting activity throughout the deer season, even if no wildlife sightings were made during a hunt. The observations provide the DNR with an index to abundance for many wildlife species.

At the end of each year, participants will receive a personalized summary of all recorded wildlife from that season. Participants can access the survey by going to the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, and searching keyword "Deer Hunter Wildlife." Tally sheets can be filled out either electronically or printed from the site. The survey period ends January 2016

Hunters can also send in their trail camera photos. The Trail Camera Gallery [exit DNR]. can be accessed through the Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey webpage. Check back often as the site is updated as soon as new photos are sent in.

Baldwin, McCain, Schakowsky introduce reform requiring transparency in prescription drug price increases

The bipartisan and bicameral FAIR Drug Pricing Act takes the first step to address skyrocketing prescription drug costs

Drug corporations' aggressive increases in prescription drug prices are making lifesaving treatments unaffordable for families, taxpayers and the healthcare system

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and John McCain (R-AZ) and U.S. Representative Jan Schakowsky (D-IL) today introduced the FAIR Drug Pricing Act. The bipartisan and bicameral Fair Accountability and Innovative Research (FAIR) Drug Pricing Act takes the first step in addressing skyrocketing prescriptions drug prices by requiring transparency for pharmaceutical corporations that plan to increase drug prices.

"Drug corporations are sticking it to American taxpayers with soaring prescription drug prices," said Senator Baldwin. "This bipartisan reform will require transparency and accountability for drug corporations who are jacking up costs for families in need of affordable lifesaving treatments."

"Like many Americans, far too many Arizonans have been unfairly burdened by the rising costs of prescription medication," said Senator McCain. "The American people should not be forced to choose between filling a prescription or making their monthly mortgage payment. This legislation would bring much-needed transparency to prescription drug prices – a policy that 8 in 10 Americans support, according to the Kaiser Family Foundation. Transparency leads to accountability, and it is past time that mantra applied to the skyrocketing cost of prescription medication.

"The American public is demanding to know why life-saving prescription drugs – many developed with their taxpayer dollars - cost so much," said Rep. Schakowsky. "The FAIR Drug Pricing Act will provide those answers. Prescription drug corporations should not be allowed to hide behind a curtain, refusing to disclose information on drug prices and price gouging with impunity. Congress has sat by while Mylan increased the cost of life-saving EpiPens from \$100 to over \$600, while Gleevec, a cancer drug that came on the market at \$30,000 now costs more than \$100,000. The average cost of insulin has gone up 231%. Now is the time for action. That is why I am proud to stand with Senator Tammy Baldwin, Senator John McCain, and the AARP introducing this long overdue legislation to expose the profiteering of drug corporations."

Reports show that major drug corporations have drastically raised prices for top-selling drugs over the past five years, in some cases more than doubling prices. Most recently, this troubling trend garnered significant public interest after Mylan increased the list price for a package of two EpiPen Auto-Injectors from just over \$100 to more than \$600. Despite the intense criticism, pharmaceutical corporations are continuing to increase their prices. A survey from the Kaiser Family Foundation found that nearly three-quarters of Americans believe that the prices for prescription drugs are unreasonable and 76% of those respondents credit this to pharmaceutical corporations setting the drug prices too high.

With these aggressive increases in prescription drug prices, drug corporations are making lifesaving treatments unaffordable for families, seniors, taxpayers and our health care system. U.S. prescription drug spending reached a record high of \$425 billion in 2015, accounting for almost 16.7 percent of all U.S. health care spending, with expectations that spending will surpass \$600 billion by 2020. American taxpayers and individuals who rely on these prescription drugs are paying for these price increases, without any knowledge of why or what they are getting for their money.

"It's abundantly clear that we need to address the unsustainable trend of sky-high prescription drug prices,"


said AARP CEO Jo Ann Jenkins. "The FAIR Drug Pricing Act is an important step in demanding more transparency from pharmaceutical companies when they dramatically raise the prices of their products."

"For the millions of Americans who depend on life-saving medicines, open and honest prescription drug pricing is critical," said John Rother, executive director for the Campaign for Sustainable Rx Pricing (CSRxP). "This bipartisan bill will give patients and taxpayers more information when drug corporations raise prices and is an important first step toward fixing America's broken prescription drug market."

