NorthLakes Community Clinic Lakewood is selling raffle tickets each Friday at Mike's Supermarket in Townsend for its wacky fundraiser called The Shopping Spree to raise money for its Farm to Patient Program. The fundraiser event is like the television show Grocery Grab, where shoppers race through a grocery store, grabbing as many food items into their cart as the time constraints allow. The Shopping Spree is an enjoyable spectacle where the two pulled ticket winners will run through Mike's Supermarket in Townsend and grab up to \$500 of food in 60 seconds. The event will take place on Sunday, June 2, 2024.

Besides, the fundraising efforts, we recently received a grant from the Wisconsin Public Service Foundation to support The Farm to Patient program. This program recognizes that families living with poverty have shorter life spans due to chronic illnesses such as strokes, diabetes, and obesity. These health issues may be preventable through increasing access to fresh, nutritious vegetables while understanding and working on the underlying reasons for unhealthy food choices. NorthLakes distributes Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) boxes to low-income patients prescribed by one of our providers. The patients must have a willingness to create a change in their overall health. At the exchange of CSA boxes to the patients, there is education and an introduction to the vegetables in the box along with a discussion of any barriers such as cooking preparation, family adjustment to fresh food, adjustment of recipes, transportation challenges, and discussion of child care. This program is at the heart of NorthLakes Community Clinic's mission of responding to the community's health care needs with an integrated array of quality services and actively removing barriers to wellness.

To support this worthwhile program and a chance to win one of the two opportunities of a lifetime by running through Mike's Supermarket, raffle tickets will be available for \$10 each or 3 for \$25 until May 24 at NorthLakes Community Clinic in Lakewood, the Krist Station in Wabeno and Mike's Supermarket in Townsend during business hours.

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


#### Wabeno Elementary's Mid-Year Celebration

"Protecting Our Waters: We're All Connected!" Six-County Lakes Meeting on July 12

"Protecting Our Waters: We're All Connected" is the theme for the annual Northwoods Six-County Lakes Meeting, set for Friday, July 12, at Nicolet College. Lake association leaders and members along with the general public will convene to learn about and discuss our interconnected water resources and our human connections to each other and to our lakes, streams, wetlands and groundwater.

A committee with representatives from Oneida, Vilas, Forest, Langlade, Lincoln, and Iron counties is at work developing plans for the meeting. The program will include a fivemember panel discussion on the connections among water resources and the people who use them, along with presentations on the impacts of climate change and drought on our water resources and fisheries, and the problem of PFAS in the environment.

There will also be exhibits from educational and nonprofit organizations and excellent opportunities for networking. The meeting will run from 8:30 a.m. to noon. All are welcome; there is no charge and no need to register. More details and a full agenda will be announced as the meeting date approaches.

#### **Forest County Residents Vote** Down Referendum

Forest County residents voted down the April 2 referendum question to exceed the current levy limit of \$2,000,000. If passed, the referendum would have provided a stable funding source to maintain the current level of services and provide more regionally competitive wages for county employees. It would have had a tax impact of about \$120 per year on a \$100,000 home.

The unofficial results of the April 2 election are 30.6% yes to 69.4% no. A total of 2260 ballots were cast.

The Forest County Board of Supervisors will begin determining what services will be reduced or cut with the least possible impact on residents and employees while balancing the budget. All county services will now be evaluated for potential reductions starting in 2025.

Due to state law, the earliest the county could place another referendum question on the ballot is 2026. The soonest those funds would be available is 2027.

The Forest County Board of Supervisors remains committed to providing the highest quality services possible to the community and thanks everyone who voted on this important ballot question.

The County Board of Canvassers will certify the election results at their April 9 meeting.



My mind whirred. Christian, what? When? Where? How? "Mom?" my voice choked and my eyes swam with tears, "Is-is he dead?"

"No, but he's not okay. He has broken ribs and a punctured lung. He's in emergency surgery right now," Mom spoke slowly, trying to contain her emotions.

"We need to go see him," I was beginning to panic. My brother's life was in jeopardy.