The FAIR Drug Pricing Act would require drug manufacturers to disclose and provide more information about planned drug price increases, including research and development costs. Increased transparency will help provide much-needed context for taxpayers, consumers and policymakers about the costs and value of medications, and may also give incentives to companies to reassess the long-standing practice of relentless drug price increases.

Specifically, the FAIR Drug Pricing Act would require drug manufacturers to notify the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and submit a transparency and justification report 30 days before they increase the price of certain drug products by more than 10 percent. The report will require manufacturers to provide a justification for each price increase, manufacturing, research and development costs for the qualifying drug, net profits attributable to the qualifying drug, marketing and advertising spending on the qualifying drug, and other information as deemed appropriate. The bill will not prohibit manufacturers from increasing prices, but it will, for the first time, give taxpayers notice of price increases and bring basic transparency to the market for prescription drugs.

The FAIR Drug Pricing Act is also supported by The Medicare Rights Center, Consumers Union, Doctors for America: Drug Price, Value, and Affordability Campaign, Families USA and the Center for Medicare Advocacy, Inc. and Public Citizen.

Visit Wisconsin forests to enjoy the fall color change

MADISON - A warm and wet summer has set the stage for a spectacular fall color change, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources forestry experts say.

The beauty of Wisconsin's forests attracts many visitors, especially during the next two months as the showy fall colors begin in the Northwoods and move through the state to southern Wisconsin.

"People often ask us where to go to see the best colors," said Kirsten Held, DNR outreach specialist with the Division of Forestry. "The answer is anywhere in the state. It's all a matter of keeping track where the color is

Peak fall color varies slightly from year to year depending on the weather conditions, but the shortened day length is the primary trigger for trees to begin changing color. Peak fall color usually occurs in far northern Wisconsin during the last week of September and first week of October. However, the first hints of color typically appear in isolated, lower lying areas by mid-September. Peak color generally occurs in central Wisconsin during mid-October and in southern Wisconsin during the latter half of October.

With state, county and federal forests as well as state parks and natural areas accessible to the public throughout the state, it's possible to follow the progression of fall colors from hundreds of locations. In addition to viewing colors from your car or along walking trails, many of the public forest lands offer the opportunity to enjoy the colors while paddling down a river or on a lake.

Wisconsin's State Forests - Black River, Brule River, Flambeau River, Governor Knowles, Northern Highland-American Legion, Peshtigo River, Point Beach, and Kettle Moraine's six units -- are great for fall color viewing. Find other state forests, parks, trails and recreation areas for viewing options on the DNR website,

Weather during the growing season is critical for the abundant quantity of leaves needed to provide the potential for an excellent fall color display, Held said. In many areas of the state, 2016 has produced a healthy crop of leaves. Already, a few red maples have started to turn in northern Wisconsin, signaling the start of the annual show within the next couple of weeks.

"The intensity of the fall color season is dependent on the weather that Wisconsin receives during September and October," Held said. "To have the most brilliant and vibrant fall color display, a series of fall days filled with bright sunshine and cool, but frost free, evenings are required."

The duration of the fall color season is related to the intensity of wind and rain during late-September and October. High winds and driving rains cause significant numbers of the leaves to fall from the trees, which can prematurely shorten the display.

While the annual fall color show is a huge attraction for the thousands who flock to Wisconsin, and contribute to the state's strong tourism industry, the economic impact of the forests themselves is even more significant.

"While the fall color show, orchestrated by Mother Nature using the state's 17.1 million acres of forests, is an important contributor to the state's economy, wood

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products from the state's forests contribute \$24.7 billion to the Wisconsin economy each year," Held said.

What causes trees to turn color?

The timing of fall color in Wisconsin's forests is determined more by the shortening daylight hours than it is by temperature, but temperature and other weather conditions play a big role in the intensity and duration of fall colors, said Held.

There are three types of pigments that are directly involved in producing colorful leaf displays: chlorophyll, carotenoids and anthocyanins. Here's how they work:

Chlorophyll is present in the leaves during the growing season and gives the leaves their green color. In the process called photosynthesis, chlorophyll utilizes the sun's energy to produce simple sugars - the tree's food - from water and carbon dioxide.

Carotenoids are present in the leaf chloroplasts also, but because the green coloration of the chlorophylls predominate, they aren't seen through the growing season. The carotenoid pigments are responsible for the yellow colorations of fall leaves.