"Hadlee, we're in the airport. We have to leave for Beijing in thirty minutes, but we can go to the hospital. You make the decision. You can go to the Olympics or we can go see Christian. Okay?" She left me there and went to talk to my coach about our crisis. So she left me to decide. First I prayed. I prayed for protection of Christian's life and discernment for me to make the right decision. I held my head in my hands with my elbows on my knees. My long brunette hair fell over my face. What was I going to do? Live out my dream or see my brother. Family or dream? What was I going to do? My head spun. Over and over I asked myself. I may never be able to go to the Olympics again, but I may never see my brother again, and his life is way more important to me than my hobbies or even my career. So I decided. I was going to stay in Denver and be with my brother. It was last minute, and my coach was disappointed. She told me what I already knew. I may never be able to compete in the Olympics again, but family is so much more important to me. That evening we went to the hospital. I hated the atmosphere, the putrid smell of disinfectant, the distant cry of a child, and the stark white that could not be blurred by my tears. We found Christian's room. He had come out of that surgery safely. He was awake and able to communicate with us, but I could see the pain on his face. An IV sent some type of medicine to his blood stream and an oxygen tube ran around his face and into his nostrils. He looked so helpless in the hospital bed. He couldn't have been the same person that just a couple of days earlier skied with me. I came out of that room heartbroken.

Two days later Christian died in surgery. At first I was angry at everything, especially myself. My brother was dead and I never got to go to the Olympics. I brought my anger on my mom one evening, but instead of punishing me, she sat down quietly next to me, "Hadlee, please talk to me. I know you're hurting," I sat down on the couch and set my head in my mother's lap; she began to gently stroke my hair. "I miss Christian," was all I could get out before the tear in my eyes flowed over. "Oh, Hadlee. I know but I think you made the right decision. You put family before career. You got to see him one last time," she spoke tenderly but my anger interpreted it as

"But he's dead! It doesn't matter!" I sobbed until my shirt was soaked.

"That's not true, sweetheart. It mattered more than you know," my anger subsided and her words soothed me; I knew they were true now. I felt at peace that my decision wasn't in vain. I wiped my face with my sleeve, "You're right. Thank you."

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

#### Felzkowski and Senate Republicans finish session on a high note

Madison, WI - On Tuesday, State Senator Mary Felzkowski (R-Tomahawk) and her colleagues convened for the last scheduled floor period of the 2023-24 legislative session. Despite a long agenda of appointees and bills, Senator Felzkowski focused on four pieces of legislation in particular: funding the tip-line at the Office of School Safety, preventing the Governor from using a partial-veto to increase taxes, requiring high school athletic teams fall into three categories based on gender at birth (male, female, or co-ed), and giving college students the right to waive immunization requirements similar to what we allow for K-12.

Felzkowski commented: "All four of these bills attempt to right a wrong. Whether it's the Governor creating programs with federal COVID dollars and choosing not to continue funding them, or his partial veto in the budget that created a property tax increase for the next 400 years - our constituents deserve more. Whether it's our young female athletes having championships stolen from them by male counterparts, or our college students being required to take vaccinations - our constituents deserve more.

The State Senate also passed two of Senator Felzkowski's bills, including: preventing local governments from requiring business permits for minors who operate occasionally, and protecting vehicle sellers from civil and criminal enforcements brought against them once the title is signed and transferred to the buyer.

Felzkowski continued: "I'm glad to see basic, commonsense legislation, such as these bills, pass through the Senate. There is no reason that children should have to apply for permits to run a lemonade or crafts stand at the park or a farmers market, instead their entrepreneurial spirit should be given room to grow and thrive. Hands-on experience is the best way for younger generations to learn and prepare for their futures."

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#### **Baldwin Celebrates Capping** Inhaler Prices at \$35

U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI), a member of the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions, celebrated the progress made to lower health care costs for Wisconsin families and hold big drug companies accountable. Less than three months after Senator Baldwin launched an investigation into the four major manufacturers of inhalers, three of the companies have made commitments to cap the out-of-pocket costs of their inhalers at \$35 for patients at the pharmacy counter.

25 million Americans have asthma, including 500,000 Wisconsinites, and 16 million Americans have COPD and rely on inhalers to breathe. Inhalers have been available since the 1950s, and most of the drugs they use have been on the market for more than 25 years. In other countries, the inhaler manufacturers sell the exact same products for far less. One of AstraZeneca's inhalers, Breztri Aerosphere, costs \$645 in the U.S. but just \$49 in the U.K. Boehringer Ingelheim's Combivent Respimat costs \$489 in the U.S. but just \$7 in France. GSK's Advair HFA costs \$319 in the U.S. but just \$26 in the U.K, and Teva's QVAR RediHaler costs \$286 in the U.S. but just \$9 in Germany.