Anthocyanins produce the brilliant reds and purples that everyone associates with a spectacular fall color season. This color pigment develops in the early autumn within the leaf cells to protect the leaves from bright light as biological processes transition from food production to storage. During this period, called senescence, the leaves' photo synthetic components are broken down and the nutrients, mainly nitrogen and phosphorus, are moved within the tree for storage and use the following year.

Certain tree and shrub species are commonly associated with differing colors during the fall: green ash, white birch and aspen turn golden yellow; red maple a brilliant red; oak and hickory become a reddish-brown color; white ash a deep purple; and sumac a scarlet red. Even tamarack turns a beautiful deep golden yellow and loses its needles in the fall, the only conifer (evergreen) tree in Wisconsin to shed its needles.

Discovery of new bat species in Wisconsin cheers biologists

MADISON - After a decade of bad news about bats dying from white-nose syndrome, Wisconsin bat researchers have literally caught some good news.

While searching Avon Bottoms State Wildlife Area in Rock County to learn more about the summer habitats of bat species vulnerable to white-nose syndrome, they caught in their nets an evening bat, a new bat species that had never before been reported in Wisconsin.

They radio-tracked the evening bat back to her roost and found her roosting with 60 other evening bats. Returning a few weeks later to the same wildlife area, they radio-tracked two other female bats and discovered a roost with 103 individuals.

"It was pretty cool to find a maternity colony of evening bats," says Heather Kaarakka, one of the DNR bat researchers. "It's never been recorded before in Wisconsin and it's a pretty under-studied species generally."

The edge of evening bats' historic range has been close to the Wisconsin-Illinois border, so it's not terribly surprising that the species was found here, she says. "It means they are possibly slowing moving north."

And that's good news because evening bats are not believed to be susceptible to white-nose syndrome. They do not hibernate in caves but fly south to Florida in the winter and then return north in the spring. Only the females move north and roost in tree cavities. They are insectivorous, eating beetles with their strong jaws and consuming agricultural pests like root worm and cucumber beetle.

Kaarakka was hopeful they would find more evening bats after catching a juvenile evening bat in their net in summer 2015 at Avon Bottoms. At first they thought they had caught a big brown bat, a common species in Wisconsin, but knew something wasn't quite right and they noticed a burnt orange smell as they handled the bat.

They suspected what they had was an evening bat, took some photos, made some common measurements of the bat, and let it go. They shared their information and photos with other bat biologists, confirmed it was an evening bat, and resolved to look for the species in 2016 when they revisited the site. Because the bat was a juvenile and had been found within 5 miles of the Illinois-Wisconsin border, it could have been a bat born in Illinois that flew into Wisconsin accidentally.

"Now we can say it wasn't an accidental find. We found female bats and followed them back to sizeable colonies," said Paul White, DNR conservation biologist. "It is a really big deal."

The last time a new species of bat was documented in Wisconsin was in November 1954; the new species at that time, an Indiana bat, represented the one and only time an Indiana bat was documented in Wisconsin despite concerted efforts in the 1980s and 1990s to find the species again.

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Youth Deer Hunt Oct. 8-9 will provide great opportunity to introduce young hunters to the outdoors

MADISON -- Youth hunters and those interested in mentoring young hunters are reminded to mark their calendars for this year's youth deer hunt Oct. 8-9.

The youth hunt allows boys and girls ages 10-15 to hunt with a gun or other legal weapon prior to the regular firearm seasons. The youth hunt is open to all resident and non-resident youth hunters with a gun deer license and appropriate tags.

"This is a great opportunity for families and friends to mentor and train young hunters," said Keith Warnke, hunting and shooting sports coordinator for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. "The memories made last a lifetime and sharing our our amazing nature with our children is incredibly rewarding - I know from personal experiences with my own daughters."

It is important to note that the Junior Antlerless Deer carcass tag is NOT valid in Ashland, Forest and Sawyer counties. In addition, all hunters in the field are required to wear blaze orange during the Youth Deer Hunt.

All youth hunters must be accompanied by a mentor 18 years of age or older. Youth ages 12-15 with a hunter education certificate may hunt within visual and voice range of a mentor. When accompanying one or two youth ages 12-15 that have successfully completed hunter education, a mentor is not required to possess a hunter education certificate or a current hunting license.

Hunters ages 10 and 11, as well as those ages 12-15 that have not completed hunter education, may gain hunting experience under the Hunting Mentorship Program. This program requires youth to hunt within arm's reach of a qualified mentor who has completed hunter education and holds a current hunting license.

only one weapon may be possessed jointly between youth and mentor. Mentors may not hunt using a firearm during the youth deer hunt weekend, and must possess a valid Wisconsin hunting license for the current hunting season. License type does not matter, unless the mentor will be hunting other game.

Hunters of all ages are reminded to follow the four rules of firearm safety:

- Treat every gun as if it were loaded;
- Always point the muzzle in a safe direction;
- ·Be sure of your target and beyond; and
- Keep your finger out of the trigger guard until you are ready to shoot.

First-time hunters and those that have not purchased a license in at least 10 years are eligible for a discounted first-time buyer license. Visit dnr.wi.gov and search keyword "license" for more information.

As in previous years, those new to hunting can celebrate their first harvest with the official first deer or first hunt certificate. Simply follow the instructions on the page to upload a photo of your first deer and describe your experience. For more information, and to create your own first deer certificate, search keywords "first deer."

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


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Waterfowl hunters can help stop the spread of aquatic invasive species

MADISON - Healthy wetlands and waterways support strong waterfowl populations and as Wisconsin's goose and duck seasons get underway, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is asking for help from the state's dedicated hunters to help prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species.

"Wisconsin waterfowl hunters are committed to conservation and we appreciate their partnership in restoring and improving habitat," said Bob Wakeman, aquatic invasive species coordinator for DNR. "We want to get the word out about aquatic invasive species to make sure that hunters' investment of time and energy continues to pay off for waterfowl and is not diminished by the spread of damaging aquatic invaders.

In addition to the standard boating gear, waterfowl hunters often use decoys, dogs, waders and push poles that may contain water, debris and mud where invasive species such as zebra mussels and faucet snails can hide. Use of nonnative vegetation such as phragmites to help conceal blinds or boats also can lead to the inadvertent spread of species that clog waterways and crowd out more beneficial plants needed to provide food and shelter for ducks and geese.

Other types of aquatic invasive species may serve as hosts for parasites or bacteria that can kill waterfowl. As a result, Wakeman said DNR urges hunters to clean equipment as well as boats and check dogs' coats before leaving a hunting location.

To help share the message and provide tips for cleanup, this hunting season, DNR staff and partners will visit with hunters at key locations. On September 24, opening day for the North Zone, teams will be in the Green Bay and Mead Wildlife areas. On October 1, opening day for the South and Mississippi Zones, teams will be at access points in Horicon Marsh, southeast Wisconsin and along the Mississippi River.

To help protect waterfowl habitat and populations, hunters must take these simple steps before launching into and leaving a water body:

•Inspect waders, boats, trailers, motors and hunting equipment, including boots, blinds and dogs.

• Remove all plants, animals and mud.

• Drain all water from decoys, boats, motors, live wells and other hunting equipment.

Never move plants or live fish away from a water

body.

DNR also appreciates hunters' knowledge and experience in familiar hunting areas and encourages reporting new aquatic invasive species. Early detection is crucial to reducing or eliminating the harm from damaging species.

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



Johnson: Obamacare is consumer fraud

Johnson: "Let me be very clear what this administration did. Massive consumer fraud, that's what it was. Obamacare is a massive consumer fraud."

WASHINGTON — Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.), chairman of the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, and other senators on his committee heard testimony Thursday from representatives of state health insurance commissioners. The testimony led Johnson to label Obamacare a kind of consumer fraud.

One of the witnesses, Wisconsin Deputy Commissioner of Insurance J.P. Wieske, confirmed that the private information of 64,000 Wisconsinites will be transferred between insurers without their knowledge.

"We've got some agencies in the federal government, one set up under Dodd-Frank, called the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau," said Johnson. "We also have the FTC [to] take a look at consumer fraud try and protect consumers. I just wonder what kind of enforcement action they would take against an insurance company that sold a product, an insurance product that, say, once you buy this thing, you are going to be able to renew this forever. Because if you like this plan you can keep it. And then in the fine print, well, that's not true.

"In addition, [what if they] said this insurance plan allows you to keep your doctor, period. You are going to be able to keep your doctor, but in the fine print said, well, not if that doctor isn't part of the network that we're going to cover. And, three, that, if you buy this health care plan whatever you were paying last year, your premium is going to go down by \$2,500 dollars — instead, your premiums went up \$1,700 dollars or \$5,000 dollars. I just wonder what these federal regulatory agencies would do to an insurance company that engaged in that."