In the past five years, AstraZeneca, GSK, and Teva made more than \$25 billion in revenue from inhalers alone. That is part of a broader pattern: between 2000 and 2021, manufacturers of all inhaler products in the U.S. brought in more than \$178 billion in revenue.

#### Baldwin obtains an additional \$50 Million for Community-Driven Projects

U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI), a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, announced she successfully secured over \$49.8 million for communitydriven projects in the second bipartisan Fiscal Year 2024 government funding package that passed the Senate early Saturday.

"I was proud to deliver for communities in every corner of the state to help grow our economy, keep our state safe, and ensure our children get the strong start they deserve," said Senator Baldwin. "Whether it's supporting our first responders or investing in prevention and treatment, this will help Wisconsin communities take the fentanyl and opioid crisis head-on. With this funding, high-quality health care and mental health counseling will be within reach for more people. And, I secured funding to support our small businesses, expand workforce training, and grow our Made in Wisconsin economy.

The Fiscal Year 2024 legislation includes funding for the Department of Defense; Financial Services and General Government; Department of Homeland Security; Department of Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies; Legislative Branch; and Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs.

Earlier this month, the Senate passed the first government funding package in which Senator Baldwin secured \$211 million for community-driven projects that support affordable housing, expand access to childcare, and invest in our law enforcement among other priorities for Wisconsin communities.

In our area the Sokaogon Chippewa Health Clinic will receive \$3,000,000 to support expansion of the Sokaogon Chippewa Health Clinic to improve health services delivered to the community in Forest County, Wisconsin.

#### **Senator Cowles, Representative Mursau Applaud Signing of Bill to Ease Wetland Mitigation**

MADISON - Senator Robert Cowles (R-Green Bay) and Representative Jeff Mursau (R-Crivitz) released the following statement after the Governor signed Senate Bill 255 into law yesterday as 2023 Wisconsin Act 111:

"When a wetland is disturbed by development, the goal is always to mitigate close to the site of the discharge," Senator Cowles stated. "That allows us to still reap the benefits from the healthy growth of wetlands and their natural wildlife habitats, reduced impacts from flooding, and cleaner ground and surface waters. Act 111 helps us to achieve each of these goals by removing one of the biggest hurdles towards successful, high-quality wetland mitigation near the discharge site."

"When selecting a site for a wetland mitigation project, a number of factors need to be present, and finding one with public access can be a major obstacle," stated Representative Mursau. "Wisconsin's in lieu fee subprogram is the only state-managed program in the United States that requires public access. By making public access optional, we may end up attracting more private landowners to the program."

Act 111 was drafted following a recommendation from the Wetland Study Council, and address worries from landowners about privately-funded wetland mitigation on private property. The new Act eliminates the requirement that any wetlands in the DNR's In-Lieu of Fee Subprogram be open to the public, while also ensuring there is no net loss of public access to wetlands in Wisconsin. This change in statute aligns access requirements with other wetland mitigation programs in Wisconsin, and every other wetland mitigation program across the United



## New DNR fishing tournament registration requirement takes effect april 1

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced today that fishing tournaments that are statewide or regional in nature, seasonal without specific fishing dates or that have fewer than 20 boats or 100 participants will be required to register with the DNR starting April 1. Registration of these tournaments will be free of charge.

The DNR regulates fishing tournaments or organized competitive fishing events where money or prizes are awarded to protect fish populations from overharvest and to avoid crowding or conflicts among waterbody users. Larger tournaments and some specialized tournaments are monitored and regulated through a paid permit system, but there is little information on unpermitted tournaments. This registration requirement will help the DNR gather data on the number and types of tournaments held on Wisconsin's waterbodies.

Tournament organizers will be able to submit their registrations using simple online or paper forms that ask for organizer contact information and event information, including waterbodies to be fished, dates, target species and expected number of boats or participants. Only one registration is required per calendar year for tournaments that recur as part of a series. Registrations are required to be submitted 72 hours before the start of a tournament. Once submitted, registrations are complete, and no approvals are required.