At this time of year, many senior receive numerous advertisements for health coverage. This influx of promotions is due to the Annual Open Enrollment Period. Each year, from October 15 through December 7, Medicare beneficiaries can enroll in or disenroll from Medicare Advantage and Part D plans.

Accordingly, health care companies promote their plans during this period.

You should be aware of Medicare's marketing guidelines because of this increased advertising. These guidelines aim to protect you from fraud and deception. Health care companies can promote their plans through mailings, television commercials, and radio advertisements. Additionally, with your invitation, agents can visit you in your home or nursing home. You should familiarize yourself with the marketing rules below, because this information can help you spot red flags and avoid becoming a victim of marketing fraud. Plans must provide potential enrollees with certain information, including:

- Any network requirements
- Specifics on the plan's coverage and costs
- Eligibility requirements
- Instructions on how to file an appeal or grievance
- · Written notice advising potential enrollees that costs can change year-to-year
 - Instructions and forms on how to enroll
- · Cover letter with the plan's customer service phone number along with the number to contact Medicare
 - Information on how to apply for extra help · Plans rating information
- · Translated marketing materials in any non-English language that is the primary language of at least 5% of the individuals in a plan's benefit package service area, available on their websites and in hard-copy upon request
- · Upon enrollment, a pharmacy and provider directory
 - A plan cannot:
 - "Cold call" you
 - Send you unsolicited e-mails
- · Visit you in your home or nursing home without invitation
- · Ask for personal or financial information over the
- phone
- · Provide gifts or prizes worth more than \$15 to encourage enrollment
 - Disregard "do not call again" requests
- · Market their plans at educational events or in health care settings
- · Sell you non-health care related products (ie life insurance or annuity)
- · Indicate that its plan is preferred or endorsed by Medicare
 - Imply that it works for or on behalf of Medicare

As a potential enrollee, you should verify all information that you receive from sales representatives. Virus strains included in the 2016-17 vaccines will be two Influenza type A (H1N1 & H3N2) and two Influenza type B-like virus. There are several brands and types of flu injections available, but live vaccine (flu mist) is not recommended this year.

Flu vaccination can keep you from getting sick with flu, and reduce risk of flu-associated hospitalization.

Flu vaccination is especially important for people with chronic health conditions.

Vaccination helps protect women during and after pregnancy. Vaccination also protects the developing baby during pregnancy and for several months after the baby is born.

Flu vaccination may make your illness milder if you do get sick. Getting vaccinated yourself also protects people

around you, including those who are more vulnerable to serious flu illness, like babies and young children, older people, and people with chronic health conditions. Ways to Prevent the Flu:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick Stay home when you are sick

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or into your elbow when coughing or sneezing

Wash your hands often with soap and water or an alcohol-based sanitizer

Clean or disinfect surfaces that are touched often at home, work, or school

Get plenty of sleep, stay physically active, eat nutritious foods, drink plenty of fluids



Baldwin Pushes for economic growth in Wisconsin with **Small Business Innovation Act**

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin today renewed her commitment to fueling startups, entrepreneurs and economic growth in Wisconsin by reintroducing the Small Business Innovation Act. The legislation will help Wisconsin overcome its nation-low startup activity and entrepreneurship growth rankings by providing small businesses the capital they need to grow their companies and create jobs.

"Wisconsin has a proud history of entrepreneurship and innovation, but recent reports show that we need to strengthen and support our Made in Wisconsin startups and small businesses," said Senator Baldwin. Last month, Senator Baldwin held a roundtable at Forward Fest to hear about the challenges Wisconsin small business startups face and discuss how to better support and strengthen Wisconsin's entrepreneurial spirit.

Senator Baldwin's Small Business Innovation Act provides investments in economic growth not through direct government funding, but through increased access to venture capital investments for small business startups. The legislation will help fuel small business and job creation by targeting growth industries including advanced manufacturing; biotechnology; clean energy; environmental and agricultural technology; digital and information technology; and water technology.

The Small Business Innovation Act also does something that Wisconsin's state venture capital fund does not—it includes Wisconsin biotechnology and life sciences. Wisconsin has been a leader in the areas of science, research, biotechnology, energy efficiency and water technology, and more must be done to seize the opportunity to harness and support these assets.