A screening tool that asks questions about the planned tournament will help organizers determine whether they need a registration or permit. Processes and regulations for tournaments that require permits are unchanged.

Anyone interested in hosting a fishing tournament in Wisconsin can visit the DNR's Fishing Tournaments webpage for information about tournament requirements, registration deadlines and permit and registration forms.

## Forest County Election results

The state referendum questions both passed in Forest County. Question 1 passed by a vote of 1187 to 1002 and Question 2 passed by a vote of 1439 to 728.

The Forest County Referendum lost by a total of 497 for to 1183 against.

In the Crandon School Board Race, Bryan Schallock won over Calli Victor by a score of 609 to 301.

In the Laona School Board election, two people ran for two seats and they are Chad Albrecht and Shonda Laurence with Albrecht gathering 274 votes and Laurence 286 votes

In the Wabeno School Board election Dawn Jakubiec had 104 votes and Penny Mclaughlin 105 votes for Forest County. The Oconto County seat had Jason Boor unopposed with a total of 122.

Armstrong Creek elected Debbie Thompson to the School Board, who was running unopposed.

The Crandon City Council had nobody as a registered candidate. Dawn Schmidt was elected with a write-in vote in Ward 1, as were John Rogers in Ward 2 and Michael Smith in Ward 4. Ward 3 had no write-in, so that the City Council can appoint a councilman at a later time.

The Town of Wabeno referendum was defeated by a vote of 144 to 81.

The County Board had no seats that were a contest. Write-in candidates stepped up to provide a candidate in some of the districts. In Dist. 1-Dehart, Dist. 2-Gretzinger, Dist. 3-Augustin, Dist. 4-Goode, Dist. 5-Piasini, Dist. 6-Peterson, Dist. 7-Moravec, Dist. 8-Tallier, Dist. 9-Lukas, Dist. 10-Karl, Dist. 11-Miller, Dist. 12-Vacant, Dist. 13-Landru, Dit. 14-Vacant, Dist. 15-Chaney, Dist. 16-Decorah, Dist. 17-Weber, Dist. 18-Skallerud, Dist. 19-Marvin, Dist. 20-Vacant, Dist. 21-Dailey.

Vacant seats will be filled by appointment of the County Board in the future.

And, Donald Trump was victorious over Joe Biden in Forest County by a total of 1332 to Biden's 540. It should be noted that other candidates did receive some votes, with Nikki Haley receiving 100 votes. Ron DeSantis was actually able to gain 28 votes and Dean Phillips 34 votes and Chris Christie 21 votes. Uninstructed Delegation on the Democratic side was 24 votes and 22 on the Republican side.

## Forest Service annual seasonal trail & road closures to motorized, equestrian





RHINELANDER, Wis., March 12, 2024 — In the interest of public safety and to ensure the integrity of trails, the USDA Forest Service has authorized an emergency closure for the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest. Use by all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), utility task vehicles (UTVs), equestrian, and bicycles will be prohibited on trails and routes identified in the Forest Motor Vehicle Use Maps, effective immediately through May 1, 2024 per order # 09-13-24-01.

"With less snow this winter and warm temperatures thawing soils, recreational trails are soft, muddy and vulnerable to substantial rutting," said USDA Forest Service Recreation Program Manager Karen Katz. "Trails will be closed until May 1, 2024 to protect the tread from lasting damage."

The USDA Forest Service coordinates with trail partners as much as possible to ensure continuity of routes and consistent closure decisions. Riders and other users should check local regulations for non-federal trails they plan to use as many counties in northern Wisconsin are also closing to protect trails from damage.

Each year in spring, motorized trails are closed to ATVs, UTVs, mountain bikes, and horses or other pack or saddle animals. The seasonal closure reduces rutting and erosion, which are more likely when the ground is saturated. Protecting the recreation trails now minimizes the need for summer closures to repair damaged segments. While ATV/UTV routes and other trails that are designated by towns under state law are not subject to this closure, users should check local regulations for nonfederal trails they plan to use.

As we hear concerns regarding the challenges of inflation, let me share with you some recent data from the CDC and US Department of Health and Human Services. The following is for the entire state of Wisconsin.
